## DO NOT DELAY

Voters Should Attend to the Matter as Soon as Possible.

If Put Off Until Late Some May Get Left—County Clerk Utters a Warning.

County Clerk Hall is inclined to be on the anxious seat on the matter of the registration of voters, and says that unless the citizens come in faster during the first part of the time during which the book is open, there is likely to be a rush toward the last that will leave some good voters hanging over the edge when the books close, which they must do at 5 o'clock p. m. May 15th.

It seems quite a while till May 15, and probably it has not occurred to many voters that there is any occasion to be in a hurry, but when it is figured out it is seen that there is none too great a margin.

There are about 6,500 voters in the county. The county clerk says that he can register about 100 per day if they appear in person at his office. When they register before notaries and the blanks are sent to him he can handle about 50. He thinks that about half the names will come in in that way. On this basis there are 96 days' work. Less than 100 days left after today, and there are 107 days left after today. This leaves a margin of only 11 days, if applications come in fast enough to keep one man busy all the time.

There is little chance to utilize assistants and thus expedite registration, for the names must all go into one book, which stays in the clerk's office.

There is still plenty of time, but if the majority put off registering until the last two or three weeks it will be physically impossible to attend to them all. It would not be practicable to work night shifts for voters will not stand in line all night for the sake of being registered.

Clerk Hall intends to keep his office open from now on during all reasonable business hours, not closing from 12 to 1, being on hand in the evening if necessary for the convenience of voters. He doesn't want any one to get left, no matter what his political complexion.

Voters should bear this matter in mind and register at the first opportunity.
