"AWKWARD ATTITUDES" AGAIN.

Albany Dem.

As we predicted in an editorial on "awkward attitudes" some days ago, the only weapon of defense which the Oregonian could rely upon was abuse of the Democrat. It is always safe to conclude that when that paper calls into use these weapons that it has no other, and that it has been atung in a very sensitive, tender place. It charges the Democrat with "having been now for gold, now for silver, now for free trade, and now a tariff that protects trusts," etc. It forgets that these are the very charges that were brought to the door of the Oregonian and it has not the hardihood to deny their truth. It contended stoutly for free trade in 1883 and then in 1884 when the industrial conditions of the country had not changed in any particular it contended for a protective tariff. Why this sudden change? There are many people in Oregon who suspect they know the reason why. The Oregonian has never confided any sufficient reason to the public for the change. Then with great zeal it has supported its party in fastening upon the people of the country the greatest trust producing and trust protecting scheme ever consummated—The Dingley tariff law. And yet it bemoans the sad fate of one who should be charged with "inconsistency." It supported Dolph, the gold man, and Binger, the silver man, both in one editorial breath, and now calls about it being an "Independent" paper. There is not a more servile Republican organ in the country. That paper may content itself when it accuses the Democrat editor with being ignorant. If this be true, it is no defense against our charge that the paper has changed its views the third time on the tariff question since 1880, that in less than a week it changed its position on the question of holding the Philippine islands. If the Oregonian could hear the criticisms of Republicans for its desertion of the protective tariff law it would think the state was full of men who are both "independent and dense." There is one line of conduct, however, from which the Oregonian has never swerved, and that is that it is always found on the side of the strong, against the weak, on the side of corporations and trusts and against the masses. It stands with the imperialism of British gold and greed against the only republic in South Africa. On these last lines it wavers not, guarding the rights of the masses of the common people as the "baseless fabric of a vision." It says the Democrat follows its own party whether right or wrong, nevertheless when the Wilson bill was pending before congress the Democrat frequently insisted that the reductions were not nearly so large as they should be, but the bill was so much fairer to all sections than any bill the Republicans could or would pass that the Democrat accepted it as much the less of two evils.

GENERAL YULE, A PHYSICAL WRECK.

SERMON BY A LAYMAN

True Christianity Versus the Repitition of History.

Written by One Who Believes That Christianity Stands for Something More than Creed.

True Christianity is a school, the aim and object of which, is the call, training and education of citizens for the reign of peace and love. Jesus Christ is the Master and Teacher and gives, as recorded in the Gospels in very plain language, the qualifications necessary for citizenship, as that the simplest of the simple, if he will, cannot misunderstand them—the love of God and humanity is the essence of it. But it is particularly noteworthy how the Master depicts the danger of greed and love of money, the accumulation of the same, also the eagerness for ruling power. He does not teach war, but positively prohibits war and retaliation, and sends his messengers of peace and good tidings as sheep among wolves.

No amount of comment, twisting or contortion can erase the real meaning of the plain and expressive words of the founder to Christianity. Let those professing Christians justifying their upholding and advocating of war, by the records of extermination wars, practiced by the Jewish nation remember, that Jesus was a reformer, who not only up held and practiced what was right in the old book, but rejected what was wrong, misunderstood and abused by the Jews. Of course the teachings and reforms of Jesus were too goodly, broad, clear and conclusive for the narrow minded leaders of the Jewish tribal God worshippers, and as a great many found themselves hit by his criticism and teaching, they had him Crucified.

Would Jesus actually fare any better under present existing conditions? Would there not be a great many professing Christians ready to crucify him if they were not held in check? If all professing Christians were listening and heeding the call of Jesus Christ to deny themselves, that is to deny all their self-wisdom in their respective and innumerable conflicting commentaries and additions of invention, quit straining at gnats and swallowing camels, and follow Jesus, that is, practice his simple, clearly expressed commands of brotherly love and humanity, and consequently identify their Christianity by such signs as Jesus gave in answer to the messengers of John the Baptist, Math. x 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, would we not have the Golden Age indeed?

The primitive Christians, with the exception of a few, who, owing to their former diversified schools and training, were rather troublesome, seem to have kept generally pretty close to the command of their Master for several hundred years, and also kept pretty well aloof from the temptations of accumulating wealth and ruling power, depicted by Jesus as being so dangerous.

To about 325 A. D., under the reign of Constantine I, the Christians not only without assistance of soldiery and sword, but under the most horrible and cruel persecutions, succeeded in converting the majority of the subjects of the great Roman Empire, and such Christians, too, that their excellency was so appreciated by the pagan Emperor that he admitted them to civil rights. It seems singular that those few primitive Christians under such adverse circumstances made so many converts, and these converts such desirable citizens. In such a short period, while now in these enlighten times, under cover of cannon and bayonet and almost unlimited pecuniary assistance, comparatively few are converted in a similar period. Probably the reason is that the primitive Christians were following the instructions of Jesus, and were believing what they were preaching, and the converts were impressed by the sincerity of the preachers, the beauty and worth of the unadorned divine doctrine of Jesus, accepted the new religion for its own worth without any additional side view or favor, and so became good Christians, and consequently good citizens.

It has been a question in history and will probably remain so for posterity, whether it was for his sincere belief in Christianity that the Emperor Constantine favored the Christians with civil rights, and afterwards accepted the religion himself, or if it was to make friends with the Christians, who now outnumbered the pagans, in order to strengthen and secure his hold as Emperor.

Be that as it may, the result was a turning point in the character of Christianity. As it not only ceased to be a Christian, but the same also had access to civil offices, it became a great temptation and very dangerous to the spiritual welfare of the church, as it certainly always will be. From now on it was not only for the worth of the religion that it was accepted, but also for the sake of offices or some other side favors, and it is evident that the principal aim of a great many converts who, from now on, were added to the church, was—flattery, power and lucre. The church, by the continued addition of such questionable additions, gradually lost its true spirit and drifted into a mercenary business. Money becoming the motive power in everything, and before a very long period the Christianity was transformed into a veritable paganism, all but the name and the names of the Gods and Idols. The most absurd and ridiculous necessities were invented and imposed on the community, by means of which money was extracted to supply the pockets and high living of the priest-hood, all up the treasury of the churches, erecting and embellishing fine churches and cathedrals. Are those old buildings scattered over the whole con-
