ing became passing through Casteel's room, Casteel remarked, "You are up early this morning, Mac." Oberman replied that he was not going to stay up, and soon returned, went up stairs, got his pistol, and coming down again stopped at the foot of Casteel's bed and fired three shots, all of which took effect in his victim's head, killing him instantly. Oberman then went ahead preparing breakfast, and, while out after a pair of water met Perry Duncan, a neighbor, to whom he related the particulars of the tragedy and asked him to return to the house with him.

On entering the house, Oberman took hold of the body, saying that he had better straighten it out so it would go in the coffin. He seemed anxious to have all preparations for the interment of Casteel's remains attended to, and then started about to Myrtle Creek to surrender to the sheriff.

He has never denied the killing, nor claimed that it was done in self-defense, but offered as his only justification the fact that Casteel had repeatedly threatened his life and that he lived in constant fear of him. Throughout his trial and confinement his manner has been one of stolid indifference and apparent unconcern. He has never shown any interest whatever in the proceedings, receiving his sentence without the slightest show of emotion. At the term of court, following his trial he was sentenced to hang on October 20, 1898, but his attorney secured a stay of proceedings pending a motion for a new trial. This the supreme court denied and he was re-sentenced by Judge Hamilton at the March term of 1899.

Machine Labor.

Mr. C. Wood Davis, a prominent American labor advocate, maintains that machines are enabling us to dispense with labor at such a rate that there will soon be no work left for anybody to do with two hands. Among other illustrations of the progress of labor-saving machinery he tells us that "the seed potato is cut by one machine and planted by another, while the product is dug by a third; that the self-feeder of the thrashing machine displaces two men while blast-stacks and gasoline engines will, when in general use, reduce the labor of 75,000,000 acres of grain annually in the equivalent of constant work for 150,000 men; that the two-row cultivator will displace labor in cultivating 110,000,000 acres of rowed crops in the equivalent of constant employment for 130,000 men; that in the pastoral regions the hand shearer has been displaced by machines making 3,000 clips per minute."

NEW TEMPLE

First of Its Kind Built in the South.

Christian Scientists Dedicate at Atlanta.

Message Read From Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy.

The church, which is on West Baker street, is very handsome and imposing. It is built of Georgia granite so arranged as to give an impression of marble. On the inside the edifice is harmoniously completed, white and pink marble forming the material decorations, the organ loft and reader's desk being especially ornate. There is a handsome bronze pedestal just below the organ loft, where Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, Pleasant View, Concord, N. H., March 30.

Then followed hymns, addresses by other members, readings from the Bible, and the usual concluding exercises.

The first Christian Science chapter was organized here in 1892. Since then, under the auspicious management of Mrs. Mims, the faith has grown by leaps and bounds until it numbers some of the most prominent people in the city among its membership. The fund with the exception of \$1000, for the erection of the temple was raised among the immediate members of the congregation. The new religion has been attacked by pulpits and press, and openly expressed opposition accompanied every step made by the scientists in the direction of their new church. When its necessity was fully appreciated the members of the church set to work to accumulate the required funds, and more than \$20,000 has come into the church treasury in the last few years.

Of the members of the congregation few of them are wealthy people, but they have all given with a spirit and generosity indicative of their great earnestness and their desire to build a church that should for all time be a monument to the first congregation of Christian Scientists in this section of the country, as well as being a medium, as they hope, for the more general dissemination of the principles of that religion.
