VOLUNTEERS RECEPTION

Salem Will Redeem the Reputation of This State.

Insinuates a Movement to Bring the Regiment Home in a Body.

Salem has started the ball rolling to get the Second Regiment home in a body and redeem the good name of Oregon by doing something for our noble regiment. It is proposed to have the regiment come to Salem in a body to deliver its colors under a guarantee that companies that pass their home towns in doing so will be returned home at Salem's expense. The volunteers on their arrival here will be asked to give a parade, which will be participated in by the military and civic organizations of the city. The movement is meeting with general favor.

Monday evening the proposition was discussed by a number of Salem gentlemen, and a temporary organization perfected for the purpose of taking the matter promptly in hand, and a meeting was at once called, to be held at Hotel Willamette, at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, to take steps toward devising ways and means and carrying the plans into execution. The friends of the volunteers, and especially the relatives of the members of Company K, and the members of the two Emergency corps were urged to be present and participate in the work of arranging for this reception to the regiment.

It was argued that the arrangements for a reception to the troops in the Capital City, and the final parade and ceremony of turning over the colors of the regiment in the Capital City, to the chief executive of the state, would bring thousands of people from all parts of the state to Salem, and the occasion would be a gala one.

At 2 o'clock about twenty citizens assembled at Hotel Willamette. H. A. Johnson was elected chairman and Frank Dwyer, secretary, and it was decided to raise a subscription to pay the expenses home of all volunteers south of Salem who would come on to this city and parade with the regiment. A subscription was started at once and the regiment will probably be notified on Wednesday to come to Salem as a body.

There will be another meeting tonight at 9 o'clock at the hotel to report progress. Let all attend and let the money needed be raised at once.

WILLAMETTE BRIDGE.

The Foot Bridge in a Dangerous Condition on Polk County Side.

Considerable complaint having come to this office in regard to the condition of the foot bridge over the Willamette, a Journal reporter has visited the bridge and finds that there is good ground for complaint.

When the big steel bridge was replanked last year the foot walk was not renewed, and the planks are old and rotten. On the Marion county side and on the bridge proper, the walk is not in bad shape, but on the long approach on the Polk county side there is great need of immediate repairs.

There are many yawning holes large enough to drop a good-sized dog through; dozens of the planks have no bearings whatever under one end, having rotted away where they rested on the planks of the drive way, and are liable to break through at any time.

This portion of the bridge is dangerous to life and limb of all foot passengers except very light persons with exceedingly large feet. It should receive immediate attention.

WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

U. S. Department of Agriculture Reports on the Oregon Section.

The weekly report of A. R. Walaber, acting section director of the weather bureau and climate and crop service, shows following for Western Oregon: The highest temperatures so far this year prevailed during the week. On Friday, the 26th inst., cooler weather set in, continuing until Sunday. Thunderstorms prevailed Friday night throughout the Willamette valley and over the northern coast counties. The rainfall was light in most sections, although reports indicate a fair amount in Clackamas, Benton and Marion counties.

The wheat crop continues in excellent condition, especially the fall sown, which has filled well and is of good quality. In some sections reports as to the condition of spring grain are not as promising as they were. The warm weather and lack of rain have prevented filling to some extent, and the outlook is not encouraging. The damage appears to be confined principally to that worn on summer fallow. There are few reports of rain. Cuts are in excellent condition, but need more rain. Harvesting has commenced and much of the fall-sown wheat is in the shock. Some threshing has been carried on during the week in Southern Oregon.

Hay is practically over, and the most flattering reports are received regarding the excellent and abundant crop secured. The second crop of clover and alfalfa is being cut. Hops are in bloom and the vines are in a healthy condition. Spraying was continued during the week in all the yards, which aided by the high temperatures, practically destroyed the lice. The hot weather has been favorable to the growth of corn.

Potatoes are in blossom, but need more rain. Indications point to a short crop. Gardens have made good growth; rain is badly needed. There is no change in the fruit prospects. Reports received state that there will be plenty of apples and pears for local use, but none for shipment; the estimate is placed at about 20 per cent of a full crop. Peaches are ripe and in market in the northern counties. Cherry picking is over. Blackberries continue to ripen; indications point to a short crop.

The large onion crop of Washington county promises well. Pastures are drying up. Stock is in fair condition. Bright sunshine and high temperature prevailed during the week. Thunderstorms occurred over sections of the Plateau district on Friday and Saturday. The mean temperature for the week averaged 73 degrees, as against 73 degrees in Western Oregon.

The grain crop in most sections continues in good condition. The reports of damage from shriveling, caused by the hot winds, seemed to be confined to sections of Gilliam, Morrow, Wasco and Umatilla counties. Harvesting is well under way. Threshing has commenced in Wasco county, and the grain has turned out well, both as to quantity and quality. Oats are ripening rapidly. Barley is about all cut; a good crop has been secured. Haying is over. The dry weather is not favorable to the second crop of clover, but so far it has not been injured; cutting the same continues. Excepting the burning of spring grain, which has occurred in several counties of the state, the crop prospects of Oregon are in a fair condition.
