### NEW CITY BOND ISSUE.

Form Completed for Issuance October 1.

Subscriptions Continue to Come in From the People.

The city bond committee composed of Mayor Bishop, Recorder Judah, Alder men Buren and Walker held a meeting last evening and decided upon the form of the bond preparatory for printing. The form is very simple and will be printed in two colors on safety bond paper with twenty semi-annual interest coupons. The form is as follows:

CITY OF SALEM MUNICIPAL FOUR-PER-CENT FUNDING BOND.

Salem, Marion County, Oregon.

Total Amount of Issue, \$65,000.

Know all men by these presents: That the common council of Salem, for the city of Salem, Oregon, a municipal corporation created and organized under the laws of the state of Oregon, acknowledges itself indebted to the bearer hereof in the sum of \_\_\_\_\_ dollars, (\$ \_\_\_\_\_), gold coin of the United States of America, of the present standard of weight and fineness, to be paid at the office of the city treasurer in said city of Salem, on or before the First day of October, 1909, upon the surrender hereof; with interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, on the First days of April and October in each year after the date hereof, in like gold coin, at the office of the city treasurer aforesaid, upon the surrender of the coupons hereto attached.

This bond is one of an issue of Sixty-Five thousand dollars, (\$65,000) of even date herewith, negotiated under and by the authority of Section 23, of the charter of the said city of Salem, Oregon, approved February 17, 1899.

In testimony whereof the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, has caused this bond to be signed by the mayor of said city, and attested by the recorder of said city, and its corporate seal to be hereto affixed, this Second day of October, 1899.

Subscriptions for these bonds will not close until September 1st and the bonds will be ready for delivery October 1st. Although the subscription already amounts to \$102,900, small amounts subscribed for still stand a good show of being accepted. The awards will probably be announced ten days before date of delivery, or about September 20th.

Many applications have been received from Eastern banks and bond buyers, but all have been notified that this is strictly a home loan and would be taken here. The last letter received by Mayor Bishop on the subject was from the publisher of the "American Banker" in New York. His Honor simply turned the letter over and endorsed on the back of it that "this is a popular home loan bond issue and that the same had already been taken three times over by Salem people." This speaks well for Oregon's Capital City.
