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EDITORIAL REVIEW.

Fully ten thousand delegates and visitors have already arrived for the biennial meeting of the head camp of the Modern Woodmen of America, which was called to order in Kansas City, Monday, and continues in session five days. The largest delegations are from Illinois, Wisconsin, Kansas, Michigan, Missouri, Washington, Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Oregon, West Virginia and Wyoming. The headquarters of the head camp were opened with Lieutenant Governor William A. Northcott, of Illinois, head counsel of the order, in charge.

Aside from the election of officers and the transaction of other business of a routine character, the present convention will have a great many important questions to consider, the most prominent being the extending of the jurisdiction of the order to include Colorado, California, Utah and Oklahoma, on the west, and New York, New Hampshire and several other desirable eastern states. Other questions of vital interest to the order which will be discussed and acted upon include the following: To adopt a standard emblem for the society; to consider the petition to admit Chicago to the jurisdiction; to consider the advisability of admitting women to membership, and to amend and adjust the laws of the order relating to soldiers during time of war.

A number of canvases are being held in support of candidates for national officers at the election to be held Wednesday. Talks with prominent members indicate that Head Consul Northcott and a number of others now holding office will be re-elected without opposition. The principal contest will be for the office of head banker, now held by George N. Pratt, of Racine, Wis. There are half a dozen candidates for the place, those most prominently mentioned being Charles Crocker, of Iowa and L. C. Elbert, of Missouri. A contest has also developed for the office of head clerk, of which Charles W. Hawes of Rock Island, Ill., is a candidate for re-election. Thursday will be the big day of the convention. In the morning there will be a big parade with more than 20,000 men in line, and a picnic in the afternoon. William J. Bryan is scheduled as the orator of the day. In the evening a grand ball will be given in the convention hall. The remainder of the week will be devoted to sessions of the head camp and competitive drills.

The fourth annual convention of the Colorado State Federation of Labor opened at Denver Monday with an attendance of over 200 delegates representing half a hundred unions with a total membership of 10,000. President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor delivered one of the opening addresses and was given an enthusiastic reception by the convention. The sessions are expected to continue several days. A part of the work of the meeting will be to discuss proposed laws for the betterment of the conditions of members of organized labor. Another feature will be the adoption of strong resolutions urging a six-day week for all trades. During their stay in Denver the visitors will be handsomely entertained by the local labor organizations.

The result of this system is that our city is running over with boys and girls on the streets, scarcely out of snickerbockers and short dresses who have "finished" their public school education, who have a "good common school education," as they and their parents imagine, when in reality they had just got to the point where education began to make some impression on them, and should have remained in school for four to six years longer. The argument is that those who want higher education will get it at the colleges. But is that true? Is not the attendance at colleges notoriously small in Oregon and composed largely of children that in other states are still in the public schools? Let us face the facts and act honestly, fearlessly and intelligently for the upbuilding of the Salem public schools until they are second to none in the state. At the last graduating exercises in this city, which are held each year in the middle of the winter, for God knows why, there was not read an original essay, or delivered an original oration--the program was music not taught in the public schools and recitation of essays not taught there. At graduating exercises in all other Oregon cities none but original essays or orations are delivered. Beyond a few principals who have a good knowledge of literature and ability to judge an original composition, Salem schools have few higher teachers who possess the ability to make their pupils good writers or orators. Is this desirable or creditable? To be employed as principal a man or woman did not need this ability. They did need to be able to command the backing of the political push and the result was that push politics was a greater factor than literary ability, or real ability to make our schools creditable. The people have twice revolted as present politics in their schools and the present board of education ought to begin to realize that in the higher grades of public school work our schools are demanding something better. The primary departments of our schools are doing very fair work. An excellent grade of teachers, mostly with established reputations for doing good primary work have been employed, and they have been allowed some freedom to do their best work in their own way. That is just what should be done in hiring principals. Because a man or his family have had a political pull in the past is no reason why our schools should be kept behind and pulled down lower and lower in their standing in the state. The best principals obtainable for the money Salem can pay should be employed regardless of geography, politics or religion of applicant. Then let him or her be free to do the best work he or she is capable of for our children.

GRADUATING RECITAL.
Two Pupils of the College of Oratory Entertain Their Friends.
The university chapel was jammed Monday night with not less than five hundred people, who were well repaid for physical discomfort by the excellent program carried out by Mrs. Ella Royal Williams and Miss LaBlanche Belle, graduates, assisted by professor Edward Tilson of the College of Music, Miss Leona Hirsch, the Cardinal Quartet, and Miss Claireta Dumas and Miss Lelo Nicklin, pupils of the College of Music.

The program as published in Monday's Journal was carried out without a hitch and every number was good. The first number a piano solo by Prof. Edward Tilson, though it was a little too highstrung for a common low-grade reporter, showed thorough mastery of the instrument. The three numbers by Mrs. Ella Royal Williams were excellently rendered, and showed finish, self-possession and careful training in the art of expression. "Jamie" and "The Going of the White Swan," were of much the same order and called for feeling and dramatic action, while "Ethelinda's Recitation" was in the humorous vein. The audience hardly seemed to rise to the last, however, being apparently unfamiliar with the originals of Ethelinda's parodies, except "The Boy Stood on the Burning Deck."

Miss LaBlanche Belle in "Scorching Versus Diamond" and "Hager" displayed great versatility, for the two are in widely varying vein. The first, a lively and humorous sketch, was excellently rendered. The last, recited in costume, called for dramatic expression of a high order, yet it was rendered in a manner worthy of the highest praise. The young lady has a clear, flexible and expressive voice, over which she has perfect control, and her training has not, as is too often the case, eliminated the appearance of natural spontaneity in her delivery. In other words, she has not fallen into a rut. She can take her place among the most satisfactory and pleasing of our finished elocutionists. Her pantomime, "Jesus-Lover of My Soul," was a beautiful conception beautifully carried out, and the effect was heightened by the touching sweetness of the singing behind the scenes by members of the Cardinal Quartette.

The first encore was called forth by Miss Claireta Dumas's violin solo, which showed careful training and the natural artistic touch. The Cardinal Quartette were also engaged when they sang a welcome to the belated spring, in excellent voice, and they responded with "Cello No. 1." This quartette is deservedly popular and its work constantly improves.

The chapel was tastefully decorated with the class colors, purple and white, and the class flower, the lily. Another pleasing feature of the affair was in the compliance of the ladies of the audience in the highly commendable custom of removing their hats.

SPEECH BY MRS. EDDY.

Features of the Meeting of the Christian Scientists at Boston.
Boston, June 6.--The followers of Christian Science yesterday observed communion day with largely attended services at the mother church, the First Church of Christian Scientists.

The annual message of the pastor emeritus, Mary Baker Eddy, was read by John Reeder, and listened to with great interest. Following are extracts: "We thank the giver of all good for the marvelous speed of the chariot wheels of truth and for the steadfast, calm coherence in the ranks of Christian Science."

"On comparison it will be found that Christian Science possesses more of Christ's teachings and example than all other religions since the first century. "We should thank God for persecutions and for persecution, if thereby ensue a purer Protestantism and monotheism for the latter days of the 19th century. The forts of Christian Science, garrisoned by God's chosen ones, can never surrender."

"I reluctantly foresee great danger threatening our nation; imperialism, monopoly and a lax system of religion. But the spirit of humanity, ethics and Christianity sown broadcast--all constants of Christian Science--is taking strong hold of the public throughout our beloved country and foreign lands, and is tending to counteract the trend of Madame Byron."
