VOLUNTEERS

Will Be Mustered Out.

In San Francisco at the Presidio.

Their Unanimous Request Was Immediately Conceded.

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Secretary Alger this morning received a telegram from San Francisco containing a unanimous request of the Oregon regiment for muster out at San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—A telegram from Washington today announced that the Oregon Volunteer regiment would be mustered out here and was soon made known to the soldiers on the transports and received with loud hurrahs.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—Advices dated Manila June 11, state that the volunteers are greatly debilitated, in consequence of hard campaigning through three months of tropical weather.

The morning after the Washington troops took the morning, a week ago, only 263 men responded to roll call.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—It has been almost definitely determined to land the Oregon volunteers tomorrow morning. The transport City of Para will leave this afternoon for Manila and the transports Ohio and Newport will be docked late tonight or tomorrow morning.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—If the second Oregon is mustered out in Portland every man in the regiment will be indignant almost to the point of refusing to receive the public honor which the state wishes to bestow.

Governor Geer, of Oregon, and his staff, came to San Francisco for the express purpose of receiving the volunteers, and since their arrival here have been in constant communication with the department at Washington to land here, but so far their efforts have been unavailing.

General Shafter fully appreciates the anxiety of the people of San Francisco to give the Oregon boys a fitting reception, but so far has been unable to give any encouraging information upon the subject.

The situation is this," said Lieutenant-Colonel Plummer, General Shafter's aid. "General Shafter has received a number of anxious inquiries from Washington. The vessels entered port with comparatively clean bill of health there being but one or two cases of sickness among the soldiers, but there are seventy-two men on the transports suffering from wounds received in the Philippines. There were no deaths or other casualties during the voyage.

The soldiers are all anxious to have their discharge papers issued here, and Colonel Summers has sent a telegram to Adjutant General H. C. Corbin at Washington, expressing the desire of the men to be mustered out here.

STEAMSHIP NEWPORT, SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—To the Adjutant General, U. S. A., Washington: Oregon troops just arrived unanimously object to being mustered out at Portland and lose the right of travel allowance, and request to be mustered out at San Francisco and get travel allowance.

Summed up, the unanimous view of officers and men is: The regiment has earned travel allowance; the men fought for it and they want it. A marine parade means a money sacrifice that they can not afford. They will contribute all their travel pay in order to furnish a parade.

Now, if a like amount could be raised in Oregon to give them what they are entitled to, the regiment would be only too glad to go to the Columbia river. General Summers has promised the Oregon reception committee that he will keep the regiment together, and if the state will furnish a special train, he will bring the regiment home in a body.

Late last evening the first steps were taken looking toward the regiment's receiving full travel pay and at the same time giving the people of Oregon the opportunity of extending a welcome to the homeward-bound volunteers, such as they deserve.

IN THE HOP YARDS.

Conditions in Oregon Very Favorable For a Fine Crop.

While in New York State it is Not so Good—Too Much Bare Pole in Sight.

The condition of the hop crop in Oregon is considered fine and the weather now promises to mature the hop vine to perfection.

All vermin is slowly disappearing and some who have been spraying have discontinued work.

Many conservative hop men consider a crop of at least 95,000 to 100,000 bales as about what Oregon will produce.

One prominent hop grower was interviewed today and he scouted at the idea of anyone trying to estimate the yield. It will be hard enough to make an estimate of within ten thousand bales of the actual crop even when they are ready to pick.

News from Waterville, New York, the large hop centre of that state, gave the conditions about as follows:

There is undoubtedly something the matter with the hop vine for everyone who has taken the pains to look over the yards carefully report that they are not growing as they should and as they generally do at this time of the year.

Business has been quiet, but recent quotations are maintained. The influence of the warm weather on market transactions is about evenly balanced.

Reports of the growing crop are variable, but on the whole may be accepted as fairly satisfactory. It is true that the recurrence of cold wind, affecting the night temperature, has somewhat handicapped the concurrent advantages derived from the bright sunshine, and the absence of rain is being felt in some of the shallow soil.

STILL FIGHTING

Filipinos in the Philippines.

Gunboat Rapidan Shelled the Rebels.

And Other Foreign News of Importance.

MANILA, July 13.—On Tuesday three troops of the Fourth cavalry had an engagement at Mantidupa, on the South coast of Laguna de Bay.

The gunboat Rapidan shelled the rebels and a party of troops were landed and drove them by a sharp running fire to the hills. Two cavalrymen were wounded. It is supposed the enemy's loss is 35.

WASHINGTON, July 13.—The state department is anxiously watching the developments in Guatemala. There are hints of foreign action that might involve a repetition of the Corinto incident and in that case it would probably be deemed necessary by our government to have a stronger naval representation at the seat of trouble.
