NEWS WITHOUT TYPE

To give the news without printing is the purpose of the Stereo Revue, the latest invention in journalism. Three young Frenchmen, Messieurs Benquet, Bouffier and Pimbert, have realized this original idea in the following manner: From the central office in the rue de Province photographic reporters are sent out all over Paris and its environs, as well as to the department and foreign countries where anything is happening of general interest to the public. Each of these reporters is furnished with a veroscope or instrument for photographing on glass and double negatives, which he fastens in the stereoscope, and by means of a knob turns before his eyes, revealing with striking reality scenes of which the newspaper descriptions can give a comparatively meagre suggestion. Messieurs Benquet, Bouffier and Pimbert have so far perfected this process of reporting that, while in reality scenes of home with only a delicate modern machine before one, one needs color alone to complete the illusion of being present at diverting, interesting and exciting occurrences in all parts of the world.

THE WIDE-TIRE LAW.

Some inquiry having been made as to the new law in reference to wide-tired wagons, which is now in operation, we publish the act in full, as follows:

"From and after the 1st day of January, A. D. 1900, the county court or county board, of each county within this state, is hereby authorized to make a rebate each year, for four years, on the road tax of each person within its county who shall own and have in habitual use on the highways of this state, wagons or other vehicles for the transportation of freight and other heavy articles, the tires of which are not less than three inches in width, of \$1 for each wheel of such vehicle; and provided, further, that the owner of each vehicle having tires four inches in width, upon which there is a difference of at least eight inches in the length of the front and rear axle, so constructed that the front and rear wheels will not come in contact with the same road surface while the vehicle is moving in a straight line, shall receive, in addition to the aforesaid rebate, a further rebate for four years in his or her road tax of \$2 for each vehicle of this class for each and every year during the said period that said vehicle is habitually used upon the highways of this state."

This is a good law. It does not appear that many counties have taken advantage of it as yet but it would be worth a great deal to the cause of good roads if they would all put its provisions in force.

The wide-tired wagon improves the road where the narrow tires cut it to pieces. The objection that is sometimes brought against wide tires—that they pick up the mud—is valid in some places, but in very few; for with properly constructed roads, well drained, the universal use of wide tires would result in the road being kept smooth and hard from the constant rolling, and there would be no mud to pick up.

Exhaustive experiments were officially made in one of the eastern states a year or so ago to test the comparative value of the wide and narrow tires. A machine was used which showed the number of pounds of draft of the vehicle, and tests were made under all circumstances.

On ground which was hard underneath but so soft on top from a thaw that even the wide tires would sink to the solid, the narrow tired wagons drew the easier. Under all other circumstances the difference was in favor of the wide tires.

On a hard smooth road there was little difference, but that little was in favor of the wide tires; on the plowed ground they had a much greater advantage.

In fact, any road district would find it a paying investment to give a rebate to the man using wide tires as the law

contemplates, and this rebate would pay, or greatly aid in paying, the cost of exchanging the narrow tires for the wide. Then, once the latter were in universal use, roads could always be kept in repair at half the expense, and the cost of hauling loads over them would be greatly reduced.

JO. WHEELER'S RETURN

Due to the fact that Otis Would Give Him No Fighting to Do.

New York, Jan. 19.—If General Joseph Wheeler expects to return to Washington to take a seat in congress without further formality, it looks as if he would meet with disappointment. Inquiry has been made, and there is very general agreement on both sides of the house that it has been clearly shown by the examination of the case of Low, and other precedents, that he has forfeited his right to a seat, and that the only thing open to him is to go back to his district and seek re-election if he desires to continue in service in congress.

No doubt is entertained that if he seeks re-election at a special election to fill the vacancy, he will be returned to congress, perhaps without opposition, but it will be held by the house, according to the best authorities in both parties, that the seat is now vacant and will remain so until a special election has been held.

No doubt exists in the minds of friends of General Wheeler that his return from the Philippines in compliance with his open request is due to the failure of General Otis to give him active service in the field.

In certain quarters an effort is made to attribute General Wheeler's return to inability to stand the climate and to his age. In refutation of the former, his friends point to a statement he made after visiting the American lines, "the impression that the new country is unhealthy is wrong." Regarding his age, it is pointed out that he is only about a year older than General Otis.

THOSE FUMIGATING CLAIMS.

The City Will Be Reimbursed by Property Owners for Work Done.

At the last meeting of the council the recorder was authorized to present bills against a number of individuals for expenses incurred by the city in fumigating buildings belonging to said individuals and ridding them of the smallpox contagion.

As it was rumored that the subject of the parties in question would refuse payment, THE JOURNAL has seen and talked with some of them on the subject.

One, David McCully, paid the amount charged against him, without delay, and so far as heard from no one has refused. Eugene P. McCormack against whom the largest charge is made for fumigating the opera house lodging house, said that he had not looked into the matter, but was willing to do anything reasonable, so far as he had considered the matter the charge of \$40 for supervision seemed somewhat out of proportion to the remainder of the bill, \$112.25 for material used and labor. However, he had no complaint to make against the city council, that had done the best they could.

A Bush expressed himself to substantially the same effect, and E. C. Patton had no kick to make.

Old Bill Anderson announced his readiness to pay his proper share.

The other parties were not seen, but it is not likely that any one will refuse to pay the reasonable expenses of fumigating his property.

It was clearly within the province of the city administration to do any thing necessary to stamp out the contagion. The buildings had either to be fumigated by the city or quarantined until the owner should fumigate them under the supervision of one having authority from the city to see that it was properly done.

It was the misfortune of the owners that their property became infected, and it is not likely that any one of them will wish the city to bear the expense incurred therefrom.
