SHOOTING AT SILVERTON

W. R. Smith Wounded in the Arm by His Son.

Family Troubles of Long Duration Culminate in Serious Disturbance of the Peace.

W. R. Smith of Silverton was shot in the arm Monday by one of his sons inflicting a serious but not dangerous wound.

As near as can be gathered from the meager particulars received, the facts are as follows:

W. R. Smith was at his ranch in the mountains, some six or eight miles from Silverton. His two sons William and Ordie went to the place, an altercation ensued and William Smith fired a shot at his father which took effect in his arm. Smith was brought to Silverton and his wound was attended to, and the younger man was placed under arrest.

A telephone message from Silverton was received last evening by District Attorney Hayden informing him that a shooting affray had occurred near there which W. R. Smith had been shot and wounded by his son, and asking the district attorney to come up and conduct the preliminary examination at ten o'clock today. This morning it was found that Smith would not be able to appear in court today, and on advice of Mr. Hayden the examination has been postponed until the wounded man can give his testimony.

There has been trouble in the Smith family before. A divorce was obtained by Mrs. W. R. Smith at the present term of court and the disagreements of the Smiths have been of a quasipublic character in the Silverton neighborhood for a long time.

SOME INTERVIEWS

Citizens' Administration of Salem Affairs Endorsed By Scores of Republicans and Business Men.

Prominent Citizens Speak Out for the Non-Partisan Idea—Their Demand for Continued Good City Government is Almost Unanimous.

Below are given short interviews with many of Salem's best business men, citizens and taxpayers, with reference to the present administration of city affairs, all of which speak well for the same. Among them are not a few who did not support the movement a year ago, but after the showing that has been made they cannot refuse to accept the results. Many more who are timid about publishing matters, endorse what has been done and give their unqualified support, but do not care to be quoted. The plain truth is the sentiment for good city government is almost unanimous.

A. N. Moore—We should have a ticket that will be a guarantee of continuing the good methods of the present administration. The present regime has given excellent satisfaction, especially to the taxpayers.

R. J. Fleming—I think considerable money has been saved the past year, and that the city's affairs have been carefully handled.

N. J. Damon—The Bishop administration has been the cleanest, most progressive, economical and business-like that Salem has had within my knowledge.

A. Bush—I favor non-partisan administration of municipal affairs. It cannot be denied that its trial in Salem has been successful.

F. T. Carey, manager for the Salem branch of the Mitchell Lewis & Staver Co.—It has been a success financially, and any man who has taxes to pay ought to endorse the present council with his vote.

J. Q. Wilson—I favor the administration as far as it keeps within its income. What we can't pay for we should do without. Don't favor selling part of the park for a postoffice site.

S. T. Northcutt—I think its all right. We want more of the same kind of men. The present administration should be sustained.

O. E. Krause—The administration generally is a big improvement on what we have had in the past.

T. Holverson—We can't do any better than keep the same kind of men in office. It's the best administration we have had.

F. A. Wiggins—I am opposed to partisan politics. We should elect men on merit only. The present administration has demonstrated that they know what they are about, and should be upheld.

Steufuld Bros.—It is strictly all right, and a few years more of the same medicine will fix our city all right.

J. G. Wright—Financially the best administration we have had for years.

The Birchard Case.

The case of the state vs. Wm. Birchard who was tried for rape before Judge Burnett in February 1897, was on Monday argued before the supreme court on appeal. Messrs. Sherman, Condit & Park, O. H. Irvine and James McCain appeared for defendant, while Dist. Atty., S. L. Hayden, and J. H. McNary represented the state. A reversal is asked on the following grounds:

I. Defendant was, by limiting time of trial to one hour, precluded from siding the court in instructing the jury.
II. Failure to instruct the jury as required by statute.
III. Instruction requested by defendant, but refused.
IV. Oral request for instruction.
V. Refusal to allow a moment's continuance for appearance of witness.
VI. Refusal of the court to allow questions regarding the relations of defendant and his family.
VII. Improper remarks of district attorney.
VIII. Erroneous instructions by the court.
