ONE TOO MANY.

Frank Gardner in Jail On a Charge of Bigamy.

The following dispatch from Hillsboro explains itself:

Constable Sappington has returned from Wasco county, having in his custody Frank M. Gardner, who is charged with being a polygamist.

It appears of record in Marion county that in 1895 Gardner married Alice Church, of the vicinity of Salem. One child was born to them. Several years ago Gardner left his wife and took employment as brakeman with the Southern Pacific on the Portland Corvallis line.

October 6, 1896, he married Mrs. Phillips Ford, of Hillsboro, formerly of Cornelius, and to whom he represented that he had procured a divorce from his first wife.

The first wife recently became ill and went to a hospital in Portland, where she met a Hillsboro man who had a wife under the doctor's care at the same place.

Making inquiries, she found that Gardner had again married, and she at once notified Deputy District Attorney Bagley to have the arrest made. Gardner is now in the county jail awaiting an examination.

WOODBURN MEETING

Oregon Hop Growers Association, Decide on a Pool for 1900.

Unanimity and Good Feeling Prevail and Much Encouragement Is Received.

The meeting of the Oregon Hop Growers Association at Woodburn Saturday practically settled the question of a hop pool for 1900. There will be a pool, and it will have the unanimous support of the progressive hop growers of the state. Not only will the growers enter the movement but strong assurances of support and co-operation have been received from many bankers, dealers and business men.

A letter from Gilbert Bros. of this city was read also from H. J. Ottenheimer, both commending the good work of the association and giving much encouragement.

The growers present voted unanimously for a pool of the 1900 crop, and the officers of the association were instructed to arrange the details.

The association will furnish supplies, such as hop cloth, sulphur, etc. to growers, and endeavor to prevent a corner in any of these supplies.

At a later meeting of the directors a 20 per cent assessment was levied, payable in 60 days.

WANTED A BIIBE.

Woodburn Taking On the Airs of a larger City.

At a special meeting of the Woodburn city council Saturday night, a contract was awarded to A. B. Kurtz to light the city streets for two years at \$68 per month, using 10 arc lamps of 2000 candle power.

Mr. Kurtz recently established an electric light plant in Woodburn with a view to getting a contract for street lighting. While negotiations were in progress a sensation was sprung on the community in the shape of a story that one of the aldermen had offered his vote and influence to Mr. Kurtz for \$50 cash.

The fact that the Woodburn atmosphere seems to breed factional quarrels, however, caused the story to be discredited, and since the contract is awarded the excitement has died away.

Max Miller Buried.

The remains of Max Miller, who died at Colfax, Wn., arrived last evening accompanied by his sorrowing mother. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. John Parsons at 2 p. m. today, at the residence on South Commercial street, and burial took place in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.

In order to prevent a repetition, he was confined in what is sometimes facetiously called a "dungeon," but broke out during the supper hour last evening and skipped out with an iron boot on his leg, which had been fastened upon him for further safety. He was overtaken at Roseburg about noon and taken back to the school.

TRAIN WRECK.

Collision in a Tunnel Near Roseburg—One Man Injured.

The morning overland is about nine hours late today, being delayed by a train wreck, caused by a tie train and a storm shovel trying to pass each other on a single track in tunnel No. 3 near Westfork last evening. One man had his leg broken.

The track was cleared in about 12 hours and the 4:14 train was not much delayed.
