FARMERS' CONGRESS

First Session This Afternoon in the Senate Chamber

Many Farmers and a Number of Prominent Men in Attendance. Program for Tonight.

The Farmers' Congress was convened this afternoon in the senate chamber of the capitol. That room was used in preference to the hall of representatives on account of the difficulty of hearing anything that is said in the latter place of unearthy acoustics. The senate chamber will seat 350 or more, and it was considered better to run the risk of crowding than to face a certainty that none of the addresses would reach the ears of those present.

The attendance is not large, but is probably as great as could be expected under the circumstances. The morning train from Portland brought quite a number who have been in attendance at the state league of Republican clubs just held in Portland. This gives the congress more of the appearance of a rally of politicians than was probably contemplated by the "original movers in the matter."

The Portland chamber of commerce is represented by President Taylor of that body, who, however, could spare but one day to attend.

Hon. Peter J. Shields, secretary of the California State Agricultural Society, who was invited to be present, was unable to attend, but sent a paper to be read on the subject of "Fair Circuits and the Benefits Thereof."

Professor Francesco Seeley, of the college of music has charge of the musical part of the program, which is guarantee of excellence in that part of the program. The Salem Chamber of Commerce held a meeting at the office of Secretary Thielson at 11:30 for the purpose of officially welcoming President Taylor of the Portland Chamber and others, including C. H. Markham, G. P. A. of the S. P. Co., President W. H. Wehrung of the State Agricultural Society and Emory G. Smith of Palo Alto, all of whom came up on the 11 o'clock train from Portland.

At 2:30 the congress was called to order by President W. H. Wehrung, who presides over the meeting.

CITY COUNCIL WORKS

Sanitary and Auctioneer's Ordinances Considered.

Adjourned Session Set for Friday Night of this Week.

The city council met in regular session last evening, Mayor Bishop in the chair, and all members present except Councilmen Gesner and Riggs.

The special committee composed of Messrs. Buren and Walker, to whom was referred the matter of re-arranging of city street lights reported in favor of establishing a new light at the intersection of Marion and High streets. Mr. Grissold moved reference to committee on streets. Lost.

A special report was made by Mayor Bishop and Recorder Judah, stating that the deed to the Wilson Avenue post-office site had been delivered and money received therefore as heretofore published. Adopted.

City Recorder Judah's monthly report was read and adopted.

City Marshal Gibson made his monthly report of dog licenses collected. Adopted.

M. L. Hamilton made application for renewal of liquor license. Referred.

A resolution setting forth that the \$16,000 insurance on the city hall expires soon, and authorizing the council on ways and means to divide the insurance equally among the various agencies of the city, was adopted.

Councilman Grissold brought up the matter of improving Wilson Avenue at this time, inasmuch as the money has been received from the sale of the post-office site. He suggested that it would not be expedient to make the improvement until after Uncle Sam has completed the postoffice building and improvements, and that for that reason the money received be used to take up city warrants and stop interest. The mayor and all the other members of the council concurred in this view.

A communication was received from Messrs. Friedman and Greenbaum setting forth that several auctioneer's licenses had been issued to several firms of auctioneers who are violating the provisions of the ordinance. They demanded that the city either refund it to them \$50, or cancel all other licenses. The communication was upon motion placed on file.

An ordinance was introduced repealing the section of the insurance ordinance exempting co-operative insurance companies from a special city license. This is done to satisfy the Oregon Fire Relief Association, which is now asked to pay the license. The rules were suspended and the ordinance was passed.

An ordinance was introduced by the street committee intended to compel the connection of all water closets within 330 feet of a public sewer with such sewer, under penalty. Read twice and referred.

An ordinance was introduced regulating auctioneer's licenses intended to amend the present ordinance in such a manner as to cover the defects of the present ordinance. Read twice and referred to the committee on ordinances with instructions to report next Friday evening at a called meeting.

Mr. Grissold moved that when the council adjourns it be to Friday evening Feb. 9. Adopted.

Mr. Grissold moved that it be the duty of the policemen to report to the city recorder when street lamps do not burn all night. Adopted.

Reconsideration of the vote by which the city assumed to pay for a certain water connection on a hydrant rate basis near the woolen bank was brought up, and the previous order was upon motion rescinded.

The Jefferson Cake Walk.
At the dedication ball at Jefferson last week the grand finale was a warm number in the shape of a cake walk. There were plenty of contestants, and the youth and beauty of the town took part. Yet to the great surprise of all the race was not to the swift, but a couple of dark horses walked off with the cake.

To say old-timer who knows the antics and remote terphorean possibilities of the latent stalwarts of that neck of the woods it will not be surprising to learn that Dave Looney and Archie Hudson proved to be the victorious heavy weights. Those gentlemen were in fine action and good wind. They started in just to please the children, but as they warmed up it soon became apparent that some thing was going to pop, and that the heavy weights were in to stay. Dave says he thinks he should have first money, as Archie always takes the advantage of him on swinging, but on the other hand when it comes to the chase has too much reach for his opponent.

The pair—and the ladies all say they're a good pair to draw to—now propose to challenge any heavy weight, light weight, middle weight or feather weight cake walkers in Western Oregon. Archie is inclined to draw the color line, but Dave bars nothing. These champions will surely be heard from again, and may be induced to enter at the state fair free for all high steppers next fall.
