

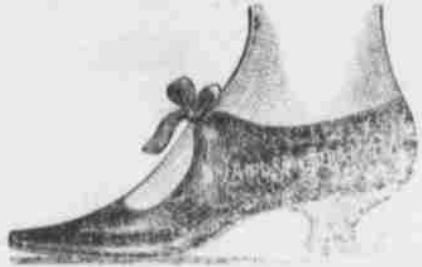

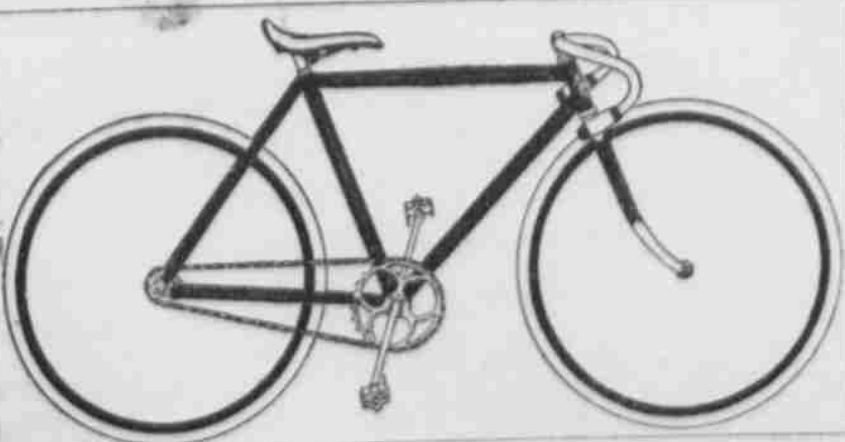

A WILD MAN.

Said to Be Running Loose in a Pasture (Near Salem). People living in Yew Park and Depot addition have worked up something of an excitement over a wild man in Litchfield's pasture which lies just south of Depot addition.

DREYFUS' ENEMY

Colonel Cordier's Testimony Plainly in Favor of the Accused Captain.

Maitre Labori Bound to Have His Client Acquitted.

By Associated Press to the Journal. RENNES, Aug. 29.—No special incident marked the opening of the Dreyfus court-martial this morning. Col. Cordier, deputy chief of the intelligence department, under the late Lieutenant-Colonel Henri, and who since his previous appearance in court has been released by the minister of war from the oath of professional secrecy, was the first witness called today. He testified to the effect that the late Colonel Sandherr and not Henri received the famous bordereau.

The witness deposed strongly in favor of Dreyfus. The colonel declared his belief in the guilt of Dreyfus was shaken when the date of the bordereau was given as May. He was convinced that Dreyfus was innocent. Col. Cordier spoke for Picquart as a conscientious soldier and honorable man and threw much light upon the situation which existed in the offices of the intelligence department of the war office.

Col. Cordier several times mentioned the ambassador to Germany, which caused the president to intervene and tell the witness that he must not introduce any ambassador's name or refer to Germany.

De Freycinet, former minister of war, former minister of foreign affairs and former premier, followed Cordier on the witness stand. De Freycinet made a patriotic speech rather than deposed, concluding with the words, "All the world will accept your verdict which will open an era of reconciliation." The members of the court-martial treated De Freycinet with the greatest deference.

Prussian Diet Doings. BERLIN, Aug. 29.—Both houses of the Prussian diet met in joint session today. The imperial chancellor expressed the regret of the government that the canal bill had not met the approval of the diet. But, he said, the government adhered steadily to the project and was confident that the conviction of its necessity would grow more among the people.

Wellman Expedition Returned. By Associated Press to the Journal. HEUL, England, Aug. 28.—Walter Wellman, leader of the Wellman polar expedition has arrived here. The explorer is accompanied by the American members of the expedition, who are well.

The man was seen several times last week by boys who frequent the pasture, and one boy, Chas. Parker, was scared out of at least 18 months growth by running across the man in the thick brush while in search of his cow. The boy brought up, a few seconds later at the residence of Mr. Van Valkenburg, near by, and his face is said to have shown more different colors than a Nye Creek sunset.

A man named Adams, who has been camped near the pasture, with a traveling outfit for repairing umbrellas, saw the man and said he thought he had seen the same man before in California. Saturday evening a lady at Mr. Van Valkenburg's residence saw the man crossing some open ground on his hands and knees and noticed that he lay under a tree until dark.

On Sunday, some half dozen men and a host of boys, made a systematic search of the pasture, but failed to find what they were looking for. The system they used however may account for their failure, for it is said they all kept in a compact body, and that there was considerable rivalry as to who should occupy positions in the center of the crowd. Fred Bowersox' bird dog was impressed into the service and played a prominent part in the hunt by following the trail of the quarry, but when the trail led up a small tree which contained no wild man, the dog's services were dispensed with.

The supposed wild man is described as of middle age, dressed in a fairly good suit of black clothes, wearing a handkerchief around his neck, and having a couple of weeks growth of beard on his face.

He has been spoken to several times by boys, but would return no answer, usually taking to the brush on his hands and knees.

It is reported that the same man was seen near Turner for a week or so a short time ago.

KRUGER DEFIANT

His Ultimatum to England. Will Make No More Concessions.

War Declaration Expected at an Early Date.

By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, Aug. 29.—Commenting on the declaration of President Kruger of the Transvaal government to the effect that the south African government adhered to its latest offer and would not make further concessions, the afternoon papers here unanimously draw attention to the increased seriousness of the Transvaal situation, but at the same time they express uncertainty regarding the nature of the concessions beyond which Kruger says he will not go.

No official announcement has been made of these, though they are generally understood to be five year franchise and increased Outlander representation, and increased Outlander representation, "If this is correct," the Globe says, "it cannot be long before diplomacy has to stand aside as of no further service."

LONDON, Aug. 29.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: British troops will be immediately concentrated at Laing's Neck and Naafoking, and it is believed that the British program will be to surround the Transvaal and then to negotiate a new convention.

According to the Daily Mail's Cape Town correspondent, the belief is still entertained there that the British government is opposed to extreme measures and it is reported that President Kruger is so well aware of this that he has just cabled, countermanding conditional orders for large meat supplies.

FRONTIER, Aug. 29.—The reports of Mr. Chamberlain's speech at Birmingham last Friday have been calmly received here. President Kruger said: "Let the newspapers bring whatever they like. I cannot say whether they report Mr. Chamberlain correctly. When he speaks to me direct, I shall know how to reply."

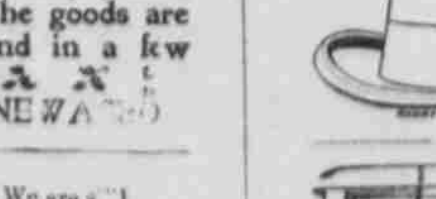
