## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

Continued from third page.

The equally important work of reconstruction. Again I invite your attention to the report of the commissioners or the interesting and encouraging details of the work already accomplished in the establishment of peace and order and the inauguration of self governing municipal life in many portions of the archipelago. The forces now in the Philippines aggregate 2199 officers and 45,968 men. When the troops now under orders shall reach Manila the force in the archipelago will comprise 2651 officers and 63,483 men. The President heartily concurs in the recommendation of the navy for the increase of the navy.

**Government in Negros.**  
A notable beginning has been made in the establishment of a government in the island of Negros, which is deserving of special consideration. This was the first island to accept American sovereignty. Its people unreservedly proclaimed allegiance to the U. S. and adopted a constitution looking to the establishment of a popular government. The civil governor advises the military governor on all public and civil questions and presides over the advisory council. He in general, performs the duties which are performed by secretaries of state in our own system of government. The advisory council consists of 8 members elected by the people within territorial limits which are defined in order of the commanding general.

**Holding Elections.**  
The times and places of holding elections are to be fixed by the military governor of the island of Negros. The qualifications of voters are as follows:  
1. A voter must be a male citizen of the island of Negros.  
2. Of the age of 21 years.  
3. He shall be able to speak, read and write the English, Spanish or Visayan language, or he must own real property worth \$500 or pay a rental on real property of the value of \$1000.  
4. He must have resided in the island not less than one year preceding and in the district in which he offers to register as a voter not less than three months immediately preceding the time he offers to register.  
5. He must register at a time fixed by law before voting.

**Free Schools Promised.**  
Free public schools are to be established throughout the populous districts of the islands in which the English language shall be taught and this subject will receive the careful consideration of the advisory council.

**Our Flag Over Sulu.**  
The authorities of the Sulu islands have accepted the accession of the U. S. to the rights of Spain and our flag floats over that territory. On the 10th of Aug. 1899, Brigadier General Bates, U. S. V., negotiated an agreement with the Sultan and his principal chiefs, which I transmit herewith. By article 1, the sovereignty of the U. S. over the whole archipelago of Jolo and its dependencies is declared and acknowledged. The U. S. flag will be used in the archipelago and its dependencies, on land and sea. Piracy is to be suppressed and the sultan agrees to co-operate heartily with the U. S. authorities to that end and to make every possible effort to arrest and bring to justice all persons engaged in piracy. All trade in domestic products of the archipelago of Jolo will be carried on with any part of the Philippine islands and under the American flag shall be free, unlimited and undisturbed.

**Protect the Sultan.**  
The U. S. will give full protection to the sultan in case any foreign nation should attempt to impose upon him. The U. S. will not sell the island of Jolo or any other island of the Jolo archipelago to any foreign nation without the consent of the sultan. Salaries for the sultan and his associates in the administration of the islands have been agreed upon to the amount of \$700 a month.

**Deals With Slavery.**  
Article X provides that any slave in the archipelago of Jolo shall have the right to purchase freedom by paying to the master the usual market value. The agreement by Gen. Bates was made subject to confirmation by the president and to future modifications by the consent of the parties in interest. I have confirmed said agreement subject to the action of the congress and with the reservation which has directed shall be communicated to the sultan of Jolo, but this agreement is not to be deemed in any way to authorize or give the consent of the U. S. to the existence of slavery in the Sulu archipelago. I communicate these facts to the congress for its information and action.

**Bright Future of Luzon.**  
Everything indicates that with the speedy suppression of the Tagalog rebellion, life in the archipelago will soon assume its ordinary course under the protection of our sovereignty and the people of those favored islands will enjoy a prosperity and a freedom which they have never before known. Already hundreds of schools are open and filled with children. Religious freedom is sacredly assured and enjoyed, the courts are dispensing justice. Business is beginning to circulate in its accustomed channels. Manila, whose inhabitants

were fleeing to the country a few months ago, is now a populous and thriving mart of commerce.

**Rest With Congress.**  
The future government of the Philippines rest with the congress of the U. S. Few grave responsibilities have ever been confided to us. If we accept them in a spirit worthy of our race and our traditions a great opportunity opens with them. The islands lie under the shelter of our flag. They are ours by every title of law and equity. They cannot be abandoned. If we desert them we leave them at once to anarchy and anarchy leads to barbarism. We fling them as a golden apple of discord, among the rival powers, no one of which could permit another to seize them unopposed. Their rich plains and valleys would be the scene of endless strife and bloodshed. The advent of Dewey's fleet in Manila bay instead of being, as we hope, the dawn of a new day of freedom and progress, will have been the beginning of an era of misery and violence worse than any which has darkened their unhappy past.

**Protectorate Impossible.**  
The suggestion has been made that we could renounce our authority over the islands and, giving them independence, could make a protectorate over them. This proposition will not be found, I am sure, worthy of your serious attention. Such an arrangement would involve at the outset a cruel peaceable and loyal majority, who would ask nothing better than to accept our authority, at the mercy of armed insurgents.

**Peace Before Legislation.**  
It does not seem desirable that I should recommend at this time a specific and final form of government for these islands. When peace shall be restored it will be the duty of congress to construct a plan of government which shall establish and maintain freedom and order and peace in the Philippines. The insurrection is still existing and when it terminates further information will be required as to the actual condition of affairs before inaugurating a permanent scheme of civil government. The full report of the commission is now in preparation.

**Reconstruction at Once.**  
No effort will be spared to build up the waste places desolated by war and by long years of misgovernment. We shall not wait for the end of the strife to begin the beneficent work. We shall continue, as we have begun, to open the schools and the churches, to set the courts in operation, to foster industry and trade and agriculture and in every way in our power to make these people, whom providence has brought within our jurisdiction feel that it is their liberty and not our power, their welfare and not our gain that we are seeking to enhance. Our flag has never waved over any community but in blessing. I believe the Filipinos will soon recognize the fact that it has not lost its gift of benediction in its world wide journey to their shores.

**Hawaiian Territory.**  
The commissioners have prepared a bill to establish "The Territory of Hawaii." The report of the commission with the bill which they prepared was transmitted by me to congress on December 6, 1898, but the bill still awaits final action. The people of those islands are entitled to the benefits and privileges of our legislation.

**Puerto Rico.**  
I recommend that legislation to the same end be had with reference to Puerto Rico. The time is ripe for the
