THE TRAMP PROBLEM.

The Difficulty of Solving it Under Existing Conditions.

Editor JOURNAL.—The Oregonian of a few days ago had an editorial headed "The treatment of Vagrancy" from which the following excerpt is taken:

A problem that is always with us—a "by-product," so to speak, of civilization—is found in the above words. Various methods have been applied to its solution—imprisonment; the bitter penalty of enforced labor; cheap boarding-houses; missions that supply the gospel of encouragement and strive to promote the gospel of cleanliness; religious influences, and, finally, all failing, the authoritative order to "move on," have all been applied and singly or combined have failed to give a satisfactory answer. The great army of the homeless, the indigent and the destitute shows no diminution in numbers. The most discouraging feature of the case is that the vagrant, born and bred, is well content with his lowly, degraded estate, literally "owing no care and fearing no ill." A bivouac in his malodorous blankets wherever he can find room to spread them has no discomfort for him, and prison means shelter and food during stress or storm. Work is his only dread, and he is an expert in managing it so that it becomes a dread as well as to the municipality that imposes it upon him.

Maud Ballington Booth, whose name is synonym for earnest endeavor in the treatment of this moral disease, says: "I cannot see that we have yet found any remedy for vagrancy that will do more than afford temporary relief."

City shelters as a scheme for curing vagrancy are equally unsuccessful. Having thoroughly conscientiously and laboriously tried this plan, Mrs. Booth says: "I realize that the great proportion of the lodgers utilize the shelters for temporary convenience, and that this plan merely relieves and does not effect a permanent cure for vagrancy." Summing up the phases of this perplexing question, this competent authority says: "The class under consideration, in my judgment, should be treated as individuals, not in bodies. A large proportion of them have known no other manner of living, and have followed in the idle and vicious ways of their parents. Religious advice, in the form of addresses no matter how forcible or eloquent, has no effect on such people. They are too deadened to realize its meaning. Only individual effort will benefit them."

In the light of this advice and the experience upon which it is based, the waste in money and energy that has ensued from the attempt to lift vagrants as a class in urban community life out of the idleness and squalor in which they prefer to pass their lives, is appalling. TRIMBLE.—At her home on Summer street, Salem, at 5 p. m. Jan. 9, Mrs. Sarah Allen Trimble, aged 88 years. Deceased had been ill about two years, dating from a bad fall received while visiting at La Grande.

Sarah Benson was born in Tennessee May 31, 1814. She was married in Illinois in Sept. 1827, to Samuel Allen. They afterward removed to Missouri, and came to Oregon in 1847, locating near where Silverton now stands. In 1870 they moved to Salem, where Mr. Allen died in 1876. On June 14, 1878, Mrs. Allen was married to S. A. Trimble, who survives here. Five children are also living: Thos. B. Allen, of Portland; Mrs. Evelyn Donaldson, of Salem; Mrs. A. W. Sweeney, of Walla Walla; Mrs. Linnie A. Seltmeier, of Summerville, and Miss M. L. Allen of Salem.

The remains will be taken to Woodburn on the overland Thursday morning, where services will be conducted at 10:30 a. m. and interment will take place in Bel Passi cemetery.
