CATCHES 'EM A-GOIN' AND A-COMIN'.
About a month ago the great exponent of economic and financial wisdom at Portland had this to say touching the recent fall in the price of gilt-edge securities in the European market:

"The reason is the great industrial and commercial activity in Europe at present which creates a large demand for money and puts up interest rates. People find that they can get a better income by lending their money at present market rates, or by putting it into business, than they can get on consols, and so they sell the consols. * * * It has been a long time since the civilized world had an equal degree of prosperity. It is during hard times, as our experience has shown us, that money is cheap and gilt-edged securities are dear."

In its issue of the 20th instant it republishes the following on the editorial page, referring to a recent bond sale in Lewiston, Idaho:

"The recent bond sale is a good commentary on the improved condition of the general business of the country. In 1905, when the \$5,000,000 bond issue was made, the bonds brought face and drew 6 per cent interest, the county paying \$600 for the blank bonds. Now the issue at 5 per cent is sold at a premium of \$135, the buyer furnishing his own bonds. This cuts the rate to 4.6 per cent, and makes the annual interest only \$230, effecting a saving each year of \$1200 to the taxpayers. The goldbug conspiracy does not seem to be a bad thing to take after all."

For an all round double-back action, self-cocking, argument comment us to the price of securities.
When they go down, it proves that times are prosperous; when they go up it proves the same.
When interest goes up it is because of great industrial and commercial activity; when interest goes down it is because of "the improved condition of general business." Selah!

ZOLA'S IDEA.
Emile Zola said to a New York World correspondent on Tuesday: "The Rouen trial was the dark fourth act of a dark tragedy. How will the tragedy end? Dreyfus will regain his place in the army and the drama will end with a procession of handcuffed generals led to prison, or else the dark days are just beginning for France, days when justice will come with the sword and torch and a martyr's acquittal will be soiled with the blood of humanity.
