THE SECOND MEETING FOR THE PURPOSE OF MAKING ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE RECEPTION OF THE VOLUNTEERS TOOK PLACE AT 2 P. M. TODAY IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBER OF THE CITY HALL.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Gatch and his announcement of the appointment of committees was read and approved.

Mr. Gatch did not read the names of any committees at the city hall today, and will probably give out a list when it is finally completed.

On motion the chair was instructed to appoint a committee to meet the volunteers in San Francisco, the suggestion being to appoint persons who were going anyway, giving them the additional standing with the officials arising from the appointment.

F. B. Southwick stated that Governor Geer and his staff are going to San Francisco and the executive committee was instructed to see the governor and request him to use all efforts to keep the volunteers together as an organization until they can be received as such.

No other formal action was taken. The situation was discussed informally and the conclusion was arrived at that in the present unsettled state of affairs it would be impossible to make definite arrangements for the reception as it seemed to be uncertain that the regiment, or even companies K and M would ever be here in a body.

After the half hour's session the meeting adjourned subject to the call of the chair.

DOCTOR PAINE

Condemned By Republicans.

Appointed By Kincaid and Turns Push Politician

Record of the Official Who Excludes The Journal.

[Following articles are copied from a Republican paper at Salem that has quite a following among the party workers—the Sentinel.]

The half has not been told. There is even yet talk of an official investigation of the mysterious death at that institution of Del Main and of another unattended patient who during the state fair was permitted to ride a hobby horse on the merry-go-round. Becoming dizzy, she fell off and her neck was broken. It seems that the price of place there now is for the employee to keep his mouth shut, say nothing and saw wood.

FUNDS IN BLANK.

Much criticism is made of the method of handling the private funds of patients. They are said to be asked what they require and then made to sign a receipt in blank. The wording of these receipts afford a lovely opportunity for minor grafts and the working off of old, second-hand or shoddy clothing at a nice price. Something has also been said as to the moral atmosphere attaching to the management of the institution, but this question will afford an ample text at some future time when the warrant scalping and other extraordinary features have received attention.

INCOMPETENT EMPLOYER.

The manager is said to retain several employees who are wholly incompetent. Not only that, he has created new offices, with big salaries, has assessed and collected enormous political assessments. Last year he bled the employees for about \$1,100. One Democrat refused to contribute to the fund. He was threatened with discharge but as he has no doubt learned by this time that silence is golden he retains his job and says nothing. On the whole, we incline to the belief that should our critics investigate the management of the institution they would agree with us that our criticisms have been decidedly mild.

BAD APPOINTMENT CONTINUED.

Perhaps no act of the new administration has been so generously, unanimously and cordially condemned as that which retains Dr. Paine as superintendent. It is given out that no change will be made until January 1, but the people understand from this that there is a possibility that Paine may be permitted to hold on for another full term of four long years.

The people give many reasons why a change should have been made at this time. They acknowledge Paine's superior qualifications as a superintendent of construction in the building of a new wing. Dr. Paine is an expert on brick walls and excavations. This is all admitted, but what his peculiar qualifications consist of is not known.

OLD DEAL GONE ON.

In the late campaign the state was promised a new deal through the success of the Republican ticket at the polls. It was the promise of the new deal that fixed Lord at the primaries and later at the state convention. But for the expectation of a fulfillment of these pledges

the outcome would have been different. The worst the Lord administration could have been expected to do would have been the keeping in office of the same people who are now retained by the new administration. The people had a right to expect better things at the hands of the new officers. They have abundant justification for their disappointment at the way things are working out.

REGION OF PETTY POLITICS.

Under the present administration of affairs at the asylum petty politics may be expected to continue to dictate appointments and policy.

Democrats who refused to contribute to the campaign fund were promised expulsion from the service of the state.

An enormous fund was raised (\$1,100) from among the employees at the asylum last spring. This money is supposed to have gone to Lane county. Maybe it did. Nobody knows. Employees were intimidated until nearly all subscribed to it.

The handling of the private funds of the patients is another matter worthy of official investigation.

THE INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENT.

The employment of patients in the heavy work of excavation, etc., is another proposition for debate. There are persons who would be glad to do this work for the state, and there are relatives and friends of unfortunate insane persons who would prefer that the de-moralized wards should not be thus employed. It may be true that the state is saving money through thus utilizing patient labor, but is it the mission of a humane hospital to make diggers of earth and mixers of mortar out of those mentally defective who are consigned to its tender mercies?

The meat contract is another feature of the present superintendency that might be inquired into with profit to the state.

JOBBERY AND SNOBGERY.

The persistence with which all contracts dealing with electrical work or equipment are awarded to a certain Portland firm that is engaged in a business foreign to electricity might also be investigated without prejudice to the best interests.

The advent of this man Paine as chief at the asylum marked the era of snobbery there. Then began the assignment of a cook, under name and pay of "attendant," as cook for the officers. The food given patients and employees wasn't good enough for Dr. Paine. And about this time, too, the attendants began to quit eating meat, knowing the character and family history of some of the monarchs of the pasture that were led to the slaughter pen.
