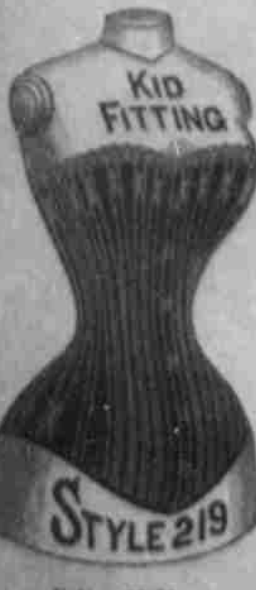

Saturday, County Clerk W. W. Hall

TOLEDO, O., Jan. 30.—The loss of an
entire family in Lake Erie is reported
here. On one of the islands in the
Bass group lived a family named Rob-
son. The family consists of the
father, mother, a daughter of 20, a son
of 5, and a hired man, Henry M.
Martel.

The little boy died and his parents
determined to take the body back to
Canada, whence they came. A clinker
boat was used, the entire family start-
ing on the perilous journey. The

cently near Port Burrell, on the Cana-
dian shore, is presumed to have been
Mrs. Robson. The other bodies have
