BRITISH SHIPS

Nearing the African Frontier.

Warships at St. Mary Island.

The Dreyfus Case Still Continues—Other Foreign News.

LONDON, June 17.—According to a dispatch to the News agency from Pretoria, British warships have arrived at St. Mary island, at the entrance of Delagoa Bay. There is a confirmation of the report.

JOHANNESBURG, June 17.—A meeting of 4,000 burghers at Parde endorsed President Kruger's attitude regarding the franchises and deprecated war. There were no disturbances.

PARIS, June 17.—In connection with the stories in the newspapers attributing to the former president, Casimir Perier, a variety of misdeeds referring to the Dreyfus affair, a curious semi-official note was issued this afternoon. It says: "Extraordinary as may seem, M. Casimir Perier, when president, was cognizant of only what he affirmed on oath before the court of cassation. As regards all rumors current concerning his acts, steps, and declarations he will give full explanation before the court material at Rennes.

LONDON, June 17.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Mail says that a workman named Montague living in Mannheim, Baden, has succeeded in manufacturing an artificial coal from earth and mineral substances.

MADRID, June 17.—Official confirmation has been received of the seizure of the yacht Firefly, at Arachon, 35 miles from Bordeaux France, with 4,000 rifles intended for Carlists.

A MURDEROUS FIEND

Kills His Mistress and Two-year-old Baby and Then Himself.

SACRAMENTO, June 17.—A Kabaka, named Ben Kahulu, shot and killed his mistress today. He also shot and badly wounded his mistress' Mrs. Lou Weimer then seized his two year-old girl and attempted to dash her brains out by throwing her against a board fence. The baby will probably die. He then turned the pistol on himself. The bullet lodged in his brain, killing him instantly.

"TURTLE" IN SAN FRANCISCO.

The Play Which Delighted New York Is Reheated in California.

Commenting upon "The Turtle," which a Salem paper assured its readers was a nice family play, and far from being the worst ever produced in Salem, the San Francisco dailies amply justify THE JOURNAL'S action in warning its readers against that filthy show. The Examiner asserts that "The Turtle" is an offense; that there is no excuse for such a stupid dramatic indecency, and adds:

"The Turtle" desecrated the Sabbath at the California Theater last night. Its proper place was at the garbage crematory.

There is no excuse for this dramatic prurience. It certainly comes within the limits of the statutes and ordinances framed to prevent offenses against decency. The unspeakable Cromorne might welcome, though it is a little too bad even for that haunt of sin and shame.

The Call also treats "The Turtle" to a pan roast. Its dramatic critic, Ashton Stevens declares:

I wouldn't take Little Egypt to see "The Turtle," the filthy French farce that was exposed in the California Theater last night. It is the most obscene brutal spectacle that I have ever witnessed in a licensed theater, and any woman who intends sitting it out would better paint her features a hot, red blush.

The most of the lines, situations and gesticular insinuations are beyond credence in a civilized community. In both writing and acting "The Turtle" is a deliberate appeal to drunken men and lewdly women, and its stench will linger long in the California Theater.

The Chronicle joins in the chorus of denunciation:

Never outside of a dive have such lines been spoken on a stage in San Francisco as were heard frequently last night in "The Turtle," at the California Theater. The advertisement of "spiciness" is an imposition. "The Turtle" is one of the commonest, coarsest, most vulgar of French farces. The only wit of its dialogue lies in the bald translation of some purely libidinous talk.

"The Turtle" is not having as smooth crawling on the coast as it counted on, says the Portland Telegram. At Battle the papers roasted it; at Spokane it was coolly received by press and people; Seattle gave it an indifferent hearing, and the Times laid it out, while at Salem a waitress at the hotel threw a glass of water in the face of the man who brought the dirty show West, because he insulted her.

No Vessels Damaged Yet.

Atrocious Murder at Dawson City.

Klondike Output Will Come Via St. Michael.

SEATTLE, June 17.—The fear that several steamers on the lower Yukon fleet would be destroyed when the ice broke has not yet been realized. Seven steamers arrived at Dawson June 3, from Rampart City, and several St. Michael steamers were daily expected.

Northwest mounted police have sent notices to miners on the various creeks that its dangerous to bring large quantities of gold to Dawson without an armed guard. It is claimed by officials that there are a large number of highwaymen in the country.

James P. Prater was murdered at Dawson, by Arthur Goddard, on May 31. Prater's head was crushed with a hatchet and his throat was cut. It is stated that the bulk of the Klondike output will come out by the way of St. Michael. The banks of Dawson are buying all the gold offered, and have a large amount stored in their vaults.

202 Dead, 15 Unaccounted For. Nearly \$1,000,000 In Property Loss.

PRATUM NOTES.

A Half-mile Bicycle Track and Race Track Just Completed.

At the Kays farm near Pratum, formerly Eger, a half mile bicycle track has just been completed by the Pratum bicycle club. Mr. A. J. Kays doing the work. The track is 20 feet wide, with high grades thrown up on the turns, the outside being three feet higher than the inside. This is the best track in the north west.
