Wheaton Captures Pasig Our American Volunteers

Filipinos Scatter Like Chaff

Before Our Artillery and Infantry Charge.

Only Six Americans Said to Have Been Wounded.

By Associated Press to the Journal.

MANILA, March 13.—Brigadier General Wheaton captured the city of Pasig this afternoon. The American loss was only six wounded.

4:05 p. m.—Gen. Wheaton attacked and captured the city of Pasig, this afternoon. The enemy made a stand for an hour, but at the end of that time were forced to retreat. The loss to the Filipinos is thirty killed, and sixteen prisoners. Of the United States forces six were wounded.

MANILA, March 13.—At daylight Wheaton's divisional brigade was drawn up on the ridge behind San Pedro Macati, a mile south of town. The advance was sounded at 6:30 a. m., the cavalry leading the column at a smart trot across the open to the right, eventually reaching a clump of trees commanding the rear of Guadalupe. Supported by the Oregon volunteers the advance force opened a heavy fire on the rebels. The response was feeble, apparently coming from a few men in every covert. While the right of the column was swinging to wards the town of Pasig, the left advanced, pouring volleys into the bush. A small body of rebels made a determined stand at the Guadalupe church, but the enemy was unable to withstand the assault. At 7:30 the river gunboat started towards Pasig. The rebels were first encountered by the vessel in a jungle near Guadalupe. Steaming slowly the gunboat poured a terrific fire from galling guns into the brush. For an hour the whirling rapid-fire guns alternated with the booming of heavy pieces on board. In the meantime, Scott's battery ashore was shelling the trenches and driving the enemy back.

The artillery then advanced to the ridge of bamboo and drove a few of the enemy's sharpshooters away with volleys from the carbines. The artillery advanced and met no opposition. In the mean time the infantry had been sent forward in extended order, the Washington regiment resting on the bank of the river, each regiment deploying on reaching its station and furnishing its own support. The entire column wheeled towards the river, driving the enemy towards the supports, and then advancing on Guadalupe. The artillery moved to the ridge, commanding Pasig and Barteros. By this time the enemy was in full flight along the line over a mile long, and firing was discontinued temporarily in order to give the troops a rest before making the attack on Pasig. The enemy's loss is believed to be severe. At this stage of the engagement it was raining heavily.

MANILA, March 13.—6:40 p. m.—The Filipinos apparently planned an attack upon the line of General Otis and General Hale this morning, but their courage seemed to flinch, though they fired signals and kept up the fusillade along the American front for an hour. Our troops, in obedience to orders, refrained from shooting, with the exception of two companies of newly arrived men, who replied until they had suppressed the regiment of Filipinos. This body of rebels seemed under better leadership than most of the others. A white man was seen among the officers, endeavoring to lead them to the attack.

but apparently all efforts to induce them to leave the trenches were futile. The American authorities in Manila say the city is now so effectively policed that a serious outbreak is impossible. They believe that the natives are cowed.

The presence of the families of officers is discouraged, and many are leaving on board the United States Transports, some going to Japan for temporary residence. General Otis has remarked: "Manila is no place for women. This is war, not a picnic."

The British cruiser Narcissus has sailed for various ports in the island of Luzon, having on board British subjects who desire protection.

JOINS WHEATON'S BRIGADE.

This afternoon the Twentieth and Twenty-second infantry and seven companies of the Oregon volunteers marched to San Pedro Macati to join General Wheaton's new divisional brigadier, which is to consist of the Twentieth and Twenty-second infantry, eight companies of the Washington volunteers, seven companies of the Oregon volunteers, three troops of cavalry (mounted), and a battalion of light artillery. Although the rain which fell this morning has cooled the temperature to 82 deg., many dropped from the ranks, overcome by the heat.

Several soldiers were sunstruck in the streets of Manila this morning. Most of them were not acclimated.

Brigadier-General Charles King has recovered from his indisposition, and resumed command at the San Pedro Macati bridge. The enemy are very active north of the river, though not doing any firing now.

MANILA, March 13.—7:55.—After a short rest Gen. Wheaton resumed his attack on Pasig. Scott's battery supported by two companies of the 20th regiment advanced on Guadalupe by a road along the river bank, the remainder of the 20th and 22nd regiment following with a reserve of the Oregon Volunteers.

At 11:30 a. m. the column came in contact with the enemy and gunboat steamed to the firing line and cleared the jungle on both sides, while a battery took a position on a bluff at the right. The first shot from the American field pieces at 1200 yards range dislodged a gun of the enemy at Pasig.

After the town had been shelled the 30th regiment lined up on the bluff and the 22nd took a position on the left of the place with cavalry in the center, whereupon the enemy retreated to the town. The gunboat then moved into the bend opposite. The fire on the rebel position was maintained along the whole American line until 2:30 p. m. when preparations were made for the attack.

At 3 p. m. a gunboat started in pursuit of the enemy's armed tug chasing her to the lake. At 3:30 p. m. a large body of the enemy was discovered working around the right flank and the Twentieth regiment moved to command the ridge.

The rebels were met opposite the Paleros, but the enemy bolted: Thirty rebels were killed, 16 taken prisoners, and the Americans lost six men wounded. The whole American line bivouacked at 5 o'clock. About 700 rebels are reported as marching northward a few miles to the southwest.

School Election Today.

At 2 o'clock the election of school director was begun, with Judge T. L. Davidson and Dr. W. H. Byrd as candidates. Considerable interest is being manifested, but not as much as a year ago. Comparatively few women are reported to be voting. The polls close at 6 o'clock.

Going to Build an Empire.

Soldiers Willing to Settle in the Philippines.

Kaiser Shows Signs of Returning Friendship.

By Associated Press to the Journal.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—The following is an extract from a letter from Major Theodore Sternberg, paymaster, United States volunteers, to an officer of the war department. It is dated Manila, January 22, 1899.

"I wish you would call the attention of the president and secretary of war to this: There is not less than 10 per cent of the volunteers who honestly wish to remain in these islands and make their homes here and engage in agriculture, lumbering and mining.

Take but one item: Cattle thrive here: it is the finest stock country I ever saw. The Orient can be supplied with beef from here. Now, these soldiers wish to be discharged here, with travel pay. This will be their capital. Those who are in earnest will and can do anything in reason to prove it.

"There are also many regular soldiers enlisted under order 40. These men think they should be paid travel if they intend settling in these islands. Now, all of this is based upon the idea that the United States will retain some sort of interest in these islands. Knowing the value of the pioneer, I say liberally that each of these plain soldiers, young, vigorous and used to this climate, by remaining here will be of inestimable value to our country.

The only way to Americanize these islands is the example of American pioneers engaged in making a home for themselves. I take no stock in the cry that white men cannot work in the tropics. They can, when working for themselves. There are no healthier people than the English and Scotch who have lived here for many years.

"I know the regulars, as a rule, don't want to hold these islands, because they prefer stations in the states. I know the majority of the volunteers are homesick, and so color their opinions. But I had rather die here than see the flag come down, and if I was 20 years younger I would make my home on a farm here.

LONDON, March 13.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Mail, says: "I am informed that Emperor William displayed great interest in the conference with Cecil Rhodes, asking many questions as to the latter's schemes, without, however, going into details or revealing his own views.

He was especially keen respecting the telegraphic portion of Mr. Rhodes' projects, and he said he had not yet renounced his hope of visiting Egypt to see with his own eyes the work that has been accomplished there."

"In the course of the interview, his majesty said: 'Do not miss seeing the marble statues in the Sieges-Allee (avenue of Victory).'

"He also expressed the hope to see Mr. Rhodes again before he left Berlin."

"The emperor dined with Prince Hohenlohe, the imperial chancellor, yesterday, after receiving Mr. Rhodes, with whom he had conversed for three-quarters of an hour."

Mr. Rhodes is continuing his visits to high officials, and financiers, and the general belief here is that his efforts to obtain the Kaiser's adherence to the project of a railroad from the Cape to Cairo, passing through German East African territory, will succeed."
