Treasurer Wants Tax Money.

State Treasurer Moore has sent the following letter to the treasurer of Marion county, asking for the remittance of taxes and demands their payment. The letter is dated February 8, and is as follows:

"Hon. A. L. Downing, county treasurer, Salem, Oregon. Dear Sir: Permit me to inform you that under the annual apportionment of state taxes, as made by the state board of levy, under date of January 5, 1899, the amount found due the state of Oregon, from Marion county, on account of the current expense tax for 1898, was \$45,928.22. To this must be added the old balance still due on the current expense tax of 1896, in the sum of \$838. Interest on the state tax of 1895, in the sum of \$549.62; balance of 1895, in the sum of \$2,396.17, together with interest thereon to January 1, 1899, in the further sum of \$735.96, and interest on the state tax for 1897, in the sum of \$403.06. The total amount thus due from Marion county, including the current expense tax of 1899, is \$49,813.03. Trusting the remittance of the amounts named will receive your prompt attention, I remain, my dear sir, yours very truly. (Signed) Charles H. Moore state treasurer."

Marion County Dead.

Olyver Aral, a well known resident of Fairfield died on Wednesday the 9th inst., aged nearly 81 years. He came to the Pacific coast from New York in 1861. The wife and five children are left to mourn his death, the children being Pauline, Olyver Jr., Louis, Frank, and August; with the exception of Olyver Jr., who is in British Columbia, they all reside in that part of Oregon.

The deceased was well known over the county and most highly respected by all.

The funeral will take place at 10 a. m. Sunday next, at the St. Louis Catholic church.

At the family residence, at King, Oregon, February 5, 1899, Dr. J. W. Worden, died of a gripe, aged 78 years 9 months and 1 day.

Deceased was married to Miss Mary Graham, on March 4, 1886, by this union two children were born—John and Emma. In 1897 deceased came to Oregon.

He was a physician, having practiced for fifty-four years, and he also was postmaster at King. He was a highly respected citizen.

The remains were given burial at Union Hill cemetery.

The River On a Bender.

The weather bureau reports today and tomorrow fair and cooler.

The river is still rising at the rate of an inch an hour and now stands at 17 feet 8 inches above regular water. All boats are running regular and the river will probably not get high enough at this freshet to stop boats from passing through the locks. It will yet have to raise about two feet before it will interfere with the locks.

The water is so high that the boat at Halls Ferry is laid up. All will be O. K. again in a few days.

The cold snap has killed many young fruit trees, so reports Mr. W. Walker, one of Salem's nurserymen. He says it is impossible as yet to tell to what extent, but it is quite serious.

The bridge across Mill creek, on Front street, is impassable, owing to damage by some of the underpinning having been knocked out. This bridge has been in a dangerous condition for some time and will now have to be fixed.

friends of the common schools for their action in bringing this bill to a vote and it will receive two-thirds of all the votes in the House if there is no sharp practice.

Representative Stewart, of Jackson, a Republican, and a man who has taught school all his life and been county superintendent in four states, moved in committee, to report the Daly bill favorably. He was ably seconded by Nichols of Benton, a farmer and school teacher, a Republican and graduate of Willamette university. Marsh, the Chairman and Wualley, of Portland, voted against a favorable report—both Republicans. Fordney, Populist, was willing to report the bill back to the House on its merits and it was done.

Members will not condone and uphold the present wrong and abuse and will go on record to do away with it.

Stewart and Nichols deserve the thanks of all lovers of American institutions for their courageous stand for text book reform.

Fordney deserves credit for being willing to bring the bill to a vote in the house. The house is composed of forty-two Republicans and eighteen Union members. Nearly all the Union members favor a change in the manner of selecting textbooks; while some are honestly opposed to the commission system. But upon the Republican majority will devolve the responsibility for defeating text book reform for the next six years if the Daly bill fails to pass.

In the senate twenty-four men out of thirty came to the support of the bill. The names of the senators who expressed themselves for the bill were:

If this legislature fails to do its duty the fight will go on until the people of Oregon get relief from the oppressive control of the American Book Co. in the educational affairs of this state.

On motion of Stillman of Umatilla county the Daly text book bill was made special order at 3 o'clock Monday. The report of the committee on Education will be received at 7:30 this evening.

In the Senate Selling's bill to repeal the State Fair appropriation was made a special order Wednesday at 2 p. m. The vote, which kills the bill, was 18 to 10.
