SALEM CITY ELECTION.

The old regime said "you can't run Salem any cheaper, and the only thing to do is to provide more revenues." The people didn't believe that, and put in some plain men to do business for the city. In less than nine months they have demonstrated an annual saving of over sixteen thousand dollars.

Do the people of Salem want to go back to the old machine methods, or do they want to go right along having public business done as they would do their own business?

Now is time to decide, and to act upon their decision, for in ten short weeks there will be another city election. At that time there will be four candidates to elect, one in each ward, to succeed Thos. Burrows, A. B. Boren, Lee McGrew and Fred Legg. Of these Messrs. Burrows and Boren were representatives of the "citizens' movement, and the demand will be overwhelming for their return by the same people who put them there before.

Mr. Boren is the pioneer of the "citizens' movement, having been elected two years ago when a break was considered impossible, and while he probably not seeking honors any more than he was two years ago, the people of his ward, regardless of politics, will insist that he must remain. Mr. Burrows was entitled to the long term when elected last year, but generously waived the privilege for his senior colleague, Mr. Walker. Like Mr. Boren, he has rendered faithful service, and the people demand his return. These men have both unselfishly put aside their own interests and have loyally served the city in a manner that would be a credit to men of greater pretensions as financiers and business men. With their colleagues and associates they have stood shoulder to shoulder for economy, good public service, decency and plain house sense in the administration of public affairs. Whether they want it or not, they are now as good as nominated for the good record they have made and for the thousands of dollars they helped save to the taxpayers of the city.
