STATE HOUSE NEWS

How Bi Geer May Get the Benefit of a Semi-Colon.

Late News About Appointments and the Educational Institutions at Salem.

Gov. Geer has nearly completed the formation of a cabinet of five members of a state board of agriculture. He has decided to appoint one man from Marion county, but not from Salem. He feels that this will increase the interest among the farming population without subjecting the fair to the imputation of being a local affair.

T. W. Davenport retires as State Land Agent April first, when Bi Geer takes charge. Miss Alice Davenport will probably remain as clerk, having become very competent in the duties of the office. Owing to a semi-colon in the enrolled bill which was not in the printed bill, the new official will get \$1800 a year and traveling expenses, but must pay his clerical expenses.

The State Board of education is considering the condition of educational institutions at Salem. There are no applicants for the positions held by Supt. Knight of the deaf-mute school, or Supt. Carter of the Institute for the blind. Teachers for those positions are not numerous and if a change is made in either position the board may have to go outside of the state to find a specialist. There is a feeling that Supt. and Mrs. Carter of the Blind school have not been treated fairly by the board of education in the past. Teachers and employes were forced upon them who were not loyal to them and outside influences were used to prejudice their efforts in an unfair manner. Teachers and blind children were taken before the legislative committees to make petty complaints and Mr. and Mrs. Carter were not even allowed to make a statement of their side of the case. No legislative report was finally formulated or forthcoming.

The present board seems disposed to act more fairly with Supt. Carter. He is the first superintendent who has made any marked improvements on the surroundings of the institution, in the way of flower and vegetable gardens which are of far more practical benefit to the institution and the children than would appear at first sight. Mr. and Mrs. Carter have given without reserve the conscientious care and culture of a refined Christian home to all the children entrusted to the state and the state board will not find it easy to improve on their service, as they can satisfy themselves if they will take the pains to investigate. The legislative committee did not take the trouble to go near the institution, unless it was the secrete special committee of which Senator Looney was chairman and he warmly commends their management.

The state board of education, composed of Gov. Geer, Secretary Dunbar and Supt. Ackerman, today appointed Henry Beckers, of Pendleton as superintendent of the State Reform school to succeed Supt. E. M. Croisan, April 1.

Gov. Geer today received the resignation of Dr. J. R. Cardwell, president of the state board of Horticulture, and appointed in his stead Hon. H. B. Miller, of Josephine county.

Linn County Cases.

At this term of Circuit Court at Albany the homicide at Lyons will be investigated by the grand jury, as well as the shortage of the former county treasurer of about \$3000. There will be the usual number of petty crimes before the court, and no doubt with some of them it will go very hard.

The prince was returning from a military club, when he met the crowd of people who hooted, hissed and pelted him with snowballs.

Gomez Impeached.

Cuban Assembly Dismisses the General in Disgrace.

Three Million Dollars to Pay the Army Declared to Be Insufficient.

The Cuban military assembly, in public session has impeached General Maximo Gomez and removed him from his command as general-in-chief of the Cuban army, the first ballot taken resulting in 26 votes being cast in support of the motion to impeach and remove General Gomez, against four in opposition. The meeting lasted from 2 o'clock until 7 Saturday.

General Gomez' only supporters were General Cespedes and General Nunez. The original motion, which was introduced by Senor Manuel Sanguilly provided for the abolition of the grade of general-in-chief, but an amendment was offered to this by Senor Aguerro, which read: "To abolish the grade of general-in-chief and remove General Gomez for failure in his military duties and disobedience to the assembly."

Senor Aguerro declared that Gomez was insubordinate, and should be punished, and Senor Sanguilly insinuated that the general was a traitor to Cuba.

Much passion was evident in the speeches, in some of which Gomez was declared to have been delinquent in his duties and disobedient because he had accepted the proposition of Robert P. Porter, President McKinley's special emissary, without consulting the assembly; because he had taken upon himself the arrangements for the payment and disarming of the Cuban troops independent of the assembly, and because he had declared to the assembly that he would observe its rulings in so far as he could see them beneficial to Cuba.

The assembly then declared that the \$3,000,000 is insufficient and that it has not yet accepted the proposition. The discussion of this question will soon be taken now that General Gomez has been removed.

Senor Gonzales de Quesada, who accompanied Mr. Porter in Cuba was attacked by Senors Guaberto Gomez, Sanguilly and Aguerro, who declared he had acted in bad faith and had deceived them. Senor Aguerro, likened the present conditions confronting the assembly to those which confronted the French chamber when it was proposed to impeach President MacMahon.

Colonel Mora and General Nunez declared that the present step was useless and would make the assembly ridiculous in the eyes of the world. Among the principal speakers were Senors Sanguilly, Andrade, Aguerro, Guaberto, Villalon, Nuez, Cespedes and Lastra.

Tomorrow General Gomez will be officially notified of the assembly's action. General Gomez is believed to be stronger than the assembly in the affections of the Cuban army.

Many privates are anxious to leave the army and go to work, especially when they are able to obtain money to start in life anew.

The position of the assembly is notably weak, as the military administration supports Gomez, also the planters and property-owning element who are tired of the Cuban army, which sustains half upon charity and half upon contributions levied by means of threats.

General Gomez received at Molinas this evening a telephone message announcing the assembly's decision. He answered calmly: "All right, I enjoy the situation." He then came to Havana to keep a dinner engagement with his daughter, at the house of a friend.

of assembly. Senor Laster strongly criticized some of President Andrade's rulings, and was sharply called to order by President Andrade, who immediately declared the meeting over. A violent discussion ensued between Senor Laster and the president.

Senor Santa Maria, formerly president of the Cuban republic, was the second man signing the Sanguilly motion for impeachment as amended by Senor Aguerro.

The news of the action of the assembly is all over Havana, and the cafes around the plaza are filled with excited men, discussing the situation. The general expression is one of strong censure the of assembly. The next meeting of that body was held today.

The surrendered arms of the Cuban troops will, in accordance with agreement between Governor-General Brooke and General Gomez, be stored at Havana and Santiago, in the general custody of the United States, but under the employ of the military government. Every Cuban soldier must give up his arms, even if they were bought by himself, or else he will receive no share of the money advanced by the United States.
