HOP NEWS.

Bargains Items of Justice to Hop Growers.

J. A. Jones, of Newberg, was in town today to make sure a sale of his hops, having 70 bales of good hops for which he was offered 93 cents.

John H. Daly, of Macksburg, reports that he sold 11,000 pounds of hops for 83 cents and considers that he made a fortunate sale. He stated that fully one-fourth of the hops held in the vicinity of Macksburg and Aurora had been sold in small lots at prices ranging from 7 to 83 cents.

Says the Gervais Star: Hop growers have accomplished one thing, if no more, by organization, viz: They have stopped the downward tendency of the hop market, which in itself is valuable. Eastern dealers are beginning to realize that no one or two hopping firms can pledge the hop crop of Oregon at bankrupt prices, and already orders are more common and at a liberal advance over former prices. The arrested market may yet develop into a better market.

E. C. Hansen went to Portland this morning to receive a lot of hops for the Lewis H. Searis Company.

Lewis R. Searis went to points north this morning to receive hops for their firm.

The Horst Brothers hop yard will be seeded down to wheat. They contemplate a telephone line from their yards in Polk county.

Hillsboro Independent.

The price of hops is in the mud in this county. Two lots have been sold at 11 cents "special contract." It begins to look like the buyers are going to punish the growers a little because they would not contract their crop ahead for a year. A little more of such dickering and the farmers will plow up the yards, when the occupation of the agents will be gone.

John Brisbane, of Forest Grove, sold on Friday 15,000 pounds of hops at 12c a pound.

SERVICE DISCONTINUED.

Car No Longer Run to the Garden Road.

On Fair Grounds Line.

The street car company this morning discontinued the service on the Fair Grounds branch of the "big" car line.

A car has been running on this branch from Asylum Avenue as far as the Garden Road; from there to the Fair Grounds cars are never run regularly except during the state fair season.

People on the Garden Road will greatly miss the service to which they have become accustomed. While the trade on this section of the road has been light and has probably not paid directly, yet it has been a feeder for the main line and has been a great convenience for people in that part of the suburbs.

Some of the Salem merchants object to this action of the street car company. They say that people will find it more inconvenient to come down town to trade. One merchant says that he has serious thoughts of discontinuing his electric lights if his trade is injured by the failure of the car service.

Killed by a Tree.

GRANT'S PARK, Nov. 11.—C. Grant Toppling, William's Creek, lost his life Wednesday, while cutting down a tree. In some manner the tree turned in falling and caught the unfortunate man between it and another tree, crushing him so badly that he died in a short time. He was about thirty-five years of age, and left a widow and five children. He was a member of the A. O. U. W. The funeral will be held Sunday.

KENTUCKY ELECTION

FRANKFORT, Nov. 11.—Gobel by 1900 to 1900, is the claim made at Gobel headquarters today. Several county boards have adjourned until Monday, and it is claimed they hope to make sufficient gains to offset the losses. Gobel was sustained in his own and other counties yesterday.

ELECTION NEWS.

Official Count in Kentucky Favoring Taylor for Governor.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 11.—In about 65 of the 119 counties the official count was completed last night. These, in net results, show a gain for Taylor.

Chairman Long says Taylor's plurality will be over 3,000. In Democratic circles, however, there is no disposition to concede the Republican claims. Gobel says his plurality will be about 5,000.

Devastation in Jamaica.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Nov. 11.—Communication with the eastern parts of the island, particularly the section beyond the line from Morant bay to Port Antonio, has been interrupted since Thursday. This evening however, it is being partially re-established, and advices from various points say the heavy weather culminated in a tremendous hurricane, which during the night partly razed the banana parishes. Portland St. Thomas and Morant bay are reported severely damaged. Details are anxiously awaited.

Is Defiant.

Puerto Cabello, Venezuela, Nov. 11.—General Parades absolutely refuses to agree to any proposal of surrender. A conference was held between the British, German, Dutch and American captains here, and as a result W. W. Russell, secretary of the United States legation, was sent to discuss the matter with General Parades and to try to effect an arrangement. He proved to be defiant, and intimated to Mr. Russell that he was ready to fight any force General Castro would send against him.

Murder and Suicide.

ALLENTOWN, Pa., Nov. 11.—George W. Kern, proprietor of a hotel shot himself and his wife. The couple had not been living together lately.

TO ENCOURAGE IMMIGRATION.

Chamber of Commerce Laying Plans for Sending Out An Agent.

At a meeting of the Salem Chamber of Commerce Friday afternoon plans were discussed for encouraging immigration into this section.

C. H. Markham, general passenger agent for the S. P. R., was present and the matter of advertising the Willamette valley and bringing its advantages before intending immigrants was thoroughly canvassed.

President Geo. B. Gray and Secretary H. B. Thielson were appointed a committee to devise some plan for sending an agent east to work up immigration.

The committee previously appointed to prepare the endorsement of the chamber for the Willamette university's plan of raising money, brought in a report which was adopted, and the address will soon be made public.

Woman Reform Worker.

Mrs. Ada Ururah, the national organizer of the W. C. T. U., is in the city and spoke this afternoon at the W. C. T. U. hall on "An Hour in Babyland."

It was a practical talk on a subject which Mrs. Ururah has extended into a volume which she hopes to have published in the coming year.

RACKET PRICES.

MASKED ROBBER BLOW UP A SAFE

TITUSVILLE, Pa., Nov. 11.—Three masked robbers blew open the safe at the railway ticket office last night and secured about \$450. The Bandits then went to a disorderly house and proceeded to relieve the proprietress and inmates of valuables amounting \$1,000 worth jewelry and \$500 in cash.

Chief of Police McGrath and Officer Sheehy attempted to make an arrest. A pitched battle ensued. Three shots struck McGrath. Officer Sheehy was shot in the mouth inflicting a dangerous wound. Robbers escaped. Later the dead body of one robber was found.
