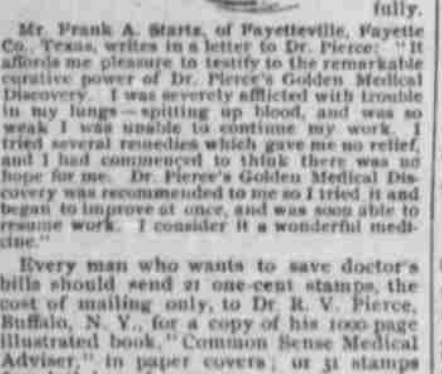

Brigham taking about \$200 a month out of Marion county as delinquent tax collector will be disgusted to learn that the case will probably be appealed to the supreme court, and cost this county hundreds of dollars before it is ended.

Mr. Brigham appeals all his cases to the supreme court, right or wrong, so long as he can stave off paying costs, and care get the county to do his lawgiving for him. In this case as in most of his cases, he forces the county clerk to appeal, and the county will have to pay costs and lawyer fees to get a decision affirmed that there is not a particle of question about it. All the farmers in Marion county would sign a petition against such an appeal.

AROUND THE EVENING LAMP.

Far Western Reflections Upon the Newest Books and Periodicals.
The April Overland will contain several articles of more than passing interest and value. Among these is a paper by Dr. John S. White, of the Berkeley School of New York, on the requirements for admission exacted by American colleges. He pleads for a uniform standard, showing that the present miscellaneous requirement subject the secondary schools to an enormous expense and loss of energy, and the students to much loss of time. The remedy he suggests and backs up with cogent arguments is raising the standards in secondary schools to something like the German Gymnasium level, thus enabling the better institutions to become universities in fact. It is an article that will provoke much discussion among schoolmen.

The Atlantic for April has some masterpieces of American composition. For instance—John Fiske on the mystery of evil—his wide philosophical sweep—and then he doesn't solve it. Cromwell, a triconcentric study is another dramatic paper.

The man who was born 300 years ago April 25th has just had his bust placed in Westminster abbey by the conservative government, the successors in form at least of the Royalists be overthrown. The reminiscences of Julia Ward Howe grow in intensity with each new issue. The reader of the Atlantic saves buying about forty of the best books of the year. After awhile these memoirs of Mrs. Howe will come out in book form and be read and reviewed and we will hear people talking about it, but to the reader it will be as a tale that is told. The Atlantic is unpretentious appearing and bears no illustrations but it contains the cream of all the literary product of our country. The price is four dollars a year but for that one will get at least ten cents each the reading of two score books that would cost to buy from \$1.50 to \$2 each, and but few of which any one person would feel able to buy. So much for the Atlantic.
