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AROUND THE EVENING LAMP.

Far Western Reflections Upon the Newest Books and Periodicals.

"America in Hawaii. A History of United States Influence in the Hawaiian Islands," from beginning, by Edmund James Carpenter, is published by Small, Maynard & Company, Boston.

The book is what it purports to be and completely covers the subject. It can be done in one volume. There are a number of illustrations and all the historical facts are vouched for in foot notes and there is a comprehensive index.

It should find a place in all up-to-date libraries and the author speaks apparently from a long official familiarity with the subject, reinforced by careful study and examination of the sources of history.

To indicate the scope of the work it is only needed to say that its opening chapter is primitive Hawaii and its closing one annexation.

"The Story of Lincoln," by the Pabst School Publishing Company of Bloomington, Ill., is a volume of supplementary reading for children, prepared by Frances Craven.

The text is carefully condensed from the most reliable histories of the great emperor and almost tells itself. It reads easily and every line is of fascinating interest to children of even larger growth.

It also reveals a picture of life in the pioneer days that is refreshing to youth, who live in a state of almost luxury compared to the days of Abraham Lincoln.

This booklet should be read in every public school in the land at least once a year, and if we had the making of one law on supplementary reading it would be to require that.

"The Little Lady, Some Other People and Myself," by Tom Hall, is a pretty volume of causerie published in a most attractive manner by E. R. Herrick & Co., 20 Fifth Avenue, New York.

Many of these sketches appear to have been published in Truth and created so much amusement that they have been embalmied in book form.

They will afford many a pleasant hour to readers, who want philosophy in a less dry form than it is usually put upon the market. The illustrations are very appropriate.

"The Woman's Home Companion" touches on many subjects of practical interest to women readers, such as "Pyrography a Popular Pastime," "The Fit of a Woman's Gown," "The Period of Betrothal," "Child-Culture in the Home," "When Digestion Fails," and "Consulting a Husband's Taste."

Katharine E. Junkermann has a second paper on the "Cultivation of the Voice," and Sallie Joy White gives the fourteenth lesson of "Cookery for Girls," while the Club Woman's Corner is proving a popular feature.

The Great Round World began January 26 with a weekly supplement history of the world from an ethnological standpoint which is very fine reading for children. Richard Hovey is easily the second in rank among American minor poets and we have no poets of the first rank if indeed there are any living in the world today. His last volume "Along the Trail" is a book of lyrics published in attractive form by Small, Maynard and Company, Boston, price \$1.50.

Our readers may recall a review of his songs from Vagabondia published by Copeland and Day, Boston, several years since. We make no effort at critical review but for the poet a yet greater future than any American writer of the present generation has attained.
