SMASHED AN ITALIAN.

Offensive Epithets Don't Go With Dining Room Girls in America.

One of The Turtle Theatrical Company Is Taught a Lesson in the Hotel Willamette.

Signor Perugini of New York, leading actor with The Turtle theatrical company had a glass of water smashed in his face by one of the dining room girls at Hotel Willamette, Wednesday evening.

The Italian seemed to be hard of hearing and did not understand a reply to a question, so he saw fit to employ an offensive epithet to Mrs. Alma Thomas, when quick as a flash she smashed him in the face with a tumbler of water.

The missile bounded against the wall and broke in pieces. The dining room was all excitement. The travelling men and all other guests were on their feet and expressed their contempt for the Italian's conduct by cries of "put him out," "mob him," until they made it so hot for Perugini he left.

He did not go in to breakfast this morning but came down late and went out of the side door.

Manager Holland of the Turtle Company sent Signor Perugini a note demanding that he make an apology or receive a thrashing, which anyone of the Americans who witnessed this startling scene were ready to administer.

After the theatre there was quite a crowd gathered at the hotel to administer a roast and something more substantial unless he made the amende honorable. To the credit of the Turtle Company, it should be said that they conducted themselves as ladies and gentlemen and entirely repudiate the conduct of the Italian.

Landlord Connor prides himself on the efficiency and all-around level-headed ladylike conduct of his dining room force. Mrs. Thomas is a general favorite and everybody approves of her prompt method of resenting an insult.

If Signor Perugini gets out of town without an apology or a thrashing he will be lucky. He has received a lesson in manners that all deserve to learn who imagine that they can treat with insolence an American woman because she happens to earn her living by honest industry.

Mrs. Thomas today swore out a complaint before Judge Judah, who issued a warrant for Perugini, charging him with disturbing the peace. Chief of Police Gibson served the warrant on the Italian at Hotel Willamette.

The following witnesses have been summoned: J. M. Lambert, Claud Grath, S. A. Judah and J. M. Mackie. Others will be called if necessary. The trial is set for 4 o'clock this afternoon.

THE FIRST FALLEN.

Capital City People Pay the Last Respects to a Manila Hero

Who Served With Honor in Both the Salvation Army and the Minnesota Volunteers.

There was a gathering of Salem's most patriotic people at the First Congregational church Wednesday at 3 p. m. to pay their respects to the first fallen hero to be returned from the Philippines for burial.

There was a large squad of G. A. R. Veterans present, Indian War Veterans volunteers and members of the Light Battery, and Ladies of the patriotic orders.

The casket was beautifully draped in the national colors and many friends brought bouquets and wreaths in honor of the departed, who was "only a private" and an entire stranger in this community.

After reading of scripture, prayer, and a song by the quartet, Rev. Kantner spoke from the text:

"I have fought a good fight. I have kept the faith." Today there came to this city a new experience. A train of late experiences formed a bow that spanned the distance and Oregon and the Philippines were nearer than ever before. This was the first striking, emphatic illustration of what warfare means.

Here was one who went forth strong and patriotic and laid down his life for the old flag. He was a soldier not only in the army of the United States but in the Salvation Army where he performed the duties of an officer. In a double sense this was a bereavement, of the flag, of country and of Christ.

In his remarks Rev. Kantner declared his belief in the war waged against Spain. He believed in American rule in the Philippine Islands. We were there in the Providence of God. This young man went there to make positive and permanent the victory won by Dewey. In spite of our wishes for peace, the fruit of victory must be made secure by continuing the war to complete success in the Philippines. In the presence of death all differences about the war melted away and we felt the difference only between those who lived a life of wickedness or one of religious experience.

This young man found in the service of Christ and his country the highest satisfaction, and what comfort and joyousness there was in a career brought to such a conclusion. This soldier was mastered out of service with the most honorable discharge. The Christ he served and the country he served was most worthy of our service. He gave himself to Christ and country and remained loyal to both causes. No prouder record could be left by any man than loyalty to a high and noble type and manhood.

Dr. Davidson, of Manila, who attested the certificate of death, was a pupil of Rev. Kantner at Lafayette seminary.

The service closed with a prayer by Ensign Davis, of the local Salvation Army.

The music for the occasion was furnished by H. S. Gile, W. T. Jenks, C. W. Kantner and E. Hilty.

The bearers of the pall were six returned volunteers, H. A. Johnson, Jr., Lloyd Hauer, Chas. T. Fort, Arthur D. Welch, G. W. Hunter and Clinton McCormick. Considering the brief notice of the shipment of the remains, there was a large attendance both at the church and cemetery.

Arrived at the G. A. R. lot in City View cemetery, brief services were conducted by the Grand Army post, a brief eulogistic address being made by Rev. W. E. Copeland, after which the remains were interred.

THE JOURNAL publishes the following beautiful tribute to "The Dead Soldier Boy" adapted for the occasion from Zion's Herald:

THE DEAD SOLDIER BOY.

He fell in the fierce battle,
But did not in the fray;
Upon no shout of triumph
His spirit passed away.

But weak and worn with fever,
Of camp diseases bred,
Death took him, brave young soldier,
Whom love and glory led.

A year ago—ah, pity!—
How bright and brave his dream!
He saw the banners blowing,
The bugles' notes were keen.

Then rang the longest for summons,
The beating of the drums,
Alas! the rose of glory
That he to blooming came.

The brief, proud pageant over,
In Luzon's camp they bore
The lone and weary waiting
For boys they never wore.

And there our soldier sickened;
They nursed him from his place—
No more toward fame or glory
He turned his longing face.

But died he not a hero?
Ay! Nobler of the brave.
His life, all unwarded
By victor's palm, he gave.

He sacrificed the greatest
That patriot can make—
He yielded his sweet manhood,
Uncrowned for country's sake.

Then o'er that wasted body
Our shining banner spread,
And lay a wreath of myrtle
Upon the soldier's head.

O mother, father, sweetheart,
Ye are not all who weep—
Beneath the nation's tablet
Your soldier boy shall sleep.

DIED.

At Salem, Thursday morning, June 8, Judge, C. D. Young, aged 59 years.

C. D. Young was born at Camden, Ontario, and came to this coast via the Isthmus at the age of 16, arriving in California in 1856. He followed the business of a mining expert and traveled extensively through the mining regions of the western half of the continent. He went to the Yukon country in the early days with one of the first parties that penetrated that region, and he was the only one of the party to bring away any gold, having been fortunate enough to discover a pocket.

Later he studied law and was admitted to the bar. About 1870 he went to the Puget Sound country where he spent about 16 years. He was one of the leading attorneys of that section, and occupied many positions of trust, being for several terms probate judge of Pierce county.

He was married in Salem, at the residence of John Hughes, on December 20, 1876, to Ella Pringle, and in 1880 he removed to this city and continued the practice of his profession.

At about this time, however, his health broke down and he soon retired from active practice. He has steadily failed since then, and his death was not unexpected.

Besides the widow, one son, Elbert aged 19, survives.

A private funeral will be held at the family residence in South Salem, at 2 p. m., Friday, Rev. John Parsons of the M. E. church officiating, and interment will take place in the Old Fellows cemetery.
