ACQUITTED BY A JURY.

Parties Charged With Injuring Bicycle Paths Prove Alibi—Another Case.

The trial in Justice court Wednesday afternoon, of G. H. Irwin and Ed. Brown on a charge of driving horses on a bicycle path near Lake Labish on Jan. 3rd took place before a jury consisting of H. C. Tarpley, Joe. Howard, Jas. Riggs, M. E. Goodell and Wm. Buck. The accused proved to the satisfaction of the jury that they were in Salem all of the day on which the sole prosecuting witness testified to seeing them commit the offense in question, so they were acquitted. A warrant, which they incurred in the Justice court in fixing the date.

Another accused of violating the law in question is Manley Blanton, of Brooks, who is said to have been seen by some school children when he was riding a horse along the bicycle path. He has been arrested and his trial set for 1 p.m. Monday. Til Ford is his counsel, and a warm time may be expected.

PREPARING FOR TROUBLE.

JACK FROST.

How He Has Served the Rest of the Valley.

The first cold weather of this season has prevailed here for a couple of days; but so far as heard from has done no damage. In fact it has hardly been cold, except in comparison with the very mild temperature which has prevailed heretofore this winter. Heavy frosts for the last two nights is the extent of the cold snap.

Reports from other sections of the valley indicate that they have had about the same sort of visitation.

The frost seems to have extended from Forest Grove to Junction City. It is not believed that any damage has been done to fruit, as the cool weather for several days before had the effect of checking the tendency of the sap to start, caused by the previous warm weather, and the frost is regarded as distinctly beneficial.

Wind and Water Damages. An Independence correspondent says the water tower of the Monmouth water plant was blown over Monday night and completely demolished.

The cable of the ferry, which was broken during the high water, has not been replaced as yet, on account of some right-of-way difficulty.

Reports of severe cold come from Dawson City, where the mercury has been standing about 50 below zero.

SCABBY SHEEP.

Many Found by Stock Inspector Taylor Also Some Hog Cholera.

W. S. Taylor, stock inspector for Marion county, went to Turner today after spending a couple of days in Salem and vicinity.

He found a good many scabby sheep around here, and ordered them all dipped. He had recently made a trip up on the Abiqua and toward Silverton, where he also found some scab among the sheep, as it prevails in nearly all sections of the county.

By energetic measures, this disease had been entirely stamped out last spring; but it has been brought in again by bands of sheep from other counties.

Many sheep have been brought in from Clackamas county where there has been no stock inspector, and from Linn and Lane counties, where the inspectors do not understand, or do not attend very strictly to their business.

Marion county buyers go to other sections and buy cheap bands of sheep, to find when they get them home that they are infected with disease.

One man recently drove in six hundred from Lane county, which were apparently healthy, but one week after their arrival here he found them badly affected with scab. He has dipped them three times and now has them fairly healthy. A few are also affected with grub in the head.

There is some hog cholera in the north end of the county. Inspector Taylor has quarantined all the bands of hogs known to be diseased and ordered the sick animals killed. He has also notified all butchers of the bands in which the trouble exists, to protect the public.

This disease was brought in from the east several years ago, and has caused much loss. One man recently lost his whole band of 21 head.

The utmost care is needed to prevent the spread of the disease, as it is carried from one band to another in the clothing or boots of parties passing back and forth.

Mr. Taylor tells of one man whom he warned against the disease in a band of hogs, across the road from his farm, advising him not to go near them without changing his clothes. The farmer replied that he would attend to all that. So he went and took a good look at the sick swine and brought the disease back to his own band on his boots or clothing, which he did not change.

All stock has been doing well so far this winter and is coming through in good condition.

Peddler Arrested.

A member of the historic O'Leary family was brought before Recorder Judah this morning on a charge of peddling without a license. He had been selling alleged gold rings on the street. He was sentenced to 5 days, and sentence was suspended for three hours to give the fellow a chance to leave town or get a job.

BOLD ROBBERY

Hoefler & Zorn of Champoe Held Up Tuesday Evening.

Between Three and Four Hundred Dollars Secured—News Seems to Travel Slowly in This Country.

A bold hold-up occurred Tuesday evening near Champoe, when two masked men robbed Hoefler & Zorn of between \$300 and \$400.

John Hoefler and his partner, Casper Zorn, with their two hired men, Lester Sprague, and Jas. Lawton, had just set down to supper, when two pistol shots were fired just outside of the window opening out on a porch. Immediately two revolvers were thrust through the window by a man standing on the porch, scattering the glass in all directions and covering the men at the table. At the same time another man from the kitchen and standing in the door of the dining room, covered the four occupants of the house.

The man outside then came in and went through the pockets of the victims but secured nothing of value. One of the hired men had \$10 in his pocket, but on Mr. Hoefler protesting against robbing a working man, he was allowed to keep it.

Mr. Hoefler was then ordered to go in to the other room and open the safe, which he did with alacrity.

The robbers displayed perfect familiarity with the premises, and though the safe is masked by a dummy door they knew its exact location.

There were between \$300 and \$400 in the safe, also a gold watch belonging to Mr. Hoefler. The robbers left the watch and took the drawer containing the money, and left, throwing the draw away at a short distance from the house.

Mr. Hoefler went immediately to Champoe and endeavored to telephone to Sheriff Durbin. He was led to believe by the operator that it was all right and the sheriff would be notified. Wednesday morning he telephoned to District Attorney Hayden, but was informed that he would have to come to Salem and swear out a complaint.

On his arrival in this city last evening Mr. Hoefler was somewhat surprised to find that he seemed to be bringing the first news of the affair.

Hoefler & Zorn are extensive farmers and land owners, also doing a little money lending on the side, and they are the next to the largest taxpayers in Marion county.
