MONEY SCARCE

Treasury Will Relieve the Stringency.

Transport Tartar Detained at Hong Kong.

Miscellaneous Matters Reported by Wire.

Associated Press to the Journal. WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—The secretary of the treasury has decided in view of the money stringency in New York to anticipate the October payment of interest. This will amount \$5,990,516, and is due on the 4 per cent bonds of 1897.

Crowded Transport Detained. WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—A cable message was received at the war department today concerning the United States transport Tartar, which has been held at Hong Kong by the British authorities on account of complaint by the soldiers of the crowded condition of the ship.

A private cable message from Hong Kong, says the complaint was made by 400 discharged regulars on board the Tartar, of overcrowding, whereupon clearance was refused. The Tartar has on board 1230 men, but is said she is allowed to carry 1250.

The Twentieth Kansas volunteers with General Funston are aboard but is believed the volunteers have made no complaint and are anxious to have clearance granted the ship in order that they may proceed homeward. The Tartar was chartered by the United States from Canadian Pacific Steamship Co. She sails under the British flag. It is said that under these conditions she is subject to British navigation laws.

ANTI-TRUST

The Civic Federation Meets

Two Hundred Delegates On Hand.

Discuss the New Form of Industrial Organization.

Chicago, Sept. 13.—The Civic federation conference on uses and abuses of trusts and combinations, with representative men for nearly every state in attendance, opened here today. Central music hall was packed with 200 delegates and hundreds of spectators. The first taste of the real business confronting the delegates came in papers delivered by Prof. J. W. Jenks and Prof. Henry Carter Adams, both under caption "problems before the conference." Prof. Adams, of the University of Michigan, said in part: "Industrial combinations, whatever their form, whatever their purpose, whatever their explanation, are matters of public concern. It is said that we do not know enough of this new form of industrial organization to judge properly respecting it. If this be true and if on this account trusts are to be allowed probationary existence, it is the plain duty of the government to hold them meantime to strict account. If trusts are what they are claimed to be, that is to say, vanguards of the new industrial organization which holds within itself great industrial benefits, the sooner the fact is recognized by the public the better for all concerned. If, on the other hand, there is danger in extreme application of this form of organization, the government certainly has the right to possess itself of all the facts necessary for judicial opinion and for effective legislation."

JOHN G. BARR DEAD.

At 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, John G. Barr, one of Salem's best citizens, died of Bright's disease, at his home on East Court street. He slept 12 hours peacefully until just before the end came, when he was conscious and gave recognition to his family. Funeral arrangements will be made tomorrow.

FRENCH GENERALS.

Offer to Intercede for Dreyfus on Certain Conditions. By Associated Press to the Journal. Boston, Sept. 13.—The Post announced that it had received the following despatch from Paris: "Generals Rogette and Mercier have offered on the part of the army to demand from President Loubet the pardon of Captain Dreyfus if the Jewish committee will drop the matter and on condition that Dreyfus shall live away from the large cities of France for three years." SOUTH AFRICA.

No Ultimatum From England to the Boers. LONDON, Sept. 13.—A representative of the Associated Press learned today that the British message to the Transvaal does not demand a reply in 48 hours, the exact wording being a request for an immediate reply.

The message is not an ultimatum in the generally accepted sense of the word. It expresses the hope that President Kruger will accept the propositions to relieve the present tension. The only part which is at all aggressive is the reiterated declaration of the British government to discuss the matter of sovereignty in any shape or form. The report that rand Irishmen have formed a corps to help President Kruger is confirmed and it is said at Cape Town that a cablegram has been received from New York saying that 10,000 Irishmen there are ready to help the Transvaal.

THEIR REPLY

Filipino's Answer to Our Offer

Claims Americans Were the Aggressors.

Treatment by Americans Has Destroyed Their Confidence.

MANILA, Sept. 13.—The Associated Press correspondent here has obtained a copy of the reply made by the Filipino congress to the American offer of autonomous government. The author of the reply was Ambrosio Rianzares, who was offered a position in the supreme court but who failed to appear and was supposed to be detained by the insurrectionists.

The document repeats the arguments contained in the recent appeal to the powers for recognition, and the Filipino claims that the Americans were the aggressors in the war and concludes: "notwithstanding the foregoing we could have accepted your sovereignty and autonomy if we had not seen by the behavior of the Americans in the beginning that they were strongly opposed to us through race prejudice and their high handed methods of dealing with us made us fear for the future in your hands."
