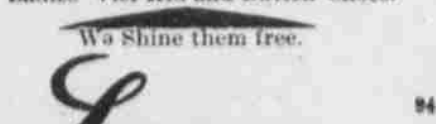

WARDNER STRIKE.

An Unamerican Revolt.

Striking Miners Blow Up Mills and Kill a Man.

Regular Army Will Be Sent to Restore Order.

Striking miners at Wardner, Idaho, blew up a stamp mill Saturday night and destroyed a large amount of valuable property.

All social events are called off, and the public school has been closed because of the excitement and animosities existing among the pupils.

The body of John Smith, the striker, who was mistaken for a nonunion man and shot by his brother at long distance, was taken up to Burke, but Coroner France has ordered it back to Wallace.

The strikers declare that if Assistant Manager Burbridge had been caught it was arranged to tie him on the mill and blow him up with it.

Hospital organized for care of destitute miners who are now coming out of the interior. So far as the destitute are concerned, the worst is over."

JEFFERSON CYCLE CLUB.

Will Test the Constitutionality of the Bicycle Tax Law.

There will be a meeting of the Jefferson Cycle club this evening to raise funds to test the new law and hear a report of the committee appointed at a previous meeting to employ counsel.

The Jefferson committee have employed J. K. Weatherford, of Albany, to bring a suit to enjoin collection of the tax on the ground of unconstitutionality, as no special law can be enacted governing the use of highways.

Huddlestone, president of the club estimates that there are 250 to 300 wheelmen and women. The Linn county cyclists will assist to test the law, as they are interested in knowing their rights to ride through Marion county.

The Jefferson cycle club believe that the cycle tax is all to be spent on roads leading out of Salem and on plans that will not be far-reaching.

DEWEY DAY

Made National Holiday.

Flags Flying and Cannons are Boomed at Salem.

The Day Observed in All the States and Islands.

Dewey day at Salem was ushered in by firing of cannons at daylight, flags flying at the public buildings, school houses and at THE JOURNAL office where a flag flies on all patriotic occasions, or when there is important news to promulgate.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—The first anniversary of the battle of Manila bay was ushered in today by the firing of cannon and the ringing of bells. All the public buildings, commercial houses and residences were decorated with the national colors, and on every side were displays of patriotism.

MAUCH CHEUK, Pa., May 1.—By premature discharge of a cannon at the celebration of Dewey Day, three persons were badly injured.

PHILADELPHIA, May 1.—Dewey day was celebrated with imposing pomp and ceremony. The most important event was a naval parade on the Delaware river.

Throughout the state celebrations are being held in honor of the hero of Manila bay. BOSTON, May 1.—Dewey day was celebrated by display of flags and receptions by patriotic societies.

NEW YORK, May 1.—Dewey day was celebrated in the public schools by exercises commemorating the victory of Manila.

NEW YORK, May 1.—This morning President McKinley visited the navy yard. All officers on duty at the yard lined up in full dress. While at the navy yard the President sent the following message to Dewey:

"On the anniversary of your great victory, the people of the United States unite in expressions of affection and gratitude to yourself and the brave officers and men whose brilliant achievement marked an epoch in history which will live in the annals of the world's heroic deeds."

CHICAGO, May 1.—The celebration of Dewey day was mostly of an indoor character. In schools an hour was set aside for appropriate exercises in honor of the first anniversary of the battle of Manila bay.
