NEW BOND ELECTION.

Called for June 28th By the City Council.

Sunday Closing Demanded—\$8,000 Offered for Control of Liquor Business.

The city council met in regular session Tuesday evening. Mayor Bishop in the chair. Present Councilmen Boren, Burrows, Griswold, Riggs, Walker.

The committee on streets and public property reported that the city's building on State street had been rented to A. I. Wagner at \$15 per month. Approved.

Liquor licenses were ordered issued to G. L. Neal and C. P. Talkington.

The usual monthly report of Recorder Judah was adopted.

Applications for liquor licenses were made by Aug. Schreiber, Bach, and Nadstank. Upon motion the unexpired license of A. E. Dugney was transferred to F. Goulet.

Upon motion the use of the council chamber was granted to the state board of horticulture June 9 and 10.

A Sunday closing petition, signed by about 150 citizens was presented to the council.

In compliance with the above petition the following resolution was adopted.

SALEM, Or., June 6, 1899.
Resolved, By the common council of the City of Salem, that it is the sense of this body, that the ordinance providing for the closing of the saloons in this city on Sunday, should be carefully and regularly observed, and to this end, the city marshal is hereby requested to give the matter his immediate official attention, in compliance with the petition filed with this council.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The charter of the City of Salem, Oregon, approved by the governor on February 17, 1899, does, at section 23 thereof, confer upon the common council of the said city, full power and authority, (the consent of the taxpayers, paying tax upon property in said city, voting at an election called for that purpose, being first had and obtained, to issue bonds, payable on or before 10 years and at a rate of interest not exceeding 4 1/2 per cent per annum, not to exceed \$100,000.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this council that the best interests of this city require that a bond issue, as therein provided for, shall take place, and to that end, this council does hereby, order, and call, a special election, by the taxpayers paying tax upon property in said city, for a special election, to take place in the city of Salem, Or., on Monday, the 26th day of June 1899, between the hours of 10 o'clock a. m. and 4 o'clock p. m. of said day, and it is further ordered by this council that the following places be, and they are hereby designated as, for polling places, at said special election, to-wit:

First Ward, No. 3 Engine House, Liberty street.
Second Ward—A. J. Basy's stable, Court street.
Third Ward—J. L. Friesland's store, State street.
Fourth ward—Ulrey's stables, Commercial street.

And it is further ordered by this council, that the following named citizens of this city, be, and they are hereby, designated and appointed to act as judges and clerks, at said special election, to-wit:

First Ward—C. M. Parmenter, J. C. Reed, A. T. Yonson.
Second Ward—J. H. Campbell, A. J. Basy, H. Goodell.
Third Ward—G. Steiner, Wm. Manning, G. G. Van Wagner.
Fourth Ward—G. A. Roskell, P. J. Larsen, A. F. McAtee.

And the city recorder is hereby ordered to post and publish the notices of said special election, as required by the Charter.

The following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The season is approaching when nuisances of all sorts, in streets, alleys and yards of a city become more and more pronounced and menacing, and every rule of sanitation demands a thorough cleaning of the same; Now therefore be it

Resolved, That this council, in behalf of the general health of the City of Salem, does hereby order all nuisances abated, and that the streets, alleys and private premises be cleaned and purified, and that these things be done forthwith by the owners of real property, by the 30th day of July, 1899, and be it further

Resolved, That on and after said date, all premises not so cleaned and put in healthful condition, will be inspected and reported by the city marshal and street commissioner of this city, and said work shall be done by the City of Salem, at the charge and expense of the property and premises so cleaned by said city.

The following resolution by Alderman Boren was adopted:

Whereas, Numerous complaints are reaching the members of this body, of the ill effects of the presence of women in the saloons of the city, therefore be it

Resolved, That the city marshal be and he is hereby, ordered to see that no woman be admitted into any saloon in the city of Salem, Oregon, after the 1st day of July, 1899.

RATHER FISHEY

IT APPEARS that Oregon lawmakers are adopting the European gentry methods for fishing.

Also in the game laws, instead of allowing certain months to catch trout and other food fish, where everybody would have the right to purchase them from the expert fishermen, the people are excluded, and many of them cannot get a look or taste of a trout while others have them by the hundreds.

Friedman would suggest that this kind of law-makers that would be guilty in passing an act making a law, where a person at certain months is allowed to catch trout, unrestricted as to the number he may catch, and yet he dare not sell to any one, he must either devour them all or give them away to some of his friends, that this kind of law-makers, should first serve a term in the school for idiots, at least three years before they are sent to misrepresent the people of Oregon. What business is it to the members of the Legislature or the people of Oregon, whether the sport is allowed to go on fishing and he catches from a hundred and fifty to three hundred trout, whether he eats all of them himself or sells some to the fish-markets, and they in turn, retail them out to the people.

But the law-makers said no. Now if

Friedman wants a mess of trout and is not an expert fisherman himself he has to go through the ceremonies of bribing the fisherman or adopting the same methods of a man running for United States senator. I wonder if some of the idiots who passed the law can see into it?

Also certain months persons are allowed to shoot so many birds, not over twenty. Now if a man can kill five twenties, what is to hinder the person who shoots twenty birds to hiring five boys with blind guns, each carrying a sack with nineteen birds. This kind of law is good for Russia, where only a certain class are allowed to catch fish, and only a few persons are allowed to shoot birds. Now Oregon don't want that kind of laws. It must be either forbidden to catch certain fish or kill certain birds; for all persons, or when it is allowed to be caught or killed, those months or days, people should have the privilege of buying or selling them.

It is hoped that the people of Oregon will send men to the Legislature that will take the interest of the state to heart and repeal the worthless, foolish and idiotic laws as to how and when trout should be caught and make such a law as all people of Oregon would have an equal share in the fish or fishes in which our rivers and brooks abound, and in the birds of the air in this God's

country. Away with the selfish laws that would give only a few sports the advantage.
