HINGHAM APPEALED

From the Decision of Judge Boise That He Can't Be Tax Collector.

The Marion county court has ordered the county clerk to appeal the Hingham warrant case, in which the temporary injunction against the issuance of a warrant for G. G. Hingham, for collecting delinquent taxes, under a contract with the county court, was recently made perpetual by Judge Boise. Judge Boise held that the county court could not hire a person to collect delinquent taxes, that being part of the duties of the sheriff.

Of course, the appeal is really taken by Mr. Hingham, who thus litigates his own case at the expense of the county and staves off paying costs for a year or two. He is bound to cost this county a pile of money in one way or another, and appeals all his various personal litigation enterprises to the supreme court.

A prominent Salem attorney suggests that the county court cannot compel County Clerk Hall to take this appeal. The case is brought against the clerk, as he is an elective officer with concurrent powers, and it is believed that the court has no authority to compel the clerk to appeal a case that is not in the interest of the people. This attorney further suggests that this case parallel with the one where the county court house repairs suit was defended at the county's expense, whereas it was directly against the interests of the county and of the taxpayers.

Cycle Path.

The Cycle editor of THE JOURNAL has invented what good roadmakers believe will prove a practical solution of building cycle paths. Take the county road graders and set them to cut a scarf not over three feet wide on the EDGE of the regular wagon road and on a BEVEL so it will NOT hold water. It would not be wide enough to drive a wagon on and would make a splendid cycle path wherever the soil would permit a scarf to be cut on the berm of the highway.

If this plan will work miles of cycle paths can be made at very slight expense. The law will protect such paths from being used to drive other vehicles over and foot passengers will not harm them. Most of the clay soils of Western Oregon will make a fine wheeling surface on this plan. No charge for the invention.

Lost its Head.

A mongolian pheasant this morning flew across South Mill Creek and becoming bewildered in the maze of wires on Commercial street, lost its head and flew against one of the S. P. Co. freight depot windows. The window was smashed, the bird was dashed to the ground but proved tame and escaped under the building.

THE FRUIT GROWERS.

Preparations to be Made for a Big Convention April 11.

Businessmen and Local Officials of Marion County Union Apportion Committees.

There is to be a meeting this evening at the office of the Oregon Fruit & Produce Company, a few doors west of Friedman's store, at 8 o'clock this evening, to take steps for the entertainment of the Fruit Growers' Convention at Salem, Tuesday, April 11, at 10 a. m. Local committees will be appointed to work with the Marion County Fruit Growers' Union Horticultural society.

Next Tuesday is the regular quarterly meeting of the society, and the members of the State Board of Horticulture are to be present, as well as professors of the State Horticultural and Agricultural station at Corvallis. The most prominent and practical experts in the state are to be present and on the program.

This is a convention no fruit grower can afford to miss. How to get the largest results in quality and reputation for our state, and the largest net cash out of the crop this year is quite a problem, and this convention ought to be attended by the several thousand fruit growers of the valley within ten miles of Salem.

Nursery men, commission men, orchard owners, business men and professional men who read this are urged to not only come out tonight but to mention the importance of this convention to EVERY fruit grower and urge him to be present. Come out yourself at 8 o'clock prepare to push this convention to a great success.

Albany Acts.

A meeting was held at Albany to take steps to place facts before the board of engineers that is to visit Yaquina Bay.

On motion the chair appointed a committee of five to confer with like committees from other towns as to what to do and how to proceed. A committee of ten was also appointed to gather facts and figures as to the resources and probable shipping from territory contiguous to the harbor.

The first committee consisted of Messrs. W. C. Tweedale, S. A. Dawson, J. N. Duncan, J. J. Gorham, and J. W. Cusick. Second committee: C. C. Hogan, L. Filson, S. E. Young, S. N. Steel, C. H. Stewart, A. Hackleman, J. E. Brown, J. R. Whitney, J. K. Weatherford and C. B. Wilsa.

Mayor Bishop at Salem has been notified and has begun the work of gathering statistics of commerce interested in maintaining an open harbor at Yaquina Bay.

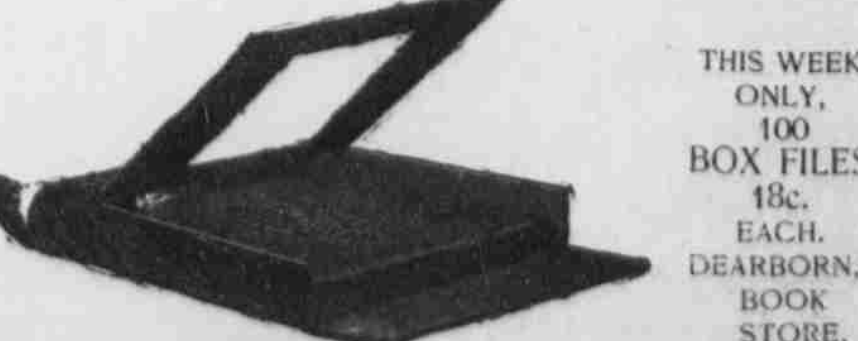
