

nved at Salem for Burial, The morning San Francisco overland train brought to Salem the remains of Private Albert E. Dennis, of Manila, for burial. The casket, enclosed in a burial case, was taken to the First Congregational church.

The family in this city, Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Dennis, were notified by telegram at 6 o'clock Tuesday evening. This telegram from the depot quartermaster at Frisco was the first and the only inforshipping home of their son's remains. The telegram was as follows:
