The Pullman Company now operates two grades of sleeping cars via the Rio Grande Western Railway. The ordinary sleepers are entirely new, and the berths, both upper and lower, are fitted up complete with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, curtains, etc., with covers arranged for making tea, coffee, etc., requiring nothing to be furnished by passengers. Uniformed Pullman porters are in charge of the cars, who are required to keep them in good order and attend to the wants and comforts of passengers. 'Frisco Is Quarantining.

San Francisco, Jan. 31.—Federal Quarantine Officer Kinyan is determined to take no chances on the black plague being brought into this port. He has issued instructions to the pilots that all vessels, steam or sail, arriving here from Kobe, Hong Kong, Sydney and Honolulu, must go into quarantine pending an examination. The pilots have been instructed to fly a yellow flag on all vessels coming into harbor from the ports named.

WESTON'S EXAMINATION

Being Conducted in Justice Court for Champoug Hold-up.

Zorn and Loudon, Both Positively Identified Him as One of the Robbers.

Louis Weston was brought before Justice of the Peace Johnson this forenoon for his preliminary examination on the charge of being one of the men who held up Hofer and Zorn, near Champoug last Thursday evening, and robbed them of nearly \$400.

District Attorney S. L. Hayden, assisted by Chas. McNary conducted the case for the prosecution, while L. H. McMahon defended the accused.

The first witness placed on the stand was Caper Zorn. He related the facts of the robbery, as already given in THE JOURNAL, and positively identified Weston as one of the men; knew him by his own actions, size and general appearance. Mr. Zorn was kept on the witness stand about an hour.

The next witness was Jas. Loudon, one of the hired men, who was present at the robbery. He also was positive as to the identity of the accused. Had known him 10 or 12 years. Knew his voice and manner of talking, his build, size and walk.

Had recognized him at the time and he and Zorn had both spoken of it immediately after the robbery had gone.

Lester Sprague was called but did not profess to have recognized either of the robbers. Cross examination brought out a corroboration of Zorn's and Loudon's testimony that they had mentioned Weston as one of the robbers, at the time.

Other witnesses not having arrived court adjourned at 11 o'clock to meet at 1 p. m.

At 1 o'clock the prosecution rested, having no more testimony to introduce. The defense then put four witnesses on the stand to prove that Weston was in Portland at the time the crime was committed. They were: A. W. Jetty, who with his wife, Weston's sister, keeps a boarding house at 330 Fifth street, Portland; Mrs. Kruger, who works there; and a gentleman and his wife who board at the house.

All four testified positively to seeing the defendant at said boarding house on the evening of Tuesday, the 23rd, the evening the hold-up occurred at Champoug.

This concluded the testimony, and after a short summing up by McMahon and Hayden, Justice Johnson dismissed the case and discharged the prisoner.

MAJOR LEABO

Assigned to Second Battalion—Company K—Elect on Next Saturday.

Major R. H. Leabo, of this city, has been assigned to the command of the Second Battalion of the Third Regiment, O. S. G., consisting of "Company B," Ashland; "Company C," Eugene; "Company H," Grants Pass; "Company K," Salem.

The promotion, by election, of former Captain Leabo left Company K without a captain, and this vacancy will be filled at an election called by Major Leabo for next Saturday evening at the armory.
