EDITORIAL REVIEW.

The selection of an asylum superintendent for the next four years by the state board will no doubt take place in a short time. The office is a most important one, because of the large number of persons under charge and the large expenditure.

The three candidates seem to be D. A. Paine, present incumbent, ex-representative Smith of Salem and ex-senator Galbraith of Yamhill county. If reform, economy and progress are to be expected, it is not easy to see that any can be obtained by a change in suit.

While personally good fellows and reputable members of the regular business ring of the profession, who resist all reform legislation for the insane, one expects elevation of the public service, lopping off of abuses, progress in care of insane, or resistance to jobbery at their hands.

The only men in the state fit for the place, and who enjoy a reputation for doing a thing but prostituting the care of the insane to the purposes of machine politics, are men like Dr. Harry Lane or Dr. Joseph, of Portland, who at the hands of a straight Republican board could expect no consideration, and probably would not take the place subject to the political pressure that a board feels called upon at times to exercise.

The crisis in the condition in the Philippine war has been reached. The campaign there must take an immediate vigorous turn for the better prosecution of the war, the more vigorous suppression of the revolt at McKinley, or the case of McKinley, et al., is hopeless and will not be supported by the American people.

But at this critical time it is the duty of all loyal and patriotic Americans to be slow in condemning the president and his advisers. A foreign war was not on the program when McKinley was chosen to lead his party. A war with Spain was not dreamed of when McKinley chose his cabinet. When the war broke out he could not dismiss Alger, one of the men who secured him the presidency. The defeat of Bryan could only be accomplished by almost superhuman efforts at the hands of men like Hanna, Alger, Platt and others who could control the sinews of war and large blocks of corporation employees. If the McKinley administration has suffered from incompetency and corruption in high places, and mismanagement in the conduct of the war, let us be just and not put all the blame on one man or even on McKinley and Alger.

growing districts completely destroyed the carefully-guarded trees.

The dawn of the greatest day in the history of Las Vegas, New Mexico, saw the picturesque town and adjacent plains in the possession of fully 15,000 strangers who had arrived during the preceding twenty-four hours for the first annual reunion of Roosevelt's Rough Riders. Several hundred of the visitors are cowboys, miners, Indian fighters and college athletes who made up the famous cavalry regiment led by the intrepid "Teddy." The rest of the visitors includes sightseers from many parts of the country who have come to witness the reunion and the tournament of sports in which the former Rough Riders all take part.

Promptly at nine o'clock this morning the crowded streets echoed to the "assembly" sounded by Cassi, Roosevelt's noted trumpeter, just as the same trumpet and trumpet sounded the advance one year ago today in the battle of Las Guasinas. At 10 o'clock the veterans and visitors assembled for the formal opening exercises which were devoid of all unnecessary ceremony. Governor Roosevelt made the opening speech, to which Colonel Brodie, president of the association formed at Montauk last year, responded. Brief addresses were also made by Governor Otero of New Mexico, Governor Murphy of Arizona and by Lieutenant Carter. The formalities closed with the playing of patriotic airs by the military band of Chihuahua, Mexico. This afternoon there will be a review of the regiment, followed by a meeting for the election of officers and the selection of time and place for the next meeting. Colorado Springs, Goshute, O. T., El Paso, Texas and several other cities are anxious to secure next year's reunion.

The steamer Virginia left its Chicago dock for Milwaukee this morning with the heaviest load it ever carried in proportion to the number of its passengers. On board was an excursion party of 400 members of the Garden City Fat Men's Club, the smallest member of which tips the scales at 240 pounds. The excursionists propose to spend tomorrow as the guests of the brewers of Milwaukee and expect to return to Chicago with many pounds of additional avoirdupois as a result of the entertainment furnished them in the Cream City.

When the Irish athletes, who came to try conclusions with the crack athletes of America landed in New York they were greeted by a host of Irish-Americans, of Greater New York. The men are all members of the Carriker-on-Star Club, of Ireland, and each has a good record to his credit for athletic performance under the auspices of the Irish Amateur Athletic Association. The captain of the team is T. J. Kiely, who has won the all-around Irish championship for five years in succession, and who holds the score of Great Britain for throwing the 16-pound hammer, and the world's record for tossing the 56-pound weight, with unlimited run and follow. Another noted member of the team is W. J. M. Newburn, the broad jumper, who holds the present British record of 24 feet, 3 1/2 inches. The men will make their athletic debut in America in the competitions to be held July 4, under the auspices of the Knickerbocker Athletic Club.

It is thirteen years since General Ulysses S. Grant passed to his eternal rest, and this morning a number of floral wreaths were laid in and about the sarcophagus in Riverside Park as silent tributes to the memory of the dead hero.

Reports from reliable authorities throughout the peach-growing sections of the country as to the outlook for the season's yield are very disappointing, and it even looks as though the crop will be a total failure. Adverses from Texas, Missouri, Arkansas and Delaware are discouraging, but the Canadian harvest in the territory bordering on Niagara Falls is expected in a measure to redeem the season. Some of the peach-growing centers that report the crop as certain to be partly or entirely a failure include the Blue Ridge section of Maryland, southern Indiana and parts of Kentucky, the Hudson fruit district of New York, the Cumberland valley, the Shenandoah Valley and many parts of Texas. The only sections reporting favorably are New Jersey, West Virginia, Western Pennsylvania and certain districts of Michigan. The unusually poor crop is attributed by nurserymen and shippers to the cold weather of January and February, which had a general blighting effect on the crop, and in several large

positive falsehood toward Prof. Ackerman and his family. It is wrong to needlessly wound the feelings of an official's family, even though they be employed under the pernicious Oregon practice of employing relatives, a practice that is wrong, has grown into an abuse, and should in the interest of good manners and good government be abolished. When an office is given to an individual, by the people or by appointment, the official thereby gets no right to monopolize the place under him for his own family. All places are supposed to be open to every citizen on equal terms. Nepotism is un-American and abhorrent. But in reforming an abuse that extends from President to pathmaster let us not strike by innuendo and insinuation. Let us fight fair.
