CRISIS IN VENEZUELA PRACTICALLY OVER

CARACAS, Venezuela, Oct. 20.—The crisis is virtually over. Andrade, the president, has accepted the conditions proposed by the insurgent commander, Castro, and will go abroad, the presidency devolving on the vice-president. Castro will enter Caracas peacefully, thus avoiding bloodshed.

SWEGLE VS. LEARNED.

Suit for Possession of the Milk Ranch East of Town.

In Justice Johnson's court the case of Swegle vs. Learned is on trial this afternoon before a jury consisting of S. A. Hughes, S. S. Martin, W. H. Phillips, A. W. Veach, Geo. Beeman and R. D. Holman.

Swegle is suing for possession of a piece of land east of the asylum, which has been used by Learned since 1890, under a lease, the terms of which have not been strictly complied with by Learned, the defendant in this suit.

The defendant acknowledges that at the first of last July some \$275 was due on rent, but alleges that at that time an agreement was made whereby defendant would pay \$3 per week in advance, and have until the expiration of the lease on Jan. 1, 1901 in which to pay the back rent.

The plaintiff's case is conducted by W. T. Slater and the defense by J. H. and G. L. McNary.

COMING STRIKE.

Trainmen Expect to Tie Up the Great Northern.

ST. PAUL, Oct. 20.—A general strike on the Great Northern will probably occur within a few days. It will include conductors, engineers, firemen, brakemen and switchmen, and the men expect to tie up the road from end to end.

In the great strike of five years ago, the conductors held aloof, but they have been brought into the present trouble by a recent order requiring them to pay for bonds covering damages to trains under their charge. The list of grievances given by the men is a long one, and they claim to have been unable to secure anything like satisfaction from the management. Since last March grievance committees have been almost constantly in this city trying to reach some agreement with the railway officials but without result.
