SCHOOL LAW DECISION.

Districts Have Absolute Control Over All Funds.

Attorney-General Blackburn, at the request of Superintendent of Public Instruction Ackerman, has rendered an opinion on two important points of school law. He held:

"First—When a school district raises money by taxation for a specific purpose, and it afterwards becomes unnecessary to use the whole amount for that purpose, the district has the power at an annual meeting to divert the remainder to some other use. School districts are corporations, and the qualified electors in the district have absolute control over the funds raised by taxation, unless their power is limited by law.

A SANDBAR ACCRETION.

Possession Being Contested By Mark H. Savage of Salem.

The Mark H. Savage-John Minto contest for a gravel bar alleged to be an accretion to Minto's island, in the Willamette river, opposite Trade street, in Salem, was disposed of temporarily by the state board of school land commissioners, after a session lasting several hours, by the appointment of S. C. Spencer, of Portland, as referee to take testimony and report to the board at a future meeting. The interests of the city of Salem and the Salem Water Company in the controversy have been merged with those of Mr. Minto, who claims the bar, which is nearly 13 acres in extent, as an accretion to his property, while Savage claims it is an island, and the property of the state. A motion by Minto's attorney to dismiss the application of Savage to purchase the land, on the ground that it was void because it was filed before the law giving the board the right to sell was in force was rejected. The hearing of the case before Referee Spencer will be begun in Salem, April 3. During the proceedings the large reception-room to the executive department at the state house was filled with interested parties and spectators. The case, which has been dragging along for a long time, is attracting considerable attention.
