GOV. GEER RETURNS

Tells the Story of the Arrival of the Oregon Volunteers.

The Executive Party Nearly Met With a Calamity on the Tour Home.

The executive of Oregon with staff and escort returned from San Francisco on Monday morning's overland train. Governor Geer talked over freely the whole situation as to the Oregon boys and expressed no regret at having gone to the Bay City to meet the troops.

He says if the Californians greet their own regiment as cordially as they did the Oregon they will have to make a tremendous effort.

Governor Geer arrived in Frisco Tuesday morning. The troops were sighted about 2 o'clock Wednesday. The executive party had been the guests of General Shafter at the Presidio and at his residence at Fort Mason where all the commanding officers reside. Gov. Geer and party went at once to the tug Governor Irwin, where Gen. Shafter and staff, Gov. Gage and staff were assembled and went out to meet the transports in the harbor.

"Per se off at Frisco."

Gov. Geer says all that could be heard as they approached the Newport, which was a mile ahead of the Ohio, was the cry "Frisco," "Frisco," put as off at "Frisco." The tug party then proceeded to the transport Ohio and went on board both about two or three hours. The same evening of their arrival the transports anchored near Folsom dock and the governor went to work to get the word home that the Oregonians insisted on being mustered out at Frisco.

The travel pay of the regiment, which they gain in part by coming home via Frisco, was the cause of the boys not wanting to be mustered out in Oregon. They did not want a reception in Oregon as a regiment virtually at their own expense.

THE REGIMENT WILL COME.

Governor Geer has the most positive assurance that after being mustered out the Second Oregon will come home in a body. Of course, their own expense, but commanded by companies and by their officers.

Governor Geer says the boys all look fairly well, except that they are thin in flesh. Those he knew personally seemed to be 20 to 30 lbs. lighter, faces tanned, but eyes bright and in good spirits.

The feeling among the troops was one of positive indifference if not repugnance to being taken up the Columbia to Portland. Governor Geer says the vote stood 65 to 70 as against 800 to 900 in favor of Frisco.

He says it was the honest expression of the wishes of the regiment to not come to Portland. He does not believe that there is any ground for a suspicion that the regiment or its officers were influenced by any interest whatever, except their own pecuniary interest and desire to save their travel pay.

The party on the home trip was composed of the governor, General Tuttle, Col. and Mrs. Spencer, Col. and Mrs. Dunne, Col. Gillis, Capt. Mears and Mrs. Harry Boos.

TRAIN NEARLY WRECKED.

The train was nearly wrecked while crossing a bridge over Sacramento river about ten o'clock Sunday. A truck became derailed, and the last coach, carrying the party, was derailed on the bridge fifty feet above the water below. The coupling broke and their car stopped in time to probably save all their lives.

They expected to go down any second. Col. Gillis was standing on the rear platform smoking and was badly frightened.

Stricken With Paralysis.

J. P. Johnson, who resides at Seventeenth street and asylum avenue was on Saturday afternoon about 1:30, stricken with paralysis. It happened while he was painting on a residence.

Mr. Johnson is an industriously inclined man and was doing a job of painting here to while away time then as a source of livelihood and he had only a little while before he was stricken being asked by his wife if he hadn't better wait until the heat of the day was over and work during the evening. Mr. Johnson did not feel the extreme heat but kept on painting. A little later in the day those at the house noticed him stand in a dazed condition and finally fall. Aid was immediately given him and he recovered he could walk into the house and he had nearly completely recovered the shock when he was stricken again, which he also recovered from until about 8 o'clock in the evening when he was finally completely paralyzed on one side. Mr. Johnson is only partly recovered, not having his speech yet and can only eat liquid food but is somewhat brighter today. Mr. Johnson is 86 years old and one of the few well preserved men of that age in Salem who was able to do a full day's work. Mr. Johnson has been a master mason over 55 years and his many friends wish that he may speedily recover from his present misfortune.
