SCIO VS. STAYTON.

One of the Hottest Contests Between Two Race Horses Ever Held in Oregon.

Last Saturday at 1 p. m. a second race was made to pull off the horse race that had been advertised to come off between the running horse from Stayton and a horse from Scio. The Stayton horse was imported from Eastern Oregon, and brought there to settle the old score and get even with Scio, it is claimed, which crowd and horse defeated a Stayton horse and badly demoralized the purses of some of the Staytonites. There was \$200 a side deposited in the Scio bank. The two horses entered the track at 1 o'clock and continued to jockey until 6:30.

There was probably more excitement in the little town it occupied than ever before in its history. It is estimated that at least 400 riders were on the scene, coming from Linn and Marion counties, and many were as wild as Indians with excitement. They rode through the little town in groups, yelling themselves hoarse.

On the final go the Stayton horse got off in the lead and won the race by a scratch of about a foot. Scio refused to give up the money, claiming that the start was not a fair one. The Linn county school fund will be \$400 ahead, as, according to our state law, all disputed bets revert to the school fund. It is now said that an effort is being made to have the race come off at Salem at the fair ground, with some show of success. It is thought that judges can be procured here that can start the horses off correctly and without any self-interest.

Funeral of Grandpa Albert.

At his request, there was no funeral sermon over the remains of the late Eben Taylor Albert, who was buried on Sunday at 2 o'clock, from his home on the corner of Winter and Mill streets. The funeral was a very simple one, conducted by Rev. Ketchum in the presence of four generations of the family and many friends who could not enter the house. Many more went to the cemetery, where the remains were consigned to the earth with prayer and burial service.

The pall bearers were J. M. Martin, John Moir, Sr., P. H. Raymond and A. O. Condit, brother elders of the church with Mr. Albert; H. V. Matthews, who also served as an elder with Mr. Albert, and D. F. Brown, of the asylum farm, a fellow-townsmen of the deceased at Winchester, Va. At the cemetery the grave was literally covered with flowers, of which Grandpa Albert was so fond. Beautiful floral emblems were sent in by admiring friends. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in this city from a private house.

Americans Have Not Yet Presented the Arbitration Proposed

THE HAGUE, May 29.—A brief official record of the doings of the peace conference during the week says:

"Provisional proposals for mediation and arbitration have been submitted by the representatives of Russia, Great Britain, Italy and the United States." The correspondent of the Associated Press learns that the statement that the Americans had submitted the arbitration proposal was incorrect. Their proposals for a permanent tribunal are not ready, as a French translation is necessary.

There was much animation in the lobbies of the palace but the crowds in the vicinity were not large. Extensive military precautions have been taken to preserve order inside and outside the building. The court room is filled with Parisian celebrities. Many judges belonging to other courts are among those present and absolute tranquility prevails.

SEVERE STORMS.

Central Western States Severely Scourged With Storms.

CHICAGO, May 29.—Since last Friday, the states of Nebraska, South Dakota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Northern Illinois, have experienced a series of the most violent storms known in years, resulting in the loss of nearly a dozen lives and doing damage to property and crops amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Yesterday tornadoes were reported from Hastings, Central City and Beatrice, Neb.; Keswick, Dow, Mingo, Fond and Tama, Iowa, and Bijou Hills, South Dakota.

At the latter place seven lives were lost and two fatally injured. Near Keswick Iowa, five persons were injured, one fatal. In Hamilton county, Nebraska, \$100,000 damage was done by wind.

Michigan was also swept yesterday by a severe electrical storm, many houses in St. Joseph and Benton Harbor and vicinity were struck by lightning.
