HOP PROSPECTS.

What A. J. Ray Says on His Return From the East.

On his return to Portland, J. A. Ray, who went east in the interest of the O. H. G. A., in company with Pres. Jones reports that he "did not find the situation very encouraging for high prices." He continued: "The best policy of the association, it seems to me, would be to accept all reasonable offers. My own position in the matter is finding orders, and not in making prices. I found a large number of orders, but the prices were not such as the association hoped to secure."

He also says that Pres. Jones, in his efforts for the passage of an anti-adulteration law, has the endorsement of the United States Brewer's Association, though the secretary of that association claims that no adulterants are now used.

Frank Dearborn Very Low.

As this Journal goes to press the report reaches this office that Frank S. Dearborn, Salem's popular bookseller, who has been very sick with typhoid for several months, is rapidly failing and that unless a change for the better comes very soon, the worst may be expected.

Thirty thousand more Austrian miners have gone on a strike, their employers having refused the demands for higher wages and an eight-hour day. The total number now out is 70,000, and before the end of the week it is expected that 20,000 others will have joined.

The secretary of the treasury estimates that it will cost \$69,809 to defray the expenses of collecting the revenue from customs at the ports of Oregon for the coming fiscal year, this service employing 54 men, and \$40,597 for a similar purpose in Alaska.

Prof. Hagen, the weather forecaster, at Washington, was thrown from his wheel last evening and probably fatally injured. He collided with a Negro, and was thrown forward to the pavement, fracturing his skull.
