Will Come to Salem June 11th. A Great
Time Assured.

The Conductors Annual Excursion
which comes to Salem again this year
on Sunday, June 11th, promises to be
fully up to the standard set in former
years.

One would naturally suppose that if
any body knew how to run a railroad
excursion successfully it would be the
railroad conductors, and the record
proves it.

This year, trains will run from all
points in the Willamette Valley, east
and west sides, and the fare will be
only \$1 from all points.

WILL TAKE OUR COXES.

Dr. I. D. Driver's Opinions On the Ac-
quisition of Philippine Islands.

After remarking incidentally that the
inmates of the Oregon penitentiary were
less criminal than the last legislature in
taking pay to the hold-up legislature,
and that football caused the death of 28
college students last year, while all the
bulldozers in Spain killed only two, and
that it would take Oregon 25 years to re-
gain its prestige and influence in na-
tional affairs, and making a few other
offhand remarks more or less com-
plimentary, Dr. I. D. Driver, state senator
from Lane county, said the acquisition
of the Philippines would present a
bloody revolution in our country.

"Free land is gone. There was no
place for the people to move to. Cuba
and the Philippines will take our Coxey
armies. At present this is the hardest
country in the world to live in. We are
receiving the surplus population of Eu-
rope and have no place for them. They
are filling our asylums and penitentiaries,
and the rest of the people are taxed to
death to take care of them.

THE MORMON DANGER.

Remarkable Address at the San Francisco
Baptist Conference.

Rev. H. B. Steelman, pastor of the
First Baptist church, of Salt Lake, Utah,
delivered an able address on "The Ag-
gressive Attitude of Mormonism." He
spoke in part as follows:

"At no time has Mormonism been in
the prosperous condition it is today, and
it is growing more and more aggressive.
Word has been sent out by the heads of
the pernicious faith in Utah that the
Mormon church is about to put two
traveling missionaries in every county
in every state in this country. There
are at present 400 missionaries in the
field, and during the past year they held
71,000 meetings, gave away 167,000
tracts, and 145,000 books. In that time
they have baptized 1,225 people. They
are everywhere. In our colleges, in our
universities, all over the country. They
are preaching the veiled doctrine, and
when the veil is lifted it is found that it
is not God, but Adam, they are preach-
ing. What man is, God once was. Adam
is the only father with which the world
will have anything to do. Jesus Christ
was a man, and what men ought to be.
That is the teaching that they are
pushing with prodigious energy. They
make claims of great progress, but
no more evidence of it can be found any-
where than the state adjoining Utah.

"I predict that if it makes the same
progress in the next five years as it has
in the past five years, Mormonism will
have secured the balance of power in
these states and become a controlling
factor in congress. Congress tells us that
Mormonism is only a local question. It
is not. It is a question that concerns
the entire nation. It is of vital impor-
tance to our political foundation and the
basic principles of our constitution.

"You ask if polygamy is being taught?
Yes; polygamy is being taught today
with as much aggressiveness as it was
before the manifesto of 1890; as it was
when Utah begged to be admitted as a
state. The president of one of the lead-
ing Mormon societies made the state-
ment a few months ago in Logan temple
that the women of Utah, as the result
of polygamy, were out-heroding Herod,
in order to keep out of prison. I would
not make this statement did I not be-
lieve it to be true. But I must add, and
I thank God I am able to do so, that
there are pure and noble women among
them. Women, living in polygamy, car-
ried away by the waywardness of their
feelings and the hidden poison in their false
beliefs.

"As to the fight against B. H. Roberts
to prevent him from being seated in con-
gress, I want to say that it is not a re-
ligious fight. It is a fight against a man
who is living publicly as a polygamist;
living in open violation of the law of the
country. He has no right to debauch
women, to seduce women, to ruin the
queens of our homes. All the people of
this country should arise as one and in-
sist upon him being turned out.

"The question is asked if the Chris-
tians in Utah have ever succeeded in
converting members of the Mormon be-
lief. I want to say to the American peo-
ple in answer: No. The gospel has
never been taken to the Mormon. Here
is a work for missionaries. Send them
out, help them to stamp out this poison-
ous belief from our country."
