For ANNEXATION.

Want the United States to Take the Leeward Islands.

New York, April 8.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: State department officials are watching with great interest the growing sentiment among the inhabitants of Jamaica in favor of the annexation of the Leeward Islands to the United States.

It is time for the citizens of America to break the shackles of a slavish partisanship—then, and not until then, will they see the dawn of a better day growing into a noontide prosperity that will be enduring. It is time for action, and the great impediment to action is not discussion, but the want of that knowledge which is gained by discussion. Then let the people from every section consider and discuss these vital issues of the hour, to promote all wise measures of reform and to devise some means for a speedy and perfect realization of the aims and objects of this movement.

All organizations pledging co-operation shall be members of this League, and are entitled to representation in its annual conventions, as follows: Ten delegates from each national body, five delegates from each state organization, and two delegates from every other co-operating organization.

To all genuine reformers, all advocates of civil and economic rights, all friends to humanity in the struggle for life, liberty and happiness, a cordial invitation is extended to attend this convention, which will be in the nature of a general Conference composed of delegates from co-operating organizations, and volunteer representatives of all parties, the only credential required being the possession of a passport.

The general belief among public men here is that it is mainly a question as to whether Great Britain would be willing to relinquish sovereignty over the Leeward Islands in return for the Philippines. As far as the United States is concerned it is thought that public sentiment here would be entirely favorable to the trade.

On this point former Senator Faulkner, a member of the Canadian commission, said today that he doubted very much whether Great Britain would care to run counter to the opinion which would undoubtedly develop from other European countries against her acquisition of the Eastern archipelago and the consequent prestige she would gain in the Orient.

"Of course the United States would be more than willing to make the exchange." We do not want to keep the Philippines. We would like the British West Indies. They would be of immense value to us without the grave responsibilities that surround the holding of the Philippines. The Philippines on the other hand would be far more valuable to Great Britain than the Leeward Islands. They would give her an immense advantage as a military as well as a commercial standpoint over European nations in the far east. Yet I doubt if she could make the trade without running the risk of serious European complications. Great Britain is not the nation to take the initiative which would bring about such a result."

Far Western Reflections Upon the Newest Books and Periodicals.

We are indebted to the Roycroft Printing Shop of East Aurora, N. Y., for a very pretty edition of "On Going to Church" by George Bernard Shaw, presented with the compliments of the Philistine Magazine. It is like all the Roycroft books a beautiful work of the art preservative as we call printed things in hifalutin language. We have not read the book but it is no doubt a classic or Mr. Elbert Hubbard would not go to the trouble and expense of putting it on his presses and clothing it in the royal garb of the Roycrofts.

Small, Maynard & Co., Boston, have published a volume of poems selected in the "Memory of Lincoln" with an introduction by M. A. De Wolfe Howe of Bristol, Rhode Island. The poetic tributes to the "Man of the West" beginning with a sonnet in 1862 by John James Plaut and ending with one by Paul Laurence Dunbar in 1899—the poet of emancipation. All the greatest poetic production of the intervening years are given, including Lowell's commemorative ode, Walt Whitman's "O Captain, My Captain," as well as his "When Lilacs Last in the Dooryard Bloomed." Price \$1.

The Spring (April) number of the Pall Mall Magazine has for its frontispiece an exquisite photograph of a famous picture, "The Farmer's Daughter."

A second installment of Mr. C. Dana Gibson's "Sketches in Egypt," with illustration in the author's happiest vein.

Mr. G. S. Street, who, with Mr. Henley, replaces Mr. Quiller Couch, discourses on various topics "From a London Attic." Full-page plates and exquisitely illustrated poems round out an excellent number. (New York, Astor Court Building, \$3 a year.)

"Bright and welcome as the spring it symbolizes is Outing for April, laden with the season's pleasures from the 'First Strike' on its frontispiece, to its concluding poem, 'When the Brook Trout Leap.'"

The new life of the budding woods, the thrill of the songster, the purr of the snow-fed stream, the whirl of the ice-cake cycle, are all reflected on its pages. Outing appeals to a soft spot in the heart of the sportsman and the lover of nature. The illustrations are numerous and of the highest artistic merit.

The policy of The Ladies' Home Journal, of Philadelphia, in its religious department, seems to be always to engage the pen of the man most immediately prominent in the eyes of the religious world. Thus it has had the services of Mr. Beecher, Dr. Talmage, Dr. Parkhurst, Ian Maclaren, and now it will have those of Dr. Newell Dwight Hillis, the new pastor of Plymouth Church, in Brooklyn. Dr. Hillis has given the Journal a series of articles upon which he had been working for over a year previous to his Eastern call, and the first of these articles will be published in the next issue of the magazine. The series is all connected in thought, and presents the general subject of "The Secrets of a Happy Life."

The second number of the historical pamphlets published by the State University of Oregon is out and maintains the high standard set by Prof. F. G. Young, the editor. It contains a review of the various northwestern explorations and a paper by Mrs. Eva Knery Dye, of Oregon City, on the Hudson Bay company regime in Oregon. The literary quality of Prof. Young's papers is of a high order but not so great as his historical and philosophical acumen. It must have been a rare accident that such a man was ever employed in an Oregon institution where low-lived politics has played such sad havoc that the state has almost no writers or orators left. If Young continues his work he will not only make a name for himself but for the university, as there is no better research or more thorough work being done anywhere in the United States than by this same young man.

The same firm have published "Washington's Farewell Address" with a preface by Worthington Chauncey Fort of Boston, editor of the writings of George Washington. There is a fac simile page of the most famous state paper in American history dated Mt. Vernon, May 20, 1792, and addressed to the Hon. Jas. Madison, Esq. It seems he submitted a draft of this letter to Madison in April, 1792, and he probably revised it for Washington and added some suggestions. In April 1796 Washington sent the draft of the letter as revised to Hamilton. Madison being no longer his adviser, and expressed the wish that Hamilton might re-write the "Farewell Letter," and added his wish "that the whole might appear in a plain style, and be unadorned, simple and direct." He wrote out the document from topics suggested in Washington's draft with Madison's additions, and submitted it to John Jay for a final revision and it was then sent to Washington. It bore little resemblance to the original paper and Washington was not satisfied, though he liked it better than the other. He made some changes, complained of the length and then had Hamilton preface a second draft, which he

"thought more dignified on the whole and with less egotism." This he copied out in his own "hand-write," with a few omissions, "to avoid the imputation of affected modesty." It seems that the form and language were given by Hamilton, but the matter was suggested by Washington. Hamilton had put in too much studied, affected modesty, and the sagacious father of his country left out some thereof lest it might spoil the effect on the people: The old surveyor was not only a leader, a warrior, a statesman, but a literary artist, who looked quite beyond the immediate impression made by words, and studied the art of expression from the perspective at the other end of the century. The address in this edition is published in antique board style with a paper label. Price 50 cents.

In the Engineering Magazine of New York for April the builder of the Oregon, the Monterey and the Olympia—Mr. G. W. Dickie—treats "Monitor, Battleship, Cruiser and Destroyer, from the engineer's and shipbuilder's viewpoint. The article is well illustrated."

Mr. Orcutt has an excellent paper in his series on "Machine-Shop Management in Europe and America," a splendidly illustrated article by Mr. A. W. Buel presents the claims of the masonry-arch bridge and makes a strong case for the concrete-steel construction.

There are other leading articles and illustrations, and the customary Review and Index of the Engineering Press, which is presented in a still more serviceable form.

"Are Weddings Presents an Unfair Tax?" "How to get on with Husband's Relations" and "Are Good Manners a Lost Art?" are three leading subjects, discussed by a dozen or more able writers, in the Easter issue of The American Queen. The cover is a beautiful creation of an ideal picture of a lovely Puritan maiden laden with Easter lilies and surrounded with early Spring blossoms. The Easter issue is copiously and beautifully illustrated. It also contains designs in art embroidery; lessons in household sewing; a large number of special articles on subjects appertaining to woman's life and work and a department for the children.

There has been much reference in the recent cable news from Europe to the strong feeling in France against England, and so much significant allusion to the experiments which the French are making with submarine boats, that the question of the possibility of a French military force ever crossing the English channel becoming interesting. A writer in the April Cosmopolitan tells an ingenious story of the results of consummation one hundred years later of that plan which was first conceived by Napoleon when he brought his army to the plains of Boulogne in 1804. When every detail of the plan has been successfully prepared, a great fleet on the cliffs of Boulogne brings the Channel Squadron and the Prince of Wales to join in the ceremony. Insult intentionally and suddenly given by the president of the French republic leads to an immediate declaration of war, the fleet moves to engage the battleships and cruisers of the French merely serve as a decoy for their more than one thousand submarine vessels. Then follows the invasion of England by three hundred thousand French troops, all in accordance with plans carefully arranged in advance. Then follows the occupation of London. This class of speculation, while imaginary, nevertheless has some interesting points in view of existing complications.
