CIRCUIT COURT.

Department No. 1 Winds Up the Business of the February Term.

Judge Burnett held a short session of Department No. 1, Tuesday morning and disposed of all cases that could be handled at the adjourned February term, and adjourned court.

Following are the docket entries made:

John Dorcas vs. H. G. Wright et al; action for money. Plaintiff's motion to modify findings of referee and to file amended complaint and defendant's motion to set aside findings, argued.

L. H. McMahon vs. Canadian Pacific Railway; action for money. Application of plaintiff for leave to file amended complaint allowed by consent and defendant allowed until Thursday June 8, 1909 to answer amended complaint.

F. H. Lechler vs. A. D. Hall; appeal from justice court. Plaintiff has leave by consent to file new undertaking. Plaintiff's motion for leave to file amended reply overruled. Defendant's motion to dismiss appeal overruled. Defendant's motion for judgment on pleadings argued.

In the other two corresponding cases, in which O. Pomeroy and C. C. Hall respectively were defendants, the entries were the same as above.

ASYLUM BOARD DOINGS.

A Few Wood Bids Accepted—Heavy Mortality for May.

The superintendent report for May shows 21 deaths, 2 elopements, and 22 patients received, and a total attendance of 1174. Per capita expense, per month, \$9.65 34-100; per day \$1 14-100 cents. Pay roll for month, \$5,492.23; total expense \$11,388.57.

The Quartzville Mines.

W. F. Lawler of Quartzville, the big mining man of the Santiam gold mining district, was in Salem yesterday to look after some business matters. He came down from Quartzville about ten days ago and on account of the heavy fall of snow last winter, great quantities of which are still lying in the mountains. Mr. Lawler, accompanied by Mrs. Lawler and a small party, was compelled to make a wider detour in coming out, going around by the way of the south fork of the Santiam, a distance of sixty miles. He says the snow is still very deep in the mountains and it will take some time before it goes out.

The Lawler mines are not being operated at the present time, as the machinery on hand cannot be used in low grade ore profitably, but the company back of Mr. Lawler may decide to secure new machinery and resume the operation of the works at Quartzville in which case the camp will again be a most busy one. Mr. Lawler says there are a few prospectors in the district surrounding Quartzville. Mr. and Mrs. Lawler spent the winter in the camp, and expect to return there in the course of a few weeks. During the winter months they were entirely isolated and cut off from civilization and for weeks at a time were without mail or other news of the outside world.

M'CORMICK EXONERATED.

School Board Transacts a Volume of Business—Teachers Design.

At the regular meeting of the board of School District No. 24 Monday evening, after deliberate consideration the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Whereas, certain charges of improper conduct were some time since made against A. A. McCormick, late janitor of the North school, and at that time it was deemed best in order to avoid friction and neighborhood difficulty in said school, that the resignation of Mr. McCormick as such janitor be accepted, as tendered by himself, and

"Whereas, said action of resignation and acceptance may be liable to a misinterpretation as injurious to the character of Mr. McCormick, be it

"Resolved, That the board take this opportunity to exonerate said A. A. McCormick from any guilt under said charges, there having been no evidence brought forward sustaining the charge of improper or immoral conduct on his part."

A special meeting of the board for the election of teachers was called for Saturday evening, June 17, and all teachers desiring re-election were notified to file formal applications accordingly.

The resignations of Mrs. M. C. Mathison, Miss Pohl and Miss Helen Griffith were received and accepted.

The district clerk reported having received \$100 due from Mr. Reeves for the block of ground in South Salem. He also reported about \$400 surplus cash in hand, and was ordered to liquidate outstanding notes to that amount.

RATHER FISHY

IT APPEARS that Oregon lawmakers are adopting the European gentry methods for fishing.

Also in the game laws, instead of allowing certain months to catch trout and other food fish, where everybody would have the right to purchase them from the expert fishermen, the people are excluded, and many of them cannot get a look or taste of a trout while others have them by the hundreds.

Friedman would suggest that this kind of law-makers that would be guilty in passing an act making a law, where a person at certain months is allowed to catch trout, unrestricted as to the number he may catch, and yet he dare not sell to any one, he must either devour them all or give them away to some of his friends, that this kind of law-makers, should first serve a term in the school for idiots, at least three years before they are sent to represent the people of Oregon. What business is it to the members of the Legislature or the people of Oregon, whether the sport is allowed to go out fishing and he catches from a hundred and fifty to three hundred trout, whether he eats all of them himself or sells some to the fish markets, and they in turn, retail them out to the people.

But the law-makers said no. Now if

Friedman wants a mess of trout and is not an expert fisherman himself he has to go through the ceremonies of bribing the fisherman or adopting the same methods of a man running for United States senator. I wonder if some of the idiots who passed the law can see into it?

Also certain months persons are allowed to shoot so many birds, not over twenty. Now if a man can kill five twenties, what is to hinder the person who shoots twenty birds to hiring five boys with blind guns, each carrying a sack with nineteen birds. This kind of law is good for Russia, where only a certain class are allowed to catch fish, and only a few persons are allowed to shoot birds. Now Oregon don't want that kind of laws. It must be either forbidden to catch certain fish or kill certain birds; for all persons, or when it is allowed to be caught or killed, those months or days, people should have the privilege of buying or selling them.

It is hoped that the people of Oregon will send men to the Legislature that would take the interest of the state to heart and repeal the worthless, foolish and idiotic laws as to how and when trout should be caught and make such a law as all people of Oregon would have an equal share in the fish or fishes in which our rivers and brooks abound, and in the birds of the air in this God's

country. Away with the selfish laws that would give only a few sports the advantage.

What if Friedman's New Racket, corner State and Commercial streets

was to be restricted by an act of the Legislature, that only certain favored classes should have the privilege of purchasing goods there.
