POSTOFFICE SITE

Subject of Rumors and Sundry Hot Weather Speculations.

Belief That a Location on the Mrs. Riely Site is Pretty Well Determined.

A rumor was circulated Monday that the Salem postoffice site was pretty well determined upon, and would go to what is known as the Riely site, corner Chemeketa and High streets.

Mrs. Riely's lot and Miss Margaret Savage's lot, the Riely site, corner High and Chemeketa streets, were put in at \$7,000. If the owners get \$4,500 they will secure a fair price because the lot next to the Mrs. Riely site was sold to A. B. Buren the past year for \$1,500. Mr. Buren as alderman is working hard for the Wilson avenue proposition, although the Riely site would be a windfall for him.

The Riely location theory is confirmed by a strenuous grapevine telegram to the McBride push organ at Salem, printed double column wide in a frame border as follows:

A report was current on Salem's streets yesterday that the site for the United States government building at Salem had been selected, consequently the following is self-explanatory:

"WASHINGTON, D. C. July 17.—(Special to the Statesman.)—The public building site has not yet been selected. P. S. Garretson's report has not been made to the secretary of the treasury."

that when the report is made it will favor the Riely site.

Mr. Riely, who has been managing the matter for Mrs. Riely and her sister has been receiving congratulations for landing the prize. He denies any knowledge, however, except that he is on very favorable terms with the McBride-Patterson push—the powers that be,—and is prepared to give title.

When seen by the reporter of a live newspaper, if there be such thing in the Capital City, he admitted that he incidentally but only as a "josh" remarked on Monday to one of the Waters abstract firm that they could go ahead and get out the abstract, that the thing was fixed. But this was only as a joke and that he disclaimed meaning anything by that.

"It is a very nice corner," said Mr. Riely, "but if we get the location it will be entirely on its merits. I never called on the government agent when he was at Salem. He was introduced to me on the street but we did not talk site."

Mr. Riely occupies an advantageous position in being very close to the McBride people who look closely after the interest of their friends. Mr. Riely is also the close, trusted and confidential friend of Collector Ike Patterson and U. S. Dist. Atty. John Hall, who must finally pass on the title, which will cut some figure in the disposition of the matter.

It will be recalled that Mr. Garretson, who is to report on the various sites was not an officer of the architect's department, but was given a furlough from another department to make the trip for his health. He was well supplied with free cigars to greet and treat all who called on him and he gave the general impression that he was well advised about the affairs at Salem before his arrival.

THE JOURNAL has no interest in any of the sites, but ventures the prediction that the Riely location is as likely to be chosen as any. So far as Mr. McBride is concerned, other matters being equal, he would serve those near and dear to him, and he will probably not bump himself to help out the Willson Avenue site proffered at the hands of what he calls blooming reformers and economists like the present anti-push city administration.
