Stealing Bryan's Thunder.
New York, Jan. 30.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Mr. Bryan and other Democratic leaders are planning to make an anti-trust declaration one of the principal planks of their platform, but the Republicans may execute a flank movement that will make the issue a very subordinate one, and will give their party whatever credit is to be gotten out of it. Some of the Republican leaders have come to the conclusion that if congress should pass a resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution to give the United States government power over corporations, it would leave no chance for the intended Democratic assault on trusts.

North Pacific Naval Force.
New York, Jan. 30.—"Command of the sea on our North Pacific coast and the waters of the western basin of the North Pacific should be in our hands in peace and war time. This can only be effected by the readiness of a proper and sufficient naval force either on the spot, or to be furnished from the Atlantic through an untrammelled canal. In addition to this, and ready for combining, should be the available forces normally attached to the Philippines and the waters about China, Japan and Korea. In other words, the Pacific ocean, from Samoa northward, should be within our control. These observations are made by Captain C. H. Stockton, president of the naval war college, in an article in the proceedings of the naval institute, dealing with the commercial, naval and political conditions of an interoceanic canal across the Central American isthmus.

Is China's Emperor Dead?
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—No confirmation has reached the state department of the reported death of the Chinese emperor. Because of previous roundabout ways in which the story of the death gained circulation it is subjected to considerable doubt as to its accuracy. Moreover, a dispatch was received at the state department this morning from the United States Minister Congratulating Peking containing no reference to the report. It is considered as incredible that the emperor should be dead and lying in state in Peking without Mr. Conger's knowledge.

Withdrawal From Cuba.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Clayton of Alabama has introduced the following resolution: "Resolved, That on July 4, 1900, the military and naval forces of the United States be withdrawn from the island of Cuba, and that the government thereof be left to the Cuban people. "Resolved, further, That the president of the United States be and he is hereby directed to make proclamation of the execution thereof."

Ordered to Samoa.
New York, Jan. 30.—Captain Wendell C. Neville, commander of the marine corps of the Brooklyn navy yard, who has been appointed governor of the island of Tutuila, has received orders to prepare to go to the Samoan islands at once.

Jack Rogers' State Street Saloon Burglarized Last Night.
Some time during the early hours this morning, burglars entered the saloon of Jack Rogers on State street, and abstracted about \$7.50 in small change from the till. It is thought by the proprietor, that the burglar remained in a vacant room over the saloon and after the night man closed the place of business, came down stairs and by breaking the lock on one of the inside doors, entered the saloon. After going through the till and cash register, he departed by way of a side door. The front and back doors of the saloon were locked this morning when the proprietor opened the saloon. The side door was unlocked from the inside which evidently proves that the burglar was in the building when the proprietor locked up his place of business last night.

Thos. Monaghan, a young man who was employed by Mr. Rogers yesterday, to lay carpet in the room over the saloon, has been arrested for the crime and will have a hearing before Judge Judah tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock.

Yazoo Canal Work.

Vicksburg, Miss., Jan. 30.—The contractors having charge of excavating the Yazoo Canal have started to work, having three dredges in operation, with a capacity equal to the requirements of the contract, which is for the removal of 200,000 cubic yards of earth each month. The canal will cost about \$1,000,000.
