A BROKEN BONE.

Annoying Accident Will Confine Geo. P.
Hughes to the House awhile.

On Saturday evening Geo. P.
Hughes, a prominent Salem business
man, had the misfortune to meet
with an accident, which will con-
fine him to the house for a couple of
weeks. He was walking home
in company with ex-Mayor Claud
Gatch, and when in crossing
the S. P. track at the corner of Trade
and Commercial streets his foot
slipped from the top of the rail, letting
his whole weight fall upon his turned
ankle. Hearing the bone crack, Mr.
Hughes fell and made no attempt to
raise. He was conveyed to his
home, and an examination by a surgeon
disclosed a bad sprain of the ankle
and a fracture of the smaller bone
just above. The injured limb will be
encased in plaster for a week or ten
days, and Mr. Hughes will experience
the doubtful pleasures of enforced
inactivity.

Oregon's Popular Architect.

The Daily Capital Journal, of Sa-
lem, of the 4th inst., contains a large
illustrated "ad" of Chas. H. Burggraf,
the architect who furnished the plans,
etc., for our new courthouse and
schoolhouse—giving illustrations of
them and of the new Linn county
court house, Douglas county court
house (rebuilt), Baptist church at Mc-
Minville and the Baptist church at
Salem, all his artistic work. He also
gives a list of public buildings
designed and in most instances super-
vised in construction by him in his
"seven and one-half years" record as
an architect, which is highly credit-
able to him. Out of 22 school house
plans submitted he was awarded 18;
of 5 plans church houses he was awarded
3; out of 6 church plans submitted, he
was awarded 5. These are all beauti-
ful and modern in design, substantial
structures for the purpose used, and
acceptable to communities in which
they are placed, and places this
young architect well up at the head
of the profession. Our school house
is the fifth of that design by
Mr. Burggraf, and he receives
high compliments for their
beauty, convenience and substantial
construction from these several neigh-
borhoods, and we are sure he will from
Coquille when we get into possession
and full occupancy of the beautiful
structure erected here.—Coquille Her-
ald.

[Mr. Burggraf is Oregon's rising and
popular architect. In 1896 he was a
strong Silver Republican. When the
State House ring was putting through
all kinds of rotten jobs, including the
deaf mute school, Burggraf refused to
be deaf or mute and was lashed by the
gang. He goes in for an honest

About Prominent People.

A Kingston, Jamaica, cable say
John Sherman, of Ohio, was very
much weaker today and the doctors
are discouraged.

Dr. Oliver Marcy of Northwestern
University, Evanston, Ill., is dead.

Hon. W. J. Bryan is at Chattanooga,
Tenn., to attend a banquet given in his
honor by the Bryan Birthday Asso-
ciation, which gives each year on the
19 of March, Mr. Bryan's birthday a
dinner, to which the leading Demo-
crats of the state are invited. This
event promises to be the most suc-
cessful ever given, being the first of
the distinguished Nebraskan has attended.
Over 300 tickets have been issued, and
covers for 400 have been provided.
Mr. Bryan will deliver a speech at the
city auditorium, at which time his
friends say he will fire the first gun
of the campaign of 1900.

Thomas Carroll Boone, the tele-

THE BENDIX CO.

And The Violinist Enthusiastically Re-
ceived at Portland.

The Sunday Oregonian speaking of
the Max Bendix concert says the
audience showed more enthusiasm
than is generally displayed. Very
nearly every number on the pro-
gram being encored, Mr. Bendix'
playing of Hubay's "Carmen Fan-
tasia" indeed bringing two recalls.
The ardor of the audience met a
ready response in the generosity of
the three artists that make up the
company, for with the most obliging
good nature in the world they doubled
the length of the program, thereby
establishing themselves firmly in the
hearts of those who heard them.

Mr. Bendix made a complete con-
quest of his audience. His rendering
of the andante and finale of Mendel-
sohn's concerto in E revealed a crys-
talline purity of tone such as cannot
be excelled by Ysaye. Comparison
with the great Belgian violinist so
recently here was natural and inevit-
able, and much exchange of opinion
on this point was heard, during the
evening. There is a bright and
wholesome spirit of good comradeship
and bonhomie about Max Bendix
that did not make itself felt in Ysaye,
who was grand, leonine, but unap-
proachable and imperious in his bear-
ing toward Western audiences. Mr.
Bendix, on the contrary, shows a
cordial friendliness that immediately
puts him in rapport with his listen-
ers.

That he is a genuine artist and at
the same time spontaneous and natu-
ral in his expression of feeling was
proved by the Chopin nocturne played
by way of encore.

Miss Osborn made a conquest not
less marked. Her voice is one of large
range and pleasant timbre, managed
with the nicest art. The soft tones
were particularly delightful, full of
melting, liquid beauty; her excellent
enunciation and charming personality
contributing materially to the enjoy-
ment of the music lovers present.

Miss Scott, the pianiste, was at her
best in light pianissimo passages, re-
quiring brilliant technique. Her
suppleness of wrist enabled her to do
octave passages well, as illustrated by
her rendering of the Rubenstein etude
Op. 23, and her arpeggios and runs
were clear and delicate.

ADVERTISING A TOWN.

How a Town With Less Natural Ad-
vantages Than Salem Is Booming.

There is an organization of business
men in the little city of Norfolk, Va.,
that is run upon business principles,
and therefore accomplishes results.
This organization does not aspire to
the ownership of stately buildings; it
pays fifty dollars per month for a
room in which to hold its meetings
and it has not once given a pink tea
since it came into being, yet it spends
\$20,000 annually in advertising Nor-
folk, and the city grows and becomes
prosperous and keeps step by step
with its more pretentious rivals.

The Business Men's Association
employs a man at a salary and ex-
penses of \$500 per month to travel
through the East and induce manu-
facturers to go to Norfolk. It enter-
tains editorial associations in the
most lavish manner and gets one hun-
dred dollars' worth of advertising for
every dollar spent in the entertain-
ment. It runs cheap excursions to
the city from various points in the
North, and by this means has inter-
ested the capital of rich men in build-
ing up the place.

Norfolk has been a liberal patron
of the newspapers for the past ten years.
In 1891 an industrial development
company spent ten thousand dollars
in the Manufacturers' Record alone.
The city is a regular graft for the
map-makers and booklet publishers.
All of the commercial organizations
issue annuals, and the real estate
men and land companies set out new
maps at frequent intervals; even the
banks distribute some booklet work.
For a time an envelope never left a
Norfolk house without a map of the
city or a booklet describing its ad-
vantages.

A conservative estimate of the
amount of foreign advertising done by
Norfolk is about \$2,000 annually. Has
paid? Well, Norfolk is the best
known of any city in the South, if we
except Atlanta.

"The exports and imports increase
each year in proportion far above that
of other cities. Building has been
enormous, even during the depression.
"The largest bank building in
America, and one of the largest hotels
have been recently completed. There
has been more building done by trans-
portation companies in Norfolk re-
cently than in any other city in the
United States."

Norfolk is about as big as Sa-
lem, but it is growing at a tremen-
dous rate. Norfolk does not possess
the natural advantages of a city as
Salem does, but it is climbing all the
time. Why? Because Norfolk busi-
ness men have struck the right com-
bination—advertising.

That's a combination that will make
a city if anything can.
Salem ought to take a lesson from
the little city of Norfolk. Her busi-
ness men put into the treasury of the
Chamber of Commerce every month,
but what do they get for it? What
single thing of vital importance to
the city has the Chamber of Com-
merce accomplished during the last
year?

It is time to awake from our tra-
ne. It is time to move. It is time to
adopt good business sense in the work
of building up Salem. It is time to
go to work.
