## SYNOD OF OREGON

Holding Successful Sessions of its Annual Meeting at Salem.

Interesting Programs by Day and Night Will Continue to Monday.

After singing, Rev. Snyder called the synod to order Thursday evening. He asked Rev. Eggleston to read the Scripture.

Rev. W. S. Gilbert, chaplain of the Second Oregon, offered a prayer that was a welcome introduction of this young fighting pastor to the Salem audience. His prayer showed him to be a man of refinement and feeling and of great spiritual force.

Will Ketchum sang a fine solo, and then Rev. E. P. Hill, D. D., of Portland, preached the synodical sermon. He chose for his text part of verse 7, second chapter, First Peter: "Unto you therefore which believe, He is precious." He is earnest, and zealous, uses a flowing rhetorical vocabulary, and rises at times to power and eloquence.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS. At the conclusion of Dr. Hill's sermon, Rev. E. J. Thompson, as acting moderator, convened the opening business session of the synod. Rev. John Morrison, of Portland, was elected as moderator at the last meeting of the synod, but the reverend gentleman died during the summer, leaving a vacancy. The election of moderator resulted in the unanimous choice of Rev. Alexander S. Foster, of Myrtle Point, of the Southern Oregon Presbytery. In surrendering to the newly-elected moderator, the gavel, Rev. Thompson made a very happy address, to which Rev. Foster made a fitting response.

Rev. A. J. Montgomery, of Portland, was elected temporary clerk, and Rev. Thos. Boyd, also of Portland, was named reporting secretary for the synod. Rev. F. G. Strange, of the Southern Oregon Presbytery, was elected permanent clerk.

That Puts an End to Wild Rumors and Shows that the Disease is Under Control.

The following affidavit is given publicly that the citizens of Salem and the surrounding country shall know the exact truth of the status of the small pox in the city.

STATE OF OREGON, COUNTY OF MARION.

I, E. A. Pierce, M. D., health officer of Salem, Oregon, being first duly sworn, depose and say: That there are at this moment but two individual cases of small pox in or near Salem, namely, the baby boy of Mrs. Wm Battersby, at the Musser residence, and Carl Putnam, at the post house. Both are doing well and practically safe.

There is but one suspect, and he is almost past the period of danger, and shows no symptoms. I anticipate no further trouble.
