DOM PAUL'S PEOPLE.

Dom Paul's people, the Boers, are the farmers of South Africa. Descended from the Dutch, they use an antiquated Dutch language, and resemble that people more than any other. The history of this people is pervaded throughout with a sublime religious faith—as one may note who has read the recent dispatches—heroic courage and a devotion to principle. They moved once because they did not like to be under the iron hand of England, and they now say that they will not move again. The Boers formerly lived in Cape Colony, that province in Africa which is at the very southern end of the continent. After the annexation of Cape Colony by Great Britain, trouble arose between the colonial government and the Boers, and in 1836 many of the Boers left the colony and founded the Orange Free State and the Transvaal republic, in the then wild country immediately north of Cape Colony. In 1858 they gave themselves a constitution and the republic was soon organized. The Boers had a hard time of it in setting up their new country in the face of the opposition of savage tribes, but they are a sturdy and plucky race and they finally won. In 1877 the Cape government, fearing an outbreak that might result in a general uprising of the blacks, who in all of these South African countries represent the majority of the inhabitants, annexed the Boer territory. Three years later the Boers took up arms to regain their independence, and after defeating the British colonial troops in several engagements a treaty was finally signed in 1881 under which British suzerainty was recognized as to foreign affairs. The Boer was not satisfied, however, and three years later the treaty was modified and British suzerainty was practically given up by the British. When the Boers went north into a wild country to gain their independence they unconsciously settled over the richest gold and diamond mines in the world. It was fortunate for them and then again it was unfortunate, for though those mines have brought them much money, and have been the prime cause of the development of their nation, at the same time those treasures hidden in the earth have caused the envious eyes of foreigners to covet the country. The Boers have been greedy and the English have been greedy, and as a natural result they are now fighting.

MORNING FIRE

Mrs. T. H. Hubbard's Residence Nearly Destroyed.

Contents Almost A Total Loss. Fire Starts From a Lamp Left Burning in Kitchen.

The residence of Mrs. Thos. Hubbard, corner Commercial and Marion streets, was the scene of a conflagration early this Friday morning which resulted in heavy damage to the building and a nearly total loss of the contents. Mrs. Hubbard estimates the loss at between \$4000 and \$5000. The building was insured with the Beeler agency in the Sun Insurance Co., for \$1400, and the contents in the Continental Co., for \$1375.

The fire originated in the kitchen, from a lamp that had been left burning there. The family, consisting of Mrs. Hubbard and her two sons and a daughter, occupied the house. At a little after 2 o'clock Mrs. Hubbard awoke and detected the odor of smoke. She instantly arose and found the kitchen was afire. She roused the others, and her son, T. H., slipped on his trousers and ran to the city hall and gave the alarm.

The fire department responded promptly and ran a line of hose from the hydrant at the corner Commercial and Center streets. The engine was stationed at the corner of Chemeketa and Commercial streets, but the hose failed to reach the fire until some delay in sending back for more.

At this time the fire was still confined to the kitchen, which is an ell on the rear of the two-story main building, but the first stream was directed upon the ell from the outside, and in the meantime the fire made its way into the other part of the house and every room was invaded, the contents being practically destroyed.

Willing hands were ready to aid in taking out the moveables, but the front part of the house was kept closed for some time with the idea of shutting off the draught from the flames. Eventually the piano, a new one costing \$500, was taken out, but not until its casing had been charred, and the instrument is probably ruined.

Little else was rescued, and clothing, furniture, books, pictures and bric-a-brac impossible to replace were destroyed by fire or water.

By the time the flames were subdued, at about 4 o'clock, there was little left but a charred ruin, which it would cost nearly as much to repair as it would to rebuild.

Entering an upper room from the veranda to rescue a box of valuable papers belonging to Mrs. Hubbard Edie Lamport received a bad gash on the right foot from broken glass and Fire Chief Churchill cut his left hand, also with broken glass.

VREYBURG SUBDUED

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail, telegraphing at a late hour last night, says: "Vreyburg surrendered on Sunday. Tonight's dispatches from Kuruman, ten miles east by south of Vreyburg, state that the police have withdrawn from Vreyburg, the town surrendered to the Boers, the inhabitants fleeing in all directions, mostly toward Kuruman. When the police withdrew the Cape Boers communicated the fact to the enemy, thus inviting them to take possession. There was a fearful panic."

No news of importance has been received from Natal today. The cavalry attached to our forces at Ladysmith and Dundee are engaged in observing the enemy's movements.

Steps have been taken to secure Pietermaritzburg and Durban against raids on the western frontier. There is no recent reliable intelligence from Kimberley or Mafeking, both places being cut off from railway and telegraphic communication. It is believed, however, that a skirmish took place on Sunday, six miles south of Kimberley, and that the Boers were beaten off with some loss, by an armored train. There was some fighting at Mafeking on Friday or Saturday, ending with a repulse from the attacking force.

Railway communication with the Orange Free State and the Transvaal has now ceased, the remaining refugees having been warned to leave by way of Delagoa bay.

Boers Slaughtered.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The Daily News Cape Town correspondent says it is rumored that news had reached Deau Junction that the Boers attacked Mafeking in force, but were repulsed. The defenders, seeing the enemy retreating, pursued them for some distance. Then a faint was made and they commenced to retire on the town, allowing themselves to be driven in by the Boers, who, eager to retrieve their positions, again advanced to the attack, and were drawn over the Lydlite mines, laid for the defense of the town. It is rumored that 1500 Boers were killed by the explosion.

Wounded Burglers. LONDON, Oct. 10.—The Daily Mail Cape Town correspondent says: A refugee, who has reached Grahamstown from the Rand, states that a train arrived at Johannesburg on Monday, from Klerksdorp, with 300 wounded burglers.

Yaquna Carried Away.

Yaquna (Or.) Oct. 20.—A gale has been blowing for the past twenty-four hours, accompanied by heavy rain, thunder and lightning. A heavy sea yesterday carried away about 700 feet of the north jetty works.
