CITY FINANCES.

The city council last evening cleaned up, so far as possible, all outstanding bills of 1909, and left a clean slate for the beginning of the next year and century.

By doing this they will commence the year under the new charter in a position to fulfill the provisions of that instrument, which provides that each year's expenses must be estimated before the beginning of the year, and that the estimate made shall not be exceeded.

The annual statement of the city's financial affairs, upon which Recorder Judah has been working for some time, will show a very gratifying improvement over that of last year.

The city's income has been materially increased and the expenses, including the interest account, have been cut down to the tune of thousands of dollars. But for the very unfortunate incursion of small-pox the showing would have been close to two thousand dollars better than it is.

However, there is this much consolation on that point, under the old order, this burden would have been very much in the nature of a last straw to break the back of the over-loaded camel of city credit, and at best would have put the city that much deeper in the hole. As it is, it simply cuts down the handsome surplus, and the city does not take quite so long a stride out of debt as she otherwise would.

WALL STREET IN HOT WATER.

The collapse of the "industrial" or trust stocks in the early part of the week, the general dropping of stock prices in a way alarming to the bull traders on Wall street, who have deeply speculated in stocks for a rise and hold securities of insurmountable schemes that they have been unable to float on the public, securities that they have pledged with the banks for loans, has caused the sending up to Secretary Gage of an insistent call for further

and greater help. The treasury must come again to the relief of Wall street, or say these bull traders, there will be disaster. For the cash reserves of the New York banks are being drained by shipments of money to the interior to meet the growing needs and demands of those engaged in industrial pursuits, who are expanding production, making greater sales, disbursing more money as wages. Trade expanding and growing more active in the industrial centers, the demand for money in such centers likewise grows. Money laid up on deposit with the New York bank and by the banks of the industrial centers when business was duller is called for by those latter banks, brought home, put into circulation, absorbed by the industrial centers more actively engaged in trade. And the New York banks, sustaining this drain, their reserves drawn down, call upon the bull traders, or shall we not say gamblers for a rise, to repay loans made to them on pledge of stock exchange securities. So such securities are forced upon the markets and they drop in price, threatening with disaster those who have bought them on borrowed money, speculated in them for an advance.—Philadelphia American.

A NEWSPAPER'S PLATFORM.

The Indianapolis Press, the new newspaper of Messrs. Holliday & Richards, comes up in terse language the mission is undertaken. The platform is as follows:

To strive to tell the truth under all circumstances; to be honest with itself and with its own thinking; to discuss public men and public measures, not dogmatically, "as one having authority," but as man to man, as one neighbor argues with another on a topic in which both have a common interest and which both want settled rightly; to have no standing alliances, no political favorites, no hope of political reward or of profit that does not come from legitimate business; to treat all men and their varied opinions fairly; to be independent of influences, however reputable, of themselves, that may create bias or blind the eyes to the best interests of the people, and always to speak fearlessly.

It would be difficult to outline a more

commendable course in independent journalism or one better calculated to win a loyal constituency. If the Press sticks to its text it will make a success of its venture.

THAT FINANCIAL BILL

An exchange thus summarizes the gold standard law now before congress for passage:

This measure provides first that the standard unit of value shall be the dollar consisting of 25.8 grains of gold, nine-tenths fine, or 23.22 grains of pure gold. It then provides that all interest bearing obligations of the United States now existing or hereafter to be entered into, and all United States notes and treasury notes issued under the law of July 14, 1890, shall be deemed and held to be payable in gold coin of the United States. Not satisfied with making government obligations payable in nothing but gold coin it provides that the payment of all private obligations, no matter what the contract, shall be in gold by saying "and all other obligations, public and private, for the payment of money, shall be performed in conformity with the standard established in this act."

Section 4 of the bill provides for the operation of the "endless chain" and the forced issue of interest bearing bonds whenever money holders shall find it more profitable to loan their money to the government than to invest it in private enterprises. It says:

"It shall be the duty of the secretary to maintain the gold reserve fund taken up on the books of the division of issue and redemption, as herein provided, and for this purpose he may from time to time transfer to such fund any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated or may exchange any of the funds in division of issue and redemption for other funds which may be in the general fund of the treasury, and in addition hereto is hereby authorized to issue and sell, whenever in his judgment it is necessary to the maintenance of said reserve fund, bonds of the United States bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 2 per cent annum, payable in gold coin at the option of the United States after one year." It then goes on to say: "That all United States notes issued under the act of July 14, 1890, presented for redemption shall be redeemed in accordance with the existing law."

That portion of the bill referring to the issuance of credit currency places it entirely in the hands of national banks, secured by interest bearing government bonds, and permits the secretary of the treasury to redeem or accept such notes. The tax on bank circulation is reduced to one-tenth of one per cent.
