THE SALEM HOG.

The Salem hog is all right. He is getting even with Eugene on that painting contract in quick order. Saturday the contract was let to Fugh & Gray, of Salem, at the contract price of \$13,538. That is a fine kind of a hog to have around, by the way.—Albany Democrat.

Salem contractors are all right. They are hogging contracts all over the state. The more buildings they put up, the more demand there seems to be for their services. The Eugene contractors who agreed to paint the Salem school houses wanted to introduce a private construction of the contract, and hence their bond could not be accepted.

CURRENT EVENTS.

Every county in the state is represented at the convention of bolting Kentucky Democrats which was called to order at Lexington this morning for the purpose of deciding on what is the best course to take to defeat William Goebel and his associates on the ticket nominated by the recent Louisville convention. It has been all but decided that ex-Governor John Young Brown shall be named for governor, but considerable difference of opinion exists as to the advisability of nominating a full state ticket. Those who argue that a full state ticket be named, and who appear to be in the majority, suggest the following for the places to be filled: W. C. Owens for lieutenant-governor; W. C. P. Breckinridge for attorney-general; John L. Dunlap for secretary of state, with P. P. Johnson for United States senator against J. C. S. Blackburn. The most difficult part of the convention's work is the framing of the platform as it is necessary to construct a financial plank acceptable to both the sound money and free silver factions of the bolting Democrats.

Pittsburg has capitulated to 10,000 strangers who are here to attend the annual convention of the Young People's Christian Union of the United Presbyterian church. Delegates are here from nearly every state in the union, as well as from Germany, Japan, India and other foreign countries. The convention will be formally opened with well-coming meetings tonight and will continue tomorrow.

"Strong Hearts" is the latest work of the great expositor and creator of southern fiction, if such phrase may be permitted, since the national heart has learned that it really beats for no such thing as section. The Story of the Solitary, the Taxidermist, and the Entomologist, are one in poetic temperament, sympathy of treatment and perfectly artistic atmosphere. LONG BRIDGE.
The Turner Bicycle Path Will Dodge the Reform School Hill.

It will seem unnecessary for wheelmen to climb over the reform school hill in going to Turner. The bicycle path around the hill is nearly completed and work is being pushed on the bridge across the bottom.

This bridge will be 1630 feet long, planked with 2x2 strips about one inch apart and will cost about \$300. It carries the path across the low ground between the S. P. track and the Turner road south of the reform school.

Wheelmen will greatly appreciate the good judgment shown by County Judge Terrell in laying the bicycle path by this route instead of over the hill.

The path leaves the Turner road on the side of the Reform school and keeps the level ground near the S. P. track until the hill is passed, when it crosses to the Turner road again over the long bridge now building. The way is about one-third of a mile longer but avoids the hardest hill between here and Eugene. Had the path followed the road it would have required a bridge of practically the same dimensions to cross low ground between the Reform school and Turner, and after consultation with President J. H. Albert, of the wheelmen's association, Judge Terrell laid the path where it is now being built.
