CITY BONDING STARTED.

Committee Appointed to Perfect All Plans.

Further Time Asked to Consider Street Lighting Bids.

The city council met in adjourned session last evening. Mayor Bishop, Recorder Judah, and Councilmen Burrows, Buren, Griswold, Riggs and Walker present.

The mayor stated the objects of the meeting.

Griswold moved that the city's State street building be rented to L. M. Kirk for one year at \$15 per month in advance. Adopted.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted.

Be It Resolved, By the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, in the interest of the bond issue heretofore provided for by election and the orders of this council, that the mayor of Salem appoint a committee of four, consisting of said mayor as chairman, the city recorder, and two members of this common council, to arrange for and perfect the details of said issue of bonds. Said committee to have full power to employ legal counsel if necessary; to provide for the printing of said bonds, for advertising the sale thereof, and to negotiate the sale or sales thereof, to fix the denominations of said bonds, to arrange for the signing, sealing and delivering of said bonds to purchasers, and to all things requisite and proper in the fulfillment of the task hereby assigned said committee in behalf of said bond issue, under the terms of the charter-authority governing said issue of bonds aforesaid; and to report to this council, at each regular meeting thereof, the progress made in this behalf, until said issue shall have been completed.

Allderman Walker moved, and Riggs seconded, to reconsider the motion rejecting all lighting bids which was adopted Wednesday evening. Adopted unanimously.

Upon suggestion of the mayor, Mr. Walker moved that the motion adopted last evening, authorizing the return of the certified check of the Salem Light & Traction Co. for \$1,000 without prejudice to the bids, be reconsidered and the check retained. Carried.

Councilman Burrows at this juncture facetiously asked for more time for his special committee report upon the lighting bids.

Riggs moved that 15 tons of good timothy or cheat hay be advertised for sale.

Buren moved that the city recorder be instructed to notify the government authorities that Cottage street will be opened across Wilson avenue provided that site be selected for the new post-office building. Carried.
